

### **SPEECH**

Shinsaku Hogen
President of the Japan
International Cooperation Agency

It is my great privilege and honor to say a few words on this occasion in announcing the opening of the Japan International Cooperation Agency on behalf of the members of the board of directors and the staff of the Japan International Cooperation Agency.

The Japan International Cooperation Agency Law was enacted in the 72nd regular session of the Diet last May, and we were happy to see the Agency brought into existence on the first of this month.

This is a fresh beginning which is deeply significant and memorable in the history of our country's international cooperation. I would like to avail myself of this opportunity to sincerely express my profound gratitude to all the people concerned for their great efforts and cooperation in organising the Agency.

As you are well aware, the Agency is to integrate technical cooperation services as well as promote overseas cooperation activities by the younger generation on the basis of bilateral government arrangements which had been initiated by the former Overseas Technical Cooperation Agency.

The Agency provides the supplemental assistance to the Japanese emigrants previously the responsibility of the former Japan Emigration Service. At the same time the Agency is to take over a part of the activities of the former Japan Overseas Development Corporation.

In addition, the Agency is to promote development and technical cooperation in the fields of community development, agriculture and forestry industries, mining and manufacturing industry.

In other words, the Japan International Cooperation Agency was established for the purpose of contributing to further economic and social advancement in developing nations by way of undertaking mutual and closely related affairs in a comprehensive and unified manner in the field of international cooperation.

Despite the fact that our Agency has been established so recently, we, the staff of the Japan International Cooperation Agency, over one thousand people in number, are fully aware of our mission and will do our utmost in carrying out our tasks.

In conclusion, to facilitate the smooth performance of our activities, I would like to ask for the full support and guidance of Prime Minister and his Cabinet members, Government authorities, as well as other concerned people here today.

### Gentlemen,

It is an honour for me to have this opportunity to speak a few words in commemoration of the establishment of the Japan International Cooperation Agency. The outstanding feature of the international society since World War II is that many nations have obtained their independence to emerge as a group of developing countries with two thirds of the world population. Among them there are still some countries whose social foundations have yet to be much strengthened to attain the ideal of stability and prosperity.

Their difficulties will be understandable if we consider the fact that more than fifty of them have been independent for no longer than fifteen years,

At a time like this, I should think it is a great responsibility for advanced countries, above all for Japan whose neighbours are mostly developing countries, to make contributions to enabling mankind to enjoy peace and prosperity.

It is fitting that Japan, constantly pursuing peace, should be ready to assume such responsibility. This is why I have for long advocated that the world should be viewed not in terms of East versus West with huge armaments as heretofore, but in terms of harmonious development of South and North.

Fortunately, Japan has an abundant experience in building up a modern nation in a short period of a century and technologies we can be proud of in the world and is in a position to place them at the disposal of the developing countries.

On the other hand, Japan is one of the 'have-nots' in terms of resources, and has to depend upon the supply of huge amount of material essential to the people's living. This, among other things, accounts for the need for Japan to establish her national policy on the basis of friendship and reciprocity and promotion of international cooperation.

Therefore, it is my pleasure that the Japan International Cooperation Agency has been established as an organ to deal with the economic and social advancement of the developing countries, which is a common task of the international society, technologically and financially from a comprehensive, in-

tegrated point of view.

The new Agency should integrate and efficiently conduct a broad range of activities from social development to overseas emigration which have so far been assigned to different quarters. In performing its functions, it must also have an adequate understanding of the conditions of various countries viewed from their positions. I have no illusion, therefore, about many difficulties which will confront the Agency in inaugurating its operation.

I believe that all the distinguished people present here today desire, as I do, the growth and strengthening of the new Agency. With the ardent hope that, under President Hogen, it will come up to the expectations of all people as a nucleus of Japan's economic and technical cooperation and fully discharge its responsibilities, I wish it every success from the bottom of my heart.

I should like to extend to you my greetings to commemorate the establishment of the Japan International Cooperation Agency.

International cooperation is now being actively practiced in all fields of national and social activities. With regard to technical cooperation in particular, Japan has extended it, as an important means to contribute to the development of human resources and the improvement of technical standards in developing countries, through the Overseas Technical Cooperation Agency as the central organ. At this time when the South-North problem still remains a serious obstacle to the stable and harmonious developments of the international community, I believe that the Japan International Cooperation Agency has a mission of immeasurable significance to perform. I am keenly aware of the heavy responsibility that I bear upon myself as one who in the position to supervise the newly-born Agency.

To His Excellency the Prime Minister, their Excellencies the Heads of Mission, and the distinguished people from the Government and the business, I request to give the Agency their sympathetic support and guidance.

I am pleased to have this opportunity to offer my hearty congratulations on the founding of the Japan International Cooperation Agency. Even in areas where the private sector is responsible there still remains room for improvement and problems to be ironed out.

Under such circumstances, it is encouraging to witness the birth of an integrated International Cooperation Agency which is charged with establishing a comprehensive and efficient mechanism of international economic cooperation with the help of a number of people. It is the task of this Agency to step up technological cooperation on a government-to-government basis and to make an

increasing amount of funds available to needy countries to finance the construction and improvement of infrastructure such as roads, ports and harbours, to facilitate private foreign investments. A part of these activities have been conducted before by the Japan Overseas Development Corporation. We look forward to the day when the efforts of this Agency will bear fruits for the benefits of all concerned.

As for the Ministry of International Trade and Industry, we are intending to press ahead, in cooperation with the Agency, with enlightened economic cooperation programs designed to promote genuine welfare of recipient countries in ways consistent with the trade and industrial policies of the Ministry. I urge all those who are concerned with this country's international cooperation to extend their helping hand in their respective capacities to make the job of the Agency a successful undertaking.

In conclusion, I wish the Agency every success in their efforts.

Japan. At this glorious occasion, I would like to express my great gratitude to the people concerned for their devotions to the foundation of the Agency, and at the same time I expect that their efforts are sure to continue for the success.

I would like to close my congratulatory address with my sincere hope for the ever-lasting successful functioning of the Japan International Cooperation Agency.
