国際協力事業団 (素計 86.6.24 405 (405 q2.9 405) (405 q2.9 TAD 第三国研修は、一定の開発途上国地域内の一国において、周辺諸国から研修員を募集して研修を実施することにより、当該開発途上国間の協力の推進を図り、さらには研修実施国が将来独自に研修員受入れ事業を実施できるよう援助・協力することを目的として、昭和 50 年 3 月に初めて実施されたものである。以来その有効性が認められて年々拡充され、昭和 60 年度には 15 カ国において計 21 コースが実施されるまでに至った。

国際協力事業団は、これらコースの実施状況を調査し、併せて次年度のコース実施について 相手側関係当局と協議することを目的として管理チームを派遣した。

本報告書は、エジプト国保健省及びアラブ海運大学校 (AMTA) において実施された第三国 研修調査のため派遣された管理チームの調査及び協議結果をまとめたものである。





1. 調査の目的

昭和60年3月,エジプト国に対し看護教育・船員教育の分野において第三国研修を実施することを目的として、実施協議チームが派遣され、同国保健省及びアラブ海運大学校(AMTA)の両機関において昭和60年度より看護教育・船員教育の各々の分野において第三国研修を実施する運びとなった。本年度より開始された第一回コースの実施状況を評価するとともに、61年度コースの概要につきエジプト側関係機関等と打合せることを目的として、今般、本件ミッションが派遣されることとなった。

ロ. 目的・内容 同プロジェクトは、エジプトで不足している看護サービスを担当する nursing manpowerを育成することを目的とした。そのため、看護教育の 専門家派遣のほか、公衆衛生看護の教育訓練課程を拡充強化し、将来の この分野の指導者の育成のため、現代的な視聴覚教育設備の充実を図り、 同時にモデル地域において看護学生等に対し実践的なフィールド実習を 経験させることにより看護・保健・サービス分野における効果的な技術 移転を図った 日本側の専門家の指導に基づき、フィールドを選定し、教育内容や必要な機材等について検討した後、フィールド活動、教育訓練課程、視聴覚機材を用いての教育が行なわれた。

ロ. 協力の目的及び経緯

アラブリーク諸国の自国産出油の自力輸送及び国際収支の改善のための自国商船隊の 増強を目的として、同リークにより外航船乗組員及び陸上勤務者の養成機関としてエジ プト国に設立されたアラブ海運大学校(AMTA)は、昭和49年1月、わが国に技術協力 を要請してきた。

昭和50年6月,エジプト国が協力受入れ国の代表国となったことにともない。わが国への要請に基づいて、国際協力事業団は、昭和51年11月から当初4年間にわたり、ア

ラフ海運大学校海員訓練センター(甲板科,機関科,電気科),航海学部(タンカーオペレーションコース),機関学部(船舶用ディーゼルエンジンコース)において,専門家派遣,研修員受入れ,機材供与によるプロジェクト方式技術協力を行った。

との間、エジプト政府側の事情により、プロジェクトサイトを中途で移転せざるをえなかったため、協力計画の変更の必要が生じ、昭和55年11月当初予定した協力終了後、昭和57年5月までフォローアップ協力を行い、その後はさらに1年間、単独派遣専門家による協力を続けた。また昭和54年にエジプト国がアラブリーグからボイコットされ、アラブリーグ諸国からAMTAへの資金が断たれた後は、この分にエジプト政府からの資金をあてて運営が続けられている。

IV. 研修結果に関する調査団所見

本ミッションは、本件エジプト側窓口である外務省アフリカ局 Samir Mokkhtar 次官を訪問し、第三国研修協力について、コメントを求めたところ、同次官より、本協力の意義への高い評価と、日本側の協力に対しての謝意表明があった。実施上の問題点としては、コース開始前の準備期間にもう少し余裕が持てないか、アフリカ諸国の多くが未だ発展途上のステージにあることを勘案し、資格条件の弾力的運用を考えてはどうか、とコメントがあった。また将来の方向として、現行のような社会基盤的な分野のみならず、エレクトロニクス等の先進的分野にも協力を拡大してもらいたい旨、また本コースは、英語で実施されているが、今後仏語圏へ対応も考えてほしい旨要望があった。

なお、本件のような三角協力を更に推進する意味で、既に日本側外務省に要請がなされているアフリカ・ベニン共和国の病院建設協力案件について日本が施設援助を行い、エジプト側がが人材の派遣をするような協力関係ができないかとの打診があったが、本ミッションの任務外の内容であるため、先方の説明を聞き置くにとどめた。(現地日本大使館および外務本省に対し別途報告した。)以下にコース別に概要を述べる。

1. 看 護 教 育

1) 保健省のコメント

看護コースは、保健省内に同省関係者及び関係大学の看護関係者からなる専門委員会を 設置しこれに当った。また同省よりスタッフが1名コディネーターとしてプログラム運営 に専念した。評価については、各セッションごとにエバリュエーションを行なうとともに、 最終日に所定の質問状により研修員のコメントを求めた。

保健省関係者一様に、研修員全員プログラムへの参加意欲が高く、欠席・遅刻が皆無に近かったことにもそれが現われていた、とのコメントがあった。また、Ayoub次官を始めとする保健省関係者の本研修への取組みは、非常に積極的であり、当ミッションとの3回に渡る打合せにも、多忙な時間を割き関係者全員が出席した。

2) 質問状について

看護コースについては、既に帰国の近藤専門家より詳細な報告がなされている。当調査団は、カイロJICA事務所を通じ予じめエジプト側に配布された質問状の結果につき、保健省より報告を受けた。質問状集計結果の要旨は、以下の通りであり、研修内容、コースの実施方法、教材・施設、運営管理等の何れについても好評である。特にコースの進め方、コーディネーションについて、評価が高かった。

2 船員教育

1) 研修実施状況についてのコメント

11月26日,研修会場であるアレクサンドリア市ブラザホテルにおいて実施中の講義を,短時間ではあるが視察することが出来た。副学長,UNDP専門家等による各講師のプレゼンテーションは自信に満ちたもので,質疑応答も活発に行なわれていた。またOHP等による視聴覚教材による説明も手際良くなされ,AMTAが,こうした国際的催物の実施に手慣れていることをうかがわせた。

2) 施設の状況

今年度コースは、講義を主体としたセミナー形式により実施したため、研修会場は、アレクサンドリア市内のプラザホテルの会議室を会場として使用し、かつ研修員の宿泊施設として利用したが、新しいホテルであるため施設面で申し分ないものと見受られた。なお、来年度コースの調査の一環として、海員訓練センター(甲板科、機関科、電気科)・航海学部・機関学部の各施設を視察した。いずれの施設においてもプロジェクト協力期間中の供与機材は良く維持管理されており、来年度のディーゼルエンジンをテーマとした研修実施のためには、何ら問題はないものと見受けられた。

3) 質問状について

上記関係者との面談等による調査以外に、AMTAを通じ、所定の質問状を配布し、研修 員の本コースに対するコメントを直接求めた。質問結果の要旨は、以下の通りであり、コースに関する事前情報、目的の認識度合、アローワンスの項目が若干評価が低い以外は、 実施機関であるAMTAの各種アレンジについて大旨高い評価を与えている。








(2) 事前の情報 (G.I.等)







Dear Participants; Ladies & Gentlemen;



Papers Presented by Participants

The needs of African Countries for maritime education and training are in various specialities and levels. They can be classified as follows:

1 - Technical Education and Training of higher ranks of seafarers:

- 1 1 The concerned personnel are the deck officers, engineer officers and radio officiers required for sea-going vessels.
 - 1 2 Africans are trained for such professions in some of
 regional or african institutions including AMTA(EGYPT)
 Maritime Higher Institute (ALGERIA), RMA (GHANA), RMA
 (IVORY COAST).. etc. Others obtain their qyalifications in non-african institutions in France, U.K.,
 Sweden, Germany, USSR, U.S.A. and Others.
 - 1 3 Some of the African Institutions are well established, Others lack some training aids, equipment, teaching staff and other financial help.

11 - Technical Training of other specialized lower, ranks of seafarers

- 11 1 1 For Sea-going Vessels: Seamen, mechanics and and electricians
- 11 1 2 For fishing Vessels: Skippers, mechanics
- 1 1 3 For Coastal, Inland and ports: Pilots, Tugmasters, supply boats, fire fighting, work boats masters and engineers.
- .1 2 Some of such specializations are covered in the training program and studies offered by the abovementioned African Institutions. Others are not well taken care of.
 - 11 3 Other Schools are available in Africa for such purpose such as in Senegal, Liberia, Kenya... etc. However, most of them lack training facilities.

Other countries like Comeroon are planning to establish national schools for this purpose.

Lack of funds is an obstacle for establishment.

11 - 4 It is considered not appropriate - in most of the cases, to effect training of such specialities outside any country due to many factors, such as the big numbers required, the poor educational background, the language problem etc.

111- TECHNICAL TRAINING FOR THE PROFESSION OF CARGO HANDLING IN PORTS:

- This includes opecialized training for the safe and skilled operation of quay cranes, ships deck cranes, as well as, operation and maintenance of other lifting equipment such as fork lifts, floating cranesetc.
- Such professiors are commonly needed for all african ports and very few african instilutions are having a solid, specialized training program for such specialities.
- The difficulty of conducting training outside the national region lies on many factors, such as the low educational stondard of such cadres, language proplem and the period of training which, in most cases, makes it not cost-effective to send trainees abroad.

IV- EDUCATION AND TRAINING OF PORTS ADMINISTRATORS:

- 1V-1 This includes all administrative, economic and legal aspects of ports operation.
- 1V-2 There are some african institutions who are running educational courses in such fields like AMTA, the higher manitime institute of Algeria, tunisian institute and others.
- In spite of such educational programs
 might not be completely suitable to other
 non-national students, due to different
 working conditions, different types of
 cargoes from one country to another, but
 it seems to be one of the most beneficial
 opportunities to have scholarships in these
 fields especially, for higher ranks.

V - SHORT SPECIALIZED COURSES AND SEMINARS:

- V-1- This includes courses and seminars in the fields of fire fighting, personal survival, radar simulators, marine pollution control, handling of dangerous goods and some other topics covered within the activities of the maritime safety committee in the IMO.
- V-2- Some of such courses are mandatory for scafarers according to the STCW, others are highly recommended by IMO.
- V-3- Some of these courses, to be conducted requires costy training aids such as radar simulators which might not be available in some of african instilutions, others could be more easily covered in sort of seminars.
- V-4- It might be very aseful to effect coordination between existing african institutions to run such courses periodically and availing cheap opportunities for non-national african students and making use of sponsors and donors from international organisations (INO, UNCTAD, etc.) and donor countries.

SPECIAL RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE COURSE

It has been recommended that :

- 1- Lectures should be followed by small groups discussions, which would promote participation.
- 2- Lectures should be spearated by breaks that participants may relax and get ready for the following lecture.
- 3- Practical work should go side by side with theoretical lectures. Visits to ports, and other places of work, are required.
- 4- The number of lectures should be reduced that participants should have more time for recreational tours.
- 5- Future courses should allow a longer stay in the library to review recent publications, also, participants would have loved to see actual demonstration lectures in class rooms.
- 6- Topics for presentation should be fewer to promote understanding of the topic and participation on the part of participants.

The following pattern is recommended:

A one and a half hour lecture followed by 30 minutes seminar on the same topic.

- 7- Two days should be allocated after the end of the course for doing practical exercises and solving problems related to the topics presented in the training session.
- 8- All lectures should be recorded and left, together with related video programmes, if any, in a common room. This would give the participants the chance to do evening review of the topics presented in the morning. Besides, this would also help participants prepare further questions to be discussed during the last two days, following panel system discussions.
- 9- The Academic standard and experience of participants should be taken in consideration when selecting the topics of the training session.
- 10- Not less than two participants from each country should be invited.
- 11- The programme of the training session, including topics and lecturers, should be sent to participants in advance.
- 12- Higher per deem would be desirable.

THIRTEEN AFRICAM COUNTRIES ATTEMD ALEXANDRIA MARITIES COURSE,

The Arab Maritime Transport Academy at Alexandria inaugurated yesterday an international maritime education and training course sponsored by the Academy through coordination between the Egyptian and Japanese governments for the first time in Alexandria instead of Tokyo from 16th through 28th of current November. The course is being attended by 22 top-level scholars in the sector of maritime transport in thirteen African countries: Algeria, Benine, Cameroons, Gabon, Gambia, Ghana, Ivory Coast, Kenya, Liberia, Senegal, Sudan, Togo and Zambia.

Brigadier Alphonse Sadek, First Deputy to the Director of the Maritime Transport Academy, said that this course would be held within the framework of training programmes upon the proposition of Dr. Botros Ghali, Minister of State for Foreign Affairs, and in implementation of the agreement signed between the Egyptian and Japanese governments and the Arab Maritime Transport Academy in March, 1985.

The inauguration was attended by Ambassador Samir Mokhtar for the Foreign Ministry a delegates of the Government of Japan, the Director of the Japanese Technical Assistance Office in Cairo, the First Deputy to the Director General of the Academy, the Ambassadors of the African countries represented attending the course and the directors of African maritime institutes and top-level officials of the Ministry of Maritime Transport and the Academy.

A second meeting was held at the Academy by the African Federation of maritime institutes called for by the Academy which has been established under the auspices of the Egyptian Foreign Ministry and the United Nations for the coordination of plans, programmes and examinations at these institutes and reciprocal accreditation of maritime certificates awarded by the Academy.
