For many years the Japanese Government has placed a particular emphasis upon the international exchange in various fields such as this Seminar, and has made its continued efforts to implement this policy. Incidentally, this year marks the 21st anniversary since the training program on National Government Administration was inaugurated in 1968. I have heard that some 310 officials from 42 different countries have participated in the program over the years.

This seminar is designed to contribute one way or another to the development of public administration in the participating countries. However, we also wish that it will help promote mutual understanding and friendship between your respective countries and Japan. We would like to express our deep gratitude to the Government of Japan for giving us this valuable chance to observe and learn so much from the Japanese experiences.



My Colleagues, ladies and gentlemen,

I can assure you that without any doubt, both targets have been duly achieved.



This farewell speech could never end without our most heartily appreciation for the efficient task performed by four excellent professionals and human beings that accompanied us from the very beginning of the Seminar.




