




AREA-WIDE NUMBER OF SETTLERS OF JAPANESE DESCENT, IN U.S.A. AND CANADA



BASIC IDEA OF EMIGRATION

To afford the Japanese people an occasion to display creative activities in a foreign land whose environment is entirely different from their own, thereby to enable them to develop their potential capacities on the frontier and thus to cooperate in the development projects of the receiving country and further contribute toward the advancement of the welfare of mankind. Herein lies the basic idea of emigration.

Activities of the Service

The object of the Service is to carry on, efficiently at home and abroad, activities essential for promotion of emigration, including giving of help and guidance to emigrants, in accordance with the Japan Emigration Service Law (Law No. 124 of 1963)

- 1. To conduct researches and disseminate information on emigration
- 2. To provide counsel and offer good offices concerning emigration,
- 3. To give training and lessons to emigrants, to pay passage money, outfit and other expenses.
- 4. To provide accommodation, escort officers and other forms of help and guidance to emigrants in proceeding to the receiving country.
- 5. To provide counsel and give guidance to emigrants abraod their business and occupation as well as their life in general.
- 6. To provide emigrants abroad with welfare facilities and other forms of assistance necessary to enable them to settle down.
- 7. To acquire, prepare, maintain and transfer land for the settlement of emigrants and to help them to aquire such land.
- 8. To advance to emigrants and their organizations engaged abroad in agriculture, fishery, industry and other enterprises funds necessary for operating their enterprises and to guarantee their debts owed by borrowing such funds.
- 9. To advance to farming, fishing, manufacturing and other enterprises which receive emigrants, funds needed for receiving emigrants.
- 10. Affairs incidental to those mentioned above.
- 11. Other affairs deemed pertinent the promotion of emigration.







Main Office




Outlook on Japanese Industry






Before reclamation





Receiving Countries





Remarks: The black-coloured portion represents the proportoin of emigrants who have their passage money advanced or granted.

Settlement of People of Japanese Descent








