We had the pleasure of visiting the Philippines to conduct follow-up evaluation of JICA's training programmes of fishery cooperatives course under the technical cooperation programme of the Government of Japan in which previous participants attended.

The mission consisted of three (3) members mentioned below.

The purpose of the mission was to evaluate to what extent the ex-participants could apply their knowledge and experiences gained through JICA's training course in the Philippines after they have returned from Japan, and obtain suggestions from their senior government officials for improving JICA's training course programmes starting anew from 1994.

The mission hereby submits a short Summary Report on its seven (7) days follow-up evaluation activities conducted from July 11 to July 17, 1993.

The missison members would like to avail of this opportunity to express their deep appreciation for the warm hospitality and effective cooperation extended to the mission members during their stay in the Philippines.

# III. Terms of Reference of the Mission

The main terms of reference of the follow-up evaluation mission were as follows:

#### 1. Evaluation

To evaluate JICA's fishery cooperatives course on its effectiveness by interviewing/making questionaire surveys to ex-participants in the Philippines and their senior officials;

#### 2. Observation

To observe present status of small scale and artisanal fisheries as well as fishery cooperatives in the Philippines, and collect appropriate information to substantiate such observations;

#### 3. Recommendation

To recommend appropriate courses for fisheries training of JICA which shall start anew from FY 1994, replacing the former fishery cooperatives course. It should include recommendations on the subjects, methodologies, qualifications of participants and durations etc.

#### IV. Mission Programme

# V. Result

# 1. Evaluation

- The mission had a meeting with ten (10) ex-participants of fishery cooperatives course and their senior officials.
   (see the list of participants -- Attachment 2)
- (2) In respect of training in Japan, all of the ex-participants expressed satisfaction concerning the training course programmes. They have applied the knowledge they had gained in Japan to a certain extent. Their senior officials stated that the curriculum of fishery cooperatives course is well arranged, and the ex-participants are making use of the knowledge and experiences obtained in Japan.
- (3) However, in performing their official duties in their specialized fields, they have encountered difficulties in implementing their work on account of the following reasons:
  - transfer of positions due to re-organization of government agencies

and resulting in alienation from their original duties to those which are not related to the experiences of the training course;

- lack of funds:
- lack of institutional support;

#### 2. Observation

- (1) The mission members visited the following fishery cooperatives and fish markets:
  - Tabing Ilog Credit Cooperative in Julugan, Tanza, Cavite Province
  - Kapit Bisig Fishermen's Multi-purpose Cooperative in Julugan, Tanza, Cavite Province
  - Tanza Municipality Fish Market
  - Paranaque Fishermen's Cooperative

  - Paranaque Fish Market
  - SPCMBY Fisherfolk Federation and Multi-purpose Cooperative Inc. in San Pablo City

- (2) Based upon the observations the mission members made at these places, they felt as follows:
  - depletion of coastal fisheries resources has continued and resulted in increasingly poor harvest/catches, which has adversely affected fishermen's economy;
  - part of this has been caused by illegal fishing practices such as of dynamite fishing, cyanide fishing etc.;
  - fishery cooperatives are not given proper support by municipal and barangay councils as well as by the authorities concerned: they are reluctant to implement required supportive measures;
  - hygenic conditions of fish markets are poor;
  - fishermen's living conditions (ex.: houses, water supply etc.) are quite poor;
  - expected functions of fishery cooperatives, particularly of economic

businesses, like for example, marketing, supply and credit etc., are not fully met because of poor patronage and lack of information about the works of cooperatives by member fishermen;

- fish traders cover every needs of fishermen related to supply of fishing materials, marketing of their catch as well as credit etc..

#### 3. Recommendation

Based on the discussions held with the ex-participants in the fishery cooperatives course of JICA and the government officials concerned as well as field observations made, the mission recommends the following:

# (1) Training areas

The following training areas should be introduced:

- fisheries resource management;
- marketing of fishery products;
- practical managerial skills including financial management;
- fishery sector planning;
- infrastructure development;
- household livelihood support.

## (2) Qualification of applicants

Existing requirements of applicants for JICA training courses should continue. In case it is so desired, the following applicants may also be included as participants:

- policy makers and/or high ranking officials of appropriate government agencies;
- leaders of fishery cooperatives of which management has achieved good performance which might be modelled in other areas.

# (3) Duration

It deems appropriate to shorten the duration of training courses. Introducing of a few months courses should be considered.

# VI. Other

Participation of key government officials involved in policy making in the small scale fisheries sector should be considered to attend the training course on fishery cooperatives at the end of the course for about one week

in order to facilitate understanding of the importance of the training course, and provide better coordination of development activities among the government workers and the fishermen concerned.

The mission consisted of three (3) members as mentioned in II below.

The purpose of the mission was to evaluate to what extent the ex-participants could apply their knowledge and experiences in Thailand which they could gain through JICA's training course on fishery cooperatives after they have returned from Japan, and obtain suggestions from the senior officials of the government agencies concerned and other organizations for improving JICA's training course programmes starting anew from 1994.

The mission hereby submits a short Summary Report of follow-up evaluation activities conducted for six (6) days from July 18 to July 23, 1993.

The missison members would like to avail of this opportunity to express their deep appreciation for the warm hospitality and effective cooperation extended to the mission members during their stay in Thailand.

# III. Terms of Reference of the Mission

The main terms of reference of the follow-up evaluation mission were as follows:

#### 1. Evaluation

To evaluate JICA's fishery cooperatives course on its effectiveness by having an evaluation meeting with the ex-participants of Thailand in the training course, and by interviewing senior government and other organizations' officials conncerned. In carrying out the mission of the evaluation works, questionnaire surveys have been conducted beforehand, and the results of such surveys were used when necessary.

## 2. Observation

To observe present status of small scale and artisanal fisheries as well as fishery cooperatives and fishermen's groups in Thailand, and collect appropriate information to substantiate such observations;

#### 3. Recommendation

To recommend appropriate courses for fisheries training by JICA which shall start anew from FY 1994, replacing the former fishery cooperatives course. It should include recommendations on the subjects, methodologies, qualifications of participants and durations etc..

#### IV. Mission Programme

See the paper attached (Attachment 1).

# V. Result

## 1. Evaluation

- (1) The mission had a meeting with eleven (11) ex-participants of Thailand in fishery cooperatives course on the 22nd of July, 1993 at Imperial Hotel in Bangkok. (see List of Participants in the Evaluation Meeting on pages 15-16 in Attachment 2)
- (2) In respect of training in Japan, all of the ex-participants expressed satisfaction concerning the training course programmes. They have applied the knowledge they had gained in Japan to a certain extent. The senior government officials and other agencies' officers the mission members met stated that the programmes of fishery cooperatives course were well arranged, and the ex-participants could make use of the knowledge and experiences obtained in Japan.

- (3) Although the ex-participants did not think that their works were hindered by their senior governmet officials, they have encountered various difficulties in implementing their functions on account of the following reasons:
  - lack of funds; and
  - lack of capable supporting personel.

#### 2. Observation

- (1) The mission members visited the following fishery cooperatives, fishermen's groups, fishing ports and fish markets:
  - Phra Banchang Fishery Cooperative in Amphoe Banchang, Rayong Province;
  - Phra Banchang Fishermen's Group in Amphoe Banchang, Rayong Province;
  - Ao Makamphon Fishermen's Group in Amphoe Kleen, Rayong Province;
  - Mun Payou Fishing Port in Amphoe Muang, Rayong Province;
  - Macklong Fishery Cooperative in Amphoe Muang, Samut Songkhram Province:
  - Macklong Fish Market in Amphoe Muang, Samut Songkhram Province.

- (3) Based upon the observations the mission members made at these places, they felt as follows:
  - depletion of coastal fisheries resources has continued and resulted in increasingly poor harvest/catches, which has adversely affected fishermen's economy;
  - part of this has been caused by environmental pollution and excessive fishing efforts, paticularly in the Gulf of Thailand areas, and illegal fishing practices due to insufficient fishery resources management enforcement measures;
  - fishermen in Thailand expressed their hope that much attention be paid to their dire needs for improvement of government support facilities such as of infrastructure and credit etc.. Better coordination among the different government agencies concerned, if effectively carried out, may facilitate solving such needs of the fishermen;
  - expected functions of fishery cooperatives as well as fishermen's groups, particularly of economic businesses, like for example, marketing, supply and credit etc., are not fully met because of poor management on the part of these fishermen's organizations, lack of funds and lack of coordinated institutional support as reffered to above:
  - futher, understanding of cooperative's benefits and effectiveness of fishermen's united forces in the matters of economic activities etc needs to be emphasised in order to help improve their standard of living through participation in those organizations' activities;
  - fish traders in small scale fisheries still have strong influence over commercial needs of fishermen's activities, and as a result, effective mobilization of their power via fishery cooperatives and fishermen's groups seems to be affected;
  - some of the fishermen interviewed expressed their hope that some form of limited entry system in fisheries, for example, fishing right system etc., may benefit small scale coastal fishermen in Thailand.

# 3. Recommendation

Based on the discussions held with the ex-participants in the fishery cooperatives course of JICA and those officials/staff of government and other agencies concerned as well as on findings by field observations made during the mission's stay in Thailand, the mission recommends the following:

# (1) Training areas

The following training areas should be introduced:

#### - fishery cooperatives;

This course should include:

- guidance and other non-economic activities as well as planning, management and implementation of economic businesses;
- 2) financial systems;
- 3) fisheries cooperative association law;
- 4) insurance for fishermen and fishing industry; and
- 5) fishing right system.
- fishery sector planning;
- marketing of fishery products including fishery products quality improvement technologies;
- fisheries resource management and rehabilitation thereof;
- infrastructural development;
- environmental conservation;
- statistics of fishery sector.

# (2) Qualification of applicants

Existing requirements of applicants for JICA training courses should continue. In case it is so desired, the following applicants may also be included as participants:

- policy makers and/or high ranking officials of government agencies and other appropriate organizations;
- officials of middle level government and other agencies

# (3) Duration

It deems appropriate to shorten the duration of training courses because, in Thailand, participating in any programmes of more than 4 months may affect his/her routine course of promotion if he/she is a government official.

Under the circumstances, introducing of a few months courses should be considered as follows:

- for policy makers and/or high ranking officials of government agencies and other appropriate organizations concerned, not more than one month;
- for middle level officials of government and other agencies, not more than 4 months.

# (4) Field Study Visit

It may be appropriate to consider including home stays of participants at fishermen's houses and fishery cooperatives officers houses etc. at the time of field study visit of the training programmes. As regards possible sites for field study visits, it would be ideal if visits to the facilities related to both small scale and large scale fisheries, are arranged. This may include fishery cooperatives, fish processing factories, fish wholesale markets, aquaculture/farming as well as fish propagation facilities etc..

## (5) Methodology

The training courses to be set up and started from fiscal year 1994 should place more emphasis on practical rather than theoretical aspects. At least, allocating more time for on site observations in the field study visit should be considered.

## (6) Other

Joint training programmes between JICA and Thai government agencies concerned should be considered, if such arrangement is possible.

It may also be preferable if joint training programmes between JICA and international organizations such as SEAFDEC and FAO could be arranged. Such joint programmes may contribute to effective implementation of the programmes' purposes.

Examples of this may include setting up of training courses/programmes on fisheries/aquaculture of tropical nature at SEAFDEC's training facilities since JICA's training facilities in Japan are not designed so as to meet the training purposes of such tropical fisheries/aquaculture.
