THE REPUBLIC OF THE MARSHALL ISLANDS

In response to a request from the Government of The Republic of The Marshall Islands, the Government of Japan decided to conduct a Basic Design Study on the Project for the Strengthening of the Fish Marketing System in the Outer Island's (hereafter referred to as 'the Project'), and entrusted the study to the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA).

JICA has sent to The Republic of The Marshall Islands a study team headed by Mr. Jun-ichi Nakazoe, Senior Research Coordinator, Research Division, Fisheries Agency, and the Team is scheduled to stay in the country from September 18 to October 21.1995.

The team held discussions with the officials concerned of the Government of Marshall Islands and conducted a field survey at the study area.

In the course of discussions and field survey, both parties have confirmed the main items described on the attached sheets. The team will proceed to further works and prepare the Basic Design Study report.

### ATTACHMENT

#### 1. Objective

The Objective of the Project is to promote small-scale fisheries by providing necessary facilities and equipment for strengthening of fish marketing system in the outer islands.

- 2. Project Sites are Ailinglaplap Atoll, Namu Atoll, Likiep Atoll and Ebeye Island, as shown in 'Annex I'.
- 3. Executing Agency

Marshall Islands Marine Resources Authority,

Ministry of Resources and Development

4. Items requested by the Government of The Marshall Islands.

After discussions with the Basic Design Study Team, the following items were finally requested by the Government of The Marshall Islands, as shown in Annex II.

However, the final components of the Project including transportation vessel will be decided after further studies.

### 5. Japan's Grant Aid system

- (1) The Government of The Marshall Islands has understood the system of Japan's Grant Aid explained by the team; the main feature is described in "Annex III".
- (2) The Government of The Marshall Islands will take necessary measures, described in 'Annex IV' for smooth implementation of the Project, on condition that the Grant Aid Assistance by the Government of Japan is extended to the Project.
- 6. Proper Use of Equipment and the Counterpart Fund

If and when the products, such as fishing equipment purchased under the Japan's Grant Aid, are sold or leased to fishermen, the Government of The Marshall Islands shall take necessary measures as follows:

(1) to inform the plan of sale or lease of such products to the Government of Japan;




- (2) to ensure that such products be used by fishermen properly and effectively for their own fishing operations;
- (3) to deposit, in local currency, the amount generated from such sale or loase in a suitable account of the Government of The Marshall Islands as a counterpart fund;
- (4) to utilize the counterpart fund for the purpose of the fisheries development in Marshall Islands or the maintenance of such products;
- (5) to have a prior consultation with the Government of Japan about the use of the counterpart fund; and
- (6) to report the record of deposit and disbursement of the counterpart fund to the Government of Japan.
- 7. Schedule of the Study

Based on the Minutes of Discussions and technical examination of the study results, JICA will complete the final report and sent it to the Government of The Marshall Islands by the end of March 1995.






### JAPAN'S GRANT AID SCHEME

- 1. Japan's Grant Aid
  - 1) Japan's Grant Aid Program is executed through the following procedures.

Application

(Request made by a recipient country)

Study

(Basic Design Study conducted by JICA)

Appraisal & Approval (Appraisal by the Government of Japan and

Approval by Cabinet)

Implementation Japan and the recipient country)

2) Firstly, the application or request for a Grant Aid project submitted by a recipient country is examined by the Government of Japan (the Ministry of Foreign Affairs) to determine whether or not it is eligible for Grant Aid. If the request is deemed appropriate, the Government of Japan assigns JICA (Japan International Cooperation Agency) to conduct a study on the request.

Secondly, JICA conducts the study (Basic Design Study), using (a) Japanese consulting firm(s).

Thirdly, the Government of Japan appraises the project to see whether or not it is suitable for Japan's Grant Aid Program, based on the Basic Design Study report prepared by JICA, and the results are then submitted to the Cabinet for approval.

Fourthly, the project, once approved by the Cabinet, becomes official with the Exchange of Notes signed by the Governments of Japan and the recipient country.

Finally, for the implementation of the project, JICA assists the recipient country in such matters as preparing tenders, contracts and so on.

### 2. Basic Design Study

1) Contents of the Study

The aim of the Basic Design Study (hereinafter referred to as "the Study") conducted by JICA on a requested project (hereinafter referred to as "the Project") is to provide a basic document necessary for the appraisal of the Project by the Japanese Government. The contents of the Study are as follows:

- a) Confirmation of the backgrounds, objectives, and benefits of the requested Project and also institutional capacity of agencies concerned of the recipient country necessary for the Project's implementation.
- b) Evaluation of the appropriateness of the Project to be implemented under the Grant Aid Scheme from a technical, social and economic point of view.
- c) Confirmation of items agreed on by both parties concerning the basic concept of the Project.
- d) Preparation of a basic design of the Project
- e) Estimation of costs of the Project

The contents of the original request are not necessarily approved in their initial form as the contents of the Grant Aid project. The Basic Design of the Project is confirmed considering the guidelines of Japan's Grant Aid Scheme.

The Government of Japan requests the Government of the recipient country to take whatever measures are necessary to ensure its self-reliance in the implementation of the Project. Such measures must be guaranteed even though they may fall outside of the jurisdiction of the organization in the recipient country actually implementing the Project. Therefore, the implementation of the Project is confirmed by all relevant organizations of the recipient country through the Minutes of Discussions.

### Japan's Grant Aid Scheme

### 1) What is Grant Aid?

The Grant Aid Program provides a recipient country with non-reimbursable funds to procure the facilities, equipment and services (engineering services and transportation of the products, etc.) for economic and social development of the country under principles in accordance with the relevant laws and regulations of Japan. Grant Aid is not supplied through the donation of materials as such.

### 2) Exchange of Notes (E/N)

Japan's Grant Aid is extended in accordance with the Notes exchanged by the two Governments concerned, in which the objectives of the Project, period of execution, conditions and amount of the Grant Aid, etc., are confirmed.

- approves the Project for. Within the fiscal year, all procedures such as exchanging of the Notes, concluding contracts with consultant firms and contractors and final payment to them must be completed.

  However in case of delays in delivery, installation or construction due to unforeseen factors such as weather, the period of the Grant Aid can be further extended for a maximum of one fiscal year at most by mutual agreement between the two Governments.
- 4) Under the Grant Aid, in principle, Japanese products and services inculuding transport or those of the recipient country are to be purchased.

When the two Governments deem it necessary, the Grant Aid may be used for the purchase of the products or services of a third country.

However, the prime contractors, namely, consulting, constructing and



procurement firms, are limited to "Japanese nationals".

(The term "Japanese nationals" means persons of Japanese nationality or Japanese corporations controlled by persons of Japanese nationality.)

- The Government of recipient country or its designated authority will conclude contracts denominated in Japanese yen with Japanese nationals.

  Those contracts shall be verified by the Government of Japan.

  This "Verification" is deemed necessary to secure accountability to Japanese taxpayers.
- 6) Undertakings required to the Government of the Recipient Country
   a) to secure a lot of land necessary for the construction of the Project;
   b) to provide facilities for distribution of electricity, water supply and
  - drainage and other incidental facilities outside the site;
  - c)to ensure prompt unloading and customs clearance at ports of disembarkation in the recipient country and internal transportation therein of the products purchased under the Grant Aid;
  - d)to exempt Japanese nationals from customs duties, internal taxes and fiscal levies which may be imposed in the recipient country with respect to the supply of the products and services under the verified contracts;
  - e)to accord Japanese nationals whose services may be required in connection with the supply of the procducts and services under the verified contracts such as facilities as may be necessary for their entry into the recipient country and stay therin for the performance of their work:
  - f)to ensure that under the Grant be maintained and used properly and effectively for the project, and
  - g) to bear all the expenses other than those covered by the Grant, necessary for the project.

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### 7) "Proper Use"

The recipient country is required to maintain and use the facilities constructed and equipment purchased under the Grant Aid properly and effectively and to assign the necessary staff for operation and maintenance of them as well as to bear all the expenses other than those covered by the Grant Aid.

### 8) "Re-export"

The products purchased under the Grant Aid shall not be re-exported from the recipient country.

### 9) Banking Arrangement (B/A)

a) The Government of the recipient country or its designated authority should open an account in the name of the Government of the recipient country in an authorized foreign exchange bank in Japan (hereinafter referred to as "the Bank").

The Government of Japan will execute the Grant Aid by making payments in Japanese yen to cover the obligations incurred by the Government of the recipient country or its designated authority under the Verified Contracts.

b) The payments will be made when payment requests are presented by the Bank to the Government of Japan under an authorization to pay issued by the Government of the recipient country or its designated authority.

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# MARSHALL ISLANDS IN CASE JAPAN'S GRANT AID IS EXECUTED.

- 1. To secure the ownership and/or right of sites for the Project.
- 2. To clear the site prior to commencement of the Project.
- To secure yard for stocking material and constructing temporary facilities at the Project site.
- 4. To ensure the access to the Project site.
- 5. To provide necessary permissions, licenses and other authorizations for smooth implementation of the Project.
- To provide facilities for distribution of electricity, water supply, drainage, telephone line and other incidental facilities.
- To bear commissions to the Japanese foreign exchange bank for the banking services based upon the Banking Arrangement.
- 8. To ensure prompt unloading and customs clearance of project equipments and materials at ports of disembarkation in Harshall Islands.
- 9. To exempt Japanese nationals from customs duties, internal taxes and other fiscal levies which may be imposed in Marshall Islands with respect to the supply of the products and services under the Verified Contracts.
- 10. To accord Japanese Nationals whose services may be required in connection with the supply of products and services under the Verified Contrac such facilities as may be necessary for their entry into Marshall Islands and stay therein for the performance of their work.
- 11. To maintain and use properly and effectively the facilities constructed and equipment purchased under the Grant.
- 12. To bear all expenses other than those to be borne by the Grant, necessary for construction of facilities as well as for transportation and installation of equipment.
- 13. To coordinate and solve any matters which may arise with third parties and inhabitants living in the Project area during implementation of the Project.
