

CHAPTER 4 PROJECT EVALUATION AND RECOMMENDATION

4-1 Project Effect

When this project is implemented and the facilities and equipment procured under this project are operated and managed properly by the Sri Lankan side, it is expected that the project will result in the following benefits and improvements.

According to the Ministry of Health, Highway and Social Services, there was a nurse shortfall of 5,365 in 1994. 4-2 Recommendation

(1) Quick Following of the Contract and Approval Procedures During the Implementation of the Project

This project is to be implemented within the framework of the Government of Japan's grant aid cooperation. Therefore, there are time limitations on the implementation of this project, such as the completion of the project by the time limit as set forth in the Exchange of Notes and the completion of the construction work by the end of the fiscal year of the Government of Japan. For this reason, it is necessary that the Sri Lankan side quickly sign the Exchange of Notes and the consultant agreement, approve the detail design drawings prepared based on this basic design study report, follow the procedures for obtaining necessary approvals, sign construction and other contracts, and follow the customs duty exemption and other procedures.

(2) Budgetary Appropriations for the Implementation of the Project

When the governments of the two countries officially agree on the implementation of this project during fiscal 1996, the Sri Lankan side needs to quickly make budgetary appropriations for the preparation of the implementation plan and the construction work to be carried out during 1997/98.

(3) Operating Budget

Insufficient maintenance and management costs would lead to a decrease in the durability of the facilities and equipment as well as in the efficiency of operations. In order to attain the objective of this project, it is necessary to make well-planned budgetary appropriations for the maintenance and management of the facilities and equipment procured under this project.

(4) Personnel

For the smooth operation of the project, the Government of Sri Lanka need to appoint a principal, a vice principal and 7 tutors by 1988 and 3 more tutors by the year 2000. Besides teaching staffs, other staffs such as, a librarian, an AV technician, 3 clerical personnel, 2 typists, 2 drivers, 4 wardens and 33 supporting personnels need to be appointed by the opening time of the school.

(5) Future Obligation of Sri Lankan Side

The maximum capacity of the Hostel in the Project is decided to hold 70% of the entire students in consideration of the present situation of the existing schools. And the maximum capacity of the dining room is also planned for all students who live in the hostel.

As far as the hostel and dining room are concerned, Sri lankan Side should take measures for expansion in accordance with the future needs by using the area saved for future expansion in the Site.

MINUTES OF DISCUSSIONS ON BASIC DESIGN STUDY ON THE PROJECT FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF SCHOOL OF NURSING SRI JAYAWARDENAPURA

THE DEMOCRATIC SOCIALIST REPUBLIC OF SRI LANKA

In response to a request from the Government of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka, the Government of Japan decided to conduct a basic design study on the Project for Establishment of School of Nursing Sri Jayawardenapura (hereinafter referred to as "the Project"), and entrusted the study to Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA).

JICA dispatched to Sri Lanka a study team which is headed by Mr. Hiroyuki Kinomoto, First Basic Design Study Division, Grant Aid Design and Study Dept., JICA and which was scheduled to stay in the country from May 21 to June 18, 1996.

The team has had a series of discussions with relevant officials of the Government of Sri Lanka and conducted site survey.

In the course of discussion and site survey the team and Sri Lankan side have confirmed basic issues described in attached sheets.

The team will proceed to further works and prepare the Basic Design Study report.

ATTACHMENT

- 1. Objective
 - The Objective of the Project is to improve basic nursing education in Sri Lanka through construction of the School of Nursing Sri Jayawardenapura (hereinafter referred to as "the School of Nursing") and provision of necessary equipment thereof.
- 2. Project site

The project site locates in the premises of Sri Jayewardenapura General Hospital and is shown in Annex I.
Heli Pad shown in Annex I shall be demolished by Sri Lankan side before commencement of construction work.

- 3. Executing organization
 Ministry of Health, Highway and Social Services of the Government
 of Sri Lanka is responsible for the administration and execution
 of the Project.
- 4. Items requested by the Government of Sri Lanka
 After the discussions with the Basic Design Study Team, items
 described in Annex II were finally requested by the Government of
 Sri Lanka.
 However, items to be included in the Project will be decided after
 further study.
- 5. Japan's Grant Aid system
 - 1) The Government of Sri Lanka has understood the system of Japan's Grant Aid explained by the study team as described in Annex III.
 - 2) The Government of Sri Lanka will take necessary measures described in Annex IV for smooth implementation of the Project, on condition that the Grant Aid by the Government of Japan is extended to the Project.
- 6. Schedule of the study
 - 1) The team will proceed to further study in Sri Lanka until June 18, 1996.
 - 2) JICA will prepare a draft of the basic design and dispatch a mission to Sri Lanka in order to explain its contents in September 1996.
 - 3) In case that the contents of the basic design is accepted in principle by the Government of Sri Lanka, JICA will complete the basic design report and send it to the Government of Sri Lanka by December, 1996.

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
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- 7. Other relevant issues
 - 1) Status of the School of Nursing
 The School of Nursing will be open after construction work will
 be completed having a status of national school of nursing.
 - 2) Budget of the School of Nursing
 The Ministry of Health, Highway and Social Services shall
 continuously bear all the recurrent expenditure which will be
 required for operation and maintenance of the School of Nursing
 including salary for staff, allowance for students, operational
 cost of facilities and so forth.
 - 3) Personnel of the School of Nursing
 The Ministry of Health, Highway and Social Services shall
 secure adequate number of staff. Particularly, it will reserve
 seven teaching staff including principal or vice principal who
 shall be the special grade nursing officer untill completion of
 facilities and twelve untill the third year when the School of
 Nursing receives students in full capacity.
 - 4) Function of the School of Nursing Function of the School of Nursing will be to provide general nursing education.
 - 5)Collaboration with Sri Jayawardenapura General Hospital Sri Jayawardenapura General Hospital, as educational hospital, shall receive student nurses for the training purpose.
 - 6) Number of students to be accommodated in the School of Nursing The Basic Design Study Team has expressed it's concern on financial viability to accommodate three hundred students in the School of Nursing. Meanwhile, Sri Lankan side insisted that enough budget will be allocated as it is "national project".

Hence, both sides have confirmed that this matter will be decided after detailed study on the cost to be borne by Sri Lankan side.

Japan's Grant Aid Scheme

1. Grant Aid Procedures

1) Japan's Grant Aid Program is executed through the following procedures.

Application

(Request made by a recipient country)

Study

(Basic Design Study conducted by JICA)

Appraisal & Approval (Appraisal by the Government of Japan and Approval

by Cabinet)

Determination of

(The Notes exchanged between the Governments

Implementation

of Japan and the recipient country)

2) Firstly, the application or request for a Grant Aid project submitted by a recipient country is examined by the Government of Japan (the Ministry of Foreign Affairs) to determine whether or not it is eligible for Grant Aid. If the request is deemed appropriate, the Government of Japan assigns JICA (Japan International Cooperation Agency) to conduct a study on the request.

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Thirdly, the Government of Japan appraises the project to see whether or not it is suitable for Japan's Grant Aid Program, based on the Basic Design Study report prepared by JICA, and the results are then submitted to the Cabinet for approval.

Fourthly, the project, once approved by the Cabinet, becomes official with the Exchange of Notes signed by the Governments of Japan and the recipient country.

Finally, for the implementation of the project, JICA assists the recipient country in such matters as preparing tenders, contracts and so on.

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2. Basic Design Study

1) Contents of the Study

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- a) Confirmation of the background, objectives, and benefits of the requested project and also institutional capacity of agencies concerned of the recipient country necessary for the Project's implementation.
- b) Evaluation of the appropriateness of the Project to be implemented under the Grant Aid Scheme from a technical, social and economic point of view.
- c) Confirmation of items agreed on by both parties concerning the basic concept of the Project.
- d) Preparation of a basic design of the Project
- e) Estimation of costs of the Project

The contents of the original request are not necessarily approved in their initial form as the contents of the Grant Aid project. The Basic Design of the Project is confirmed considering the guidelines of Japan's Grant Aid Scheme.

The Government of Japan requests the Government of the recipient country to take whatever measures are necessary to ensure its self-reliance in the implementation of the Project. Such measures must be guaranteed even though they may fall outside of the jurisdiction of the organization in the recipient country actually implementing the Project. Therefore, the implementation of the Project is confirmed by all relevant organizations of the recipient country through the Minutes of Discussions.

2) Selection of Consultants

For smooth implementation of the Study, JICA uses (a) registered consultant firm(s). JICA selects (a) firms(s) based on proposals submitted by interested firms. The firm(s) selected carry (ies) out a Basic Design Study and write(s) a report, based upon terms of reference set by JICA.

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The consulting firm(s) used for the Study is(are) recommended by JICA to the recipient country to also work on the Project's implementation after the Exchange of Notes, in order to maintain technical consistency and also to avoid any undue delay in implementation should the selection process be repeated.

3. Japan's Grant Aid Scheme

1) What is Grant Aid?

The Grant Aid Program provides a recipient country with non-reimbursable funds to procure the facilities, equipment and services (engineering services and transportation of the products, etc.) for economic and social development of the country under principles in accordance with the relevant laws and regulations of Japan. Grant Aid is not supplied through the donation of materials as such.

- 2) Exchange of Notes (E/N) Japan's Grant Aid is extended in accordance with the Notes exchanged by the two Governments concerned, in which the objectives of the Project, period of execution, conditions and amount of the Grant Aid, etc., are confirmed.
- 3) "The period of the Grant Aid" means the one fiscal year which the Cabinet approves the Project for. Within the fiscal year, all procedures such as exchanging of the Notes, concluding contracts with (a) consultant firm(s) and (a) contractor(s) and final payment to them must be completed.

However in case of delays in delivery, installation or construction due to unforeseen factors such as weather, the period of the Grant Aid can be further extended for a maximum of one fiscal year at most by mutual agreement between the two Governments.

4) Under the Grant Aid, in principle, Japanese products and services including transport or those of the recipient country are to be purchased.

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When the two Governments deem it necessary, the Grant Aid may be used for the purchase of the products or services of a third country.

However the prime contractors, namely, consulting, contracting and procurement firms, are limited to "Japanese nationals". (The term "Japanese nationals" means persons of Japanese nationality or Japanese corporations controlled by persons of Japanese nationality.)

- 5) Necessity of "Verification"
 - The Government of recipient country or its designated authority will conclude contracts denominated in Japanese yen with Japanese nationals. Those contracts shall be verified by the Government of Japan. This "Verification" is deemed necessary to secure accountability to Japanese taxpayers.
- 6) Undertakings required of the Government of the Recipient Country
 In the implementation of the Grant Aid project, the recipient country is
 required to undertake such necessary measures as the following:
 - (1) To secure land necessary for the sites of the Project and to clear, level and reclaim the land prior to commencement of the construction.
 - (2) To provide facilities for the distribution of electricity, water supply and drainage and other incidental facilities in and around the sites.
 - (3) To secure buildings prior to the procurement in case the installation of the equipment.
 - (4) To ensure all the expenses and prompt execution for unloading, customs clearance at the port of disembarkation and internal transportation of the products purchased under the Grant Aid.
 - (5) To exempt Japanese nationals from customs duties, internal taxes and other fiscal levies which will be imposed in the recipient country with respect to the supply of the products and services under the Verified Contracts.
 - (6) To accord Japanese nationals whose services may be required in connection with the supply of the products and services under the Verified Contracts. such facilities as may be necessary for their entry into the recipient country and stay therein for the performance of their work.

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7) "Proper Use"

The recipient country is required to maintain and use the facilities constructed and equipment purchased under the Grant Aid properly and effectively and to assign staff necessary for this operation and maintenance as well as to bear all the expenses other than those covered by the Grant Aid.

8) "Re-export"

The products purchased under the Grant Aid should not be re-exported from the recipient country.

- 9) Banking Arrangements (B/A)
 - a) The Government of the recipient country or its designated authority should open an account in the name of the Government of the recipient country in an authorized foreign exchange bank in Japan (hereinafter referred to as "the Bank"). The Government of Japan will execute the Grant Aid by making payments in Japanese yen to cover the obligations incurred by the Government of the recipient country or its designated authority under the Verified Contracts.
 - b) The payments will be made when payment requests are presented by the Bank to the Government of Japan under an authorization to pay issued by the Government of the recipient country or its designated authority.

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Annex IV

MEASURES TO BE TAKEN BY THE GOVERNMENT OF SRI LANKA IN CASE THAT JAPAN'S GRANT AID IS EXTENDED TO THE PROJECT:

- 1. to provide data and information necessary for the Project;
- 2. to secure a lot of land for the construction of the School of Nursing at the site of the Project and to clear the site;
- to provide facilities for distribution of electricity, water supply and drainage and other incidental facilities outside the site;
- 4. to bear commissions to the Japanese foreign exchange bank to execute the banking services based upon the banking arrangement;
- 5. to ensure prompt unloading and customs clearance of products purchased under the Grant at ports of disembarkation in Sri Lanka
- 6. to exempt Japanese nationals engaged in the Project from customs duties, internal taxes, and other fiscal levies which may be imposed in Sri Lanka with respect to the supply of the products and services under the verified contracts;
- 7. to accord Japanese nationals whose services may be required in connection with the supply of the products and services under the verified contracts such facilities as may be necessary for their entry into Sri Lanka and stay therein for the performance of their work;
- 8. to use and maintain properly and effectively all the facilities constructed and equipment purchased under the Grant;
- 9. to bear all the expenses other than those to be borne by the Grant, necessary for the execution of the Project.

 - 2) The Government of Sri Lanka will take necessary measures, described in Annex-IV for smooth implementation of the Project on condition that the Grant Aid by the Government of Japan is extended to the Project.
- 6. Other relevant issues in connection with the Grant Aid when it is extended.
 - The Ministry of Health, Highways and Social Services should secure 100 students to enter the School of Nursing, Sri Jayewardenepura every year. The student batch of 1999 should be selected and be ready to enroll in time for the school opening.

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- 2) The helipad should be removed by Sri Lankan side before starting construction work of the Project.
- 3) The Ministry of Health, Highways and Social Services should allocate necessary operation and maintenance funds for the School in the budget.
- 4) When the School of Nursing, Sri Jayewardenepura commence the training programme of nurses, the existing nursing training facility in Sri Jayewardenepura Hospital will cease to function.
- 5) Teaching manpower and venue for clinical training.

 External lecturers and full-time teaching staff and venue for clinical training should be secured by Sri Jayewardenepura Hospital and Ministry of Health, Highways and Social Services. (See ANNEX-V)

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- b) Evaluation of the appropriateness of the Project to be implemented under the Grant Aid Scheme from a technical, social and economic point of view.
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The products purchased under the Grant Aid should not be re-exported from the recipient country.

- Banking Arrangements (B/A)
 - a) The Government of the recipient country or its designated authority should open an account in the name of the Government of the recipient country in an authorized foreign exchange bank in Japan (hereinafter referred to as "the Bank"). The Government of Japan will execute the Grant Aid by making payments in Japanese yen to cover the obligations incurred by the Government of the recipient country or its designated authority under the Verified Contracts.
 - b) The payments will be made when payment requests are presented by the Bank to the Government of Japan under an authorization to pay issued by the Government of the recipient country or its designated authority.



Annex IV

- 9. to bear all the expenses other than those to be borne by the Grant, necessary for the execution of the Project.




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




SECOND FLOOR




GROUND FLOOR, FIRST FLOOR, SECOND FLOOR PLAN




GROUND FLOOR, FIRST FLOOR, SECOND FLOOR PLAN











GROUND FLOOR PLAN
