


The Japanese Implementation Study Team (hereinafter referred to as "the Team") organized by Japan International Cooperation Agency (hereinafter referred to as "JICA") and headed by Dr. Akira OYA visited the Republic of the Philippines for the purpose of working out the details of the technical cooperation program concerning the Project for the Prevention and Control of AIDS in the Republic of the Philippines.

During its stay in the Republic of the Philippines, the Team exchanged views and had a series of discussions with the authorities concerned of the Government of the Philippines in respect of desirable measures to be taken by both Governments for the successful implementation of the above-mentioned Project.

As a result of the discussions, the Team and the authorities concerned of The Government of the Philippines agreed to recommend to their respective Governments the matters referred to in the document attached hereto.

THE ATTACHED DOCUMENT

I. COOPERATION BETWEEN BOTH GOVERNMENTS

1. The Government of the Philippines will implement the Project for the Prevention and Control of AIDS (hereinafter referred to as "the Project") in cooperation with the Government of Japan.
2. The Project will be implemented in accordance with the Master Plan which is given in I of the Annex attached herewith.

II. MEASURES TO BE TAKEN BY THE GOVERNMENT OF JAPAN

In accordance with the laws and regulations in force in Japan, the Government of Japan will take, at its own expense, the following measures through JICA according to the normal procedures under the Colombo Plan Technical Cooperation Scheme.

1. DISPATCH OF JAPANESE EXPERTS

The Government of Japan will provide the services of the Japanese experts as listed in II of the Annex .

2. PROVISION OF MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT

The Government of Japan will provide such machinery, equipment and other materials (hereinafter referred to as "the Equipment") necessary for the implementation of the Project as listed in III of the Annex. The Equipment will become the property of The Government of the Philippines upon being delivered C.I.F. (cost, insurance & freight) to the authorities concerned of The Government of the Philippines at the ports and /or airports of disembarkation.

3. TRAINING OF PHILIPPINE PERSONNEL IN JAPAN

The Government of Japan will receive Philippine personnel connected with the Project for technical training in Japan.

4. SPECIAL MEASURES FOR TRAINING OF MIDDLE-LEVEL MANPOWER

(1) The Government of Japan will supplement a portion of the following local expenditures, necessary for the training programs for middle-level manpower conducted in the Republic of the Philippines.

- (a) Travel allowances to and from the place of training for training participants.
- (b) Expenditures for preparation of teaching materials.
- (c) Travel allowances for field trips for training participants.
- (d) Expenditures for the purchase of supplies and equipment necessary for training programs.
- (e) Travel allowances for instructors when they accompany training participants

on field trips.

(f) Fees for instructors invited from institutions other than ones directly connected with the Project.

(2) Support for the above-mentioned expenditures will be reduced annually. The reduced portion of the expenditures will be replaced by the Philippine side.

III. MEASURES TO BE TAKEN BY THE GOVERNMENT OF THE PHILIPPINES

1. The Government of the Philippines will take necessary measures to ensure that the self-reliant operation of the Project will be sustained during and after the period of Japanese technical cooperation, through the full and active involvement in the Project by all related authorities, beneficiary groups and institutions.
2. The Government of the Philippines will ensure that the technologies and knowledge acquired by the Philippine nationals as a result of the Japanese technical cooperation will contribute to the economic and social development of the Republic of the Philippines.
3. The Government of the Philippines will grant in the Republic of the Philippines privileges, exemptions and benefits to the Japanese experts referred to in II-1 above and their families no less favorable than those accorded to experts of third countries working in the Republic of the Philippines under the Colombo Plan Technical Cooperation Scheme.
4. The Government of the Philippines will ensure that the Equipment referred to in II-2 above will be utilized effectively for the implementation of the Project in consultation with the Japanese experts referred to in II of the Annex.
5. The Government of the Philippines will take necessary measures to ensure that the knowledge and experience acquired by Philippine personnel from technical training in Japan will be utilized effectively in the implementation of the Project.
6. In accordance with the laws and regulations in force in the Republic of the Philippines, The Government of the Philippines will take necessary measures to provide at its own expense :
 - (1) Services of Philippine counterpart personnel and administrative personnel as listed in IV of the Annex ;
 - (2) Land, buildings and facilities as listed in V of the Annex;
 - (3) Supply or replacement of machinery, equipment, instruments, vehicles, tools,

spare parts and any other materials necessary for the implementation of the Project other than the Equipment provided through JICA under II-2 above;

7. In accordance with the laws and regulations in force in the Republic of the Philippines, The Government of the Philippines will take necessary measures to assist:

- (1) The Japanese experts for official travels within the Republic of the Philippines;
- (2) The entry of the Japanese experts and their families.

8. In accordance with the laws and regulations in force in the Republic of the Philippines, The Government of the Philippines will take necessary measures to meet :

- (1) Expenses necessary for the transportation within the Republic of the Philippines of the Equipment referred to in II-2 above as well as for the installation, operation and maintenance thereof ;
- (2) Customs duties, internal taxes and any other charges, imposed in the Republic of the Philippines on the Equipment referred to in II-2 above ;
- (3) Running expenses necessary for the implementation of the Project.

IV. ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROJECT

1. Undersecretary for Office for Public Health Services, Department of Health, as the Project Director, will bear overall responsibility for the administration and implementation of the Project.
2. Program Manager, Philippines National AIDS/STD Prevention and Control Program, as Project Manager, will be responsible for the managerial and technical matters of the Project.
3. The Japanese Chief Advisor will provide necessary recommendations and advice to the Project Director and the Project Manager on any matters pertaining to the implementation of the Project.
4. The Japanese experts will give necessary technical guidance and advice to Philippine counterpart personnel on technical matters pertaining to the implementation of the Project.
5. For the effective and successful implementation of technical cooperation for the Project, a Joint Coordinating Committee will be established whose functions and composition are described in VI of the Annex.

V. JOINT EVALUATION

Evaluation of the Project will be conducted jointly by the two Governments through JICA and the authorities concerned of The Government of the Philippines, at the middle and during the last six months of the cooperation term in order to examine the level of achievement.

VI. CLAIMS AGAINST JAPANESE EXPERTS

The Government of the Philippines undertakes to bear claims, if any arises, against the Japanese experts engaged in technical cooperation for the Project resulting from, occurring in the course of, or otherwise connected with the discharge of their official functions in the Republic of the Philippines except for those arising from the willful misconduct or gross negligence of the Japanese experts.

VII. MUTUAL CONSULTATION

There will be mutual consultation between the two Governments on any major issues arising from, or in connection with this Attached Document.

VIII. TERM OF COOPERATION

The duration of the technical cooperation for the Project will be five(5) years from July 1st, 1996.

ANNEX

I. MASTER PLAN

1. Objectives of the Project

(1) Overall Goal:

The overall goal of the Project is to assist the Department of Health in the prevention and control of AIDS in the Philippines.

(2) Project Purpose:

The Project aims at achieving the following objectives;

(1) To establish an AIDS cooperative central laboratory and a core national referral system.

(2) To strengthen the function of AIDS prevention at local public health centers.

2. Activities of the Project

The following activities shall be carried out under the Project;

(1) Establishment of an AIDS cooperative central laboratory and a core national referral system.

a. Cooperative Central Laboratory (CCL)

CCL physical facility and equipment strengthening; organizational capability (bacteriology, virology, serology and others); serological confirmatory testing of HIV and diagnosis of AIDS opportunistic infections; training capability building; surveillance system; etiology-based diagnosis; pertinent research work for the above, monitoring and evaluation.

b. The national referral system

Selection of the sites and their physical and capability strengthening; establishing the referral system by linking the CCL and the selected sites; pertinent research work for the above, monitoring and evaluation.

(2) Strengthening of the function of AIDS prevention at local public health centers.

Selection of the centers and NGOs; their physical and capability strengthening including staff training and provision of equipment; development of IEC materials; pertinent research work for the above, monitoring and evaluation.

III. LIST OF MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT

Machinery and equipment pertaining to :

1. the establishment of the AIDS cooperative central laboratory and a core national referral system;
2. strengthening of the function of AIDS prevention at local public health centers;
3. others mutually agreed upon as necessary ;

The request for the equipment will be made through the submission of an application (A-4) form by The Government of the Philippines on an annual basis.

V. LAND, BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

The followings shall be provided and ensured as Philippine inputs;

1. The satellite laboratory and required assistance /cooperation for up-grading;
2. Commitment of the selected centers, availability of local public health centers and their personnel;
3. Offices and/or office spaces for the Chief Advisor and other Japanese Experts;
4. Operational expenses such as electricity, gas, water, sewage system and others for the AIDS central laboratory;
5. DOH coordination for inter-agency and local government units regarding smooth project implementation.

VI. JOINT COORDINATING COMMITTEE

1. Functions

The Joint Coordinating Committee will meet at least once a year and whenever needed, and work to:

- (1) formulate an annual work plan of the Project.
- (2) review the progress and achievements of the Project.
- (3) discuss and resolve issues arising from or in connection with the Project.

2. Composition

(1) Chairperson:

Undersecretary for Public Health Services

(2) Philippine side:

- (a) Representative from AIDS/STD Unit, DOH;
- (b) Representative from BRL;
- (c) Representative from San Lazaro Hospital;
- (d) Representative from RITM;
- (e) Representatives from selected local governments
- (f) Representatives from NGOs
- (g) Representative from NEDA

(3) Japanese side:

- (a) Chief Advisor
- (b) Coordinator
- (c) Experts
- (d) Resident Representative of JICA Philippine office
- (e) Other personnel to be dispatched by JICA, as necessary




**TENTATIVE SCHEDULE OF IMPLEMENTATION

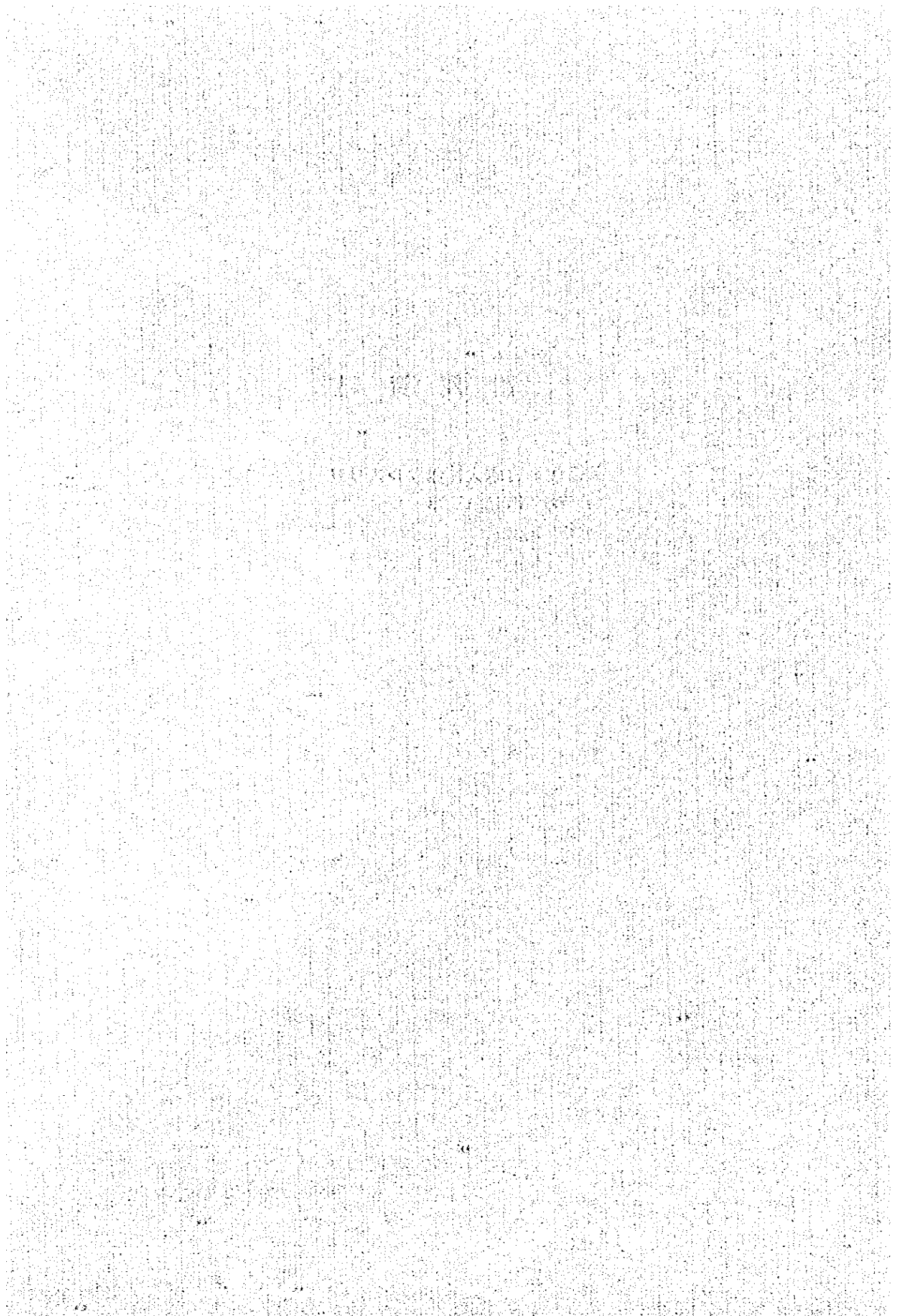

Japan and the DOH join hands to fight HIV/AIDS

A Project Implementation Mission on AIDS has been dispatched to the Philippines as part of the Government of Japan's technical cooperation to the Philippines. The mission is headed by Dr. Akira Oya, former Director-General of the National Institute of Health, Japan. The mission is here to formalize an agreement between the two governments which will establish an AIDS Central Reference Laboratory at the Department of Health (DOH). Improving referential services of laboratory diagnosis of HIV infection is an important element in the overall strategy for the prevention and control of AIDS. The project, which will start in June of this year, is expected to greatly assist social hygiene clinics and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) in their AIDS prevention activities in this country.

Since 1994, the Government of Japan has been actively assisting the DOH in its STD/AIDS Prevention & Control Program by providing HIV screening kits, laboratory, computer and communications equipment which are indispensable in HIV surveillance and the screening of donated blood for transfusions. Japan has also sponsored seminars in this country which stress the importance of strengthening HIV laboratory diagnosis capability as well as the care and management of people infected with HIV/AIDS.

The objective of technical cooperation is human resources development and the transfer of technology. Technical assistance is provided through the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) and involves the acceptance of trainees, the dispatch of experts and the carrying out of survey and research studies.

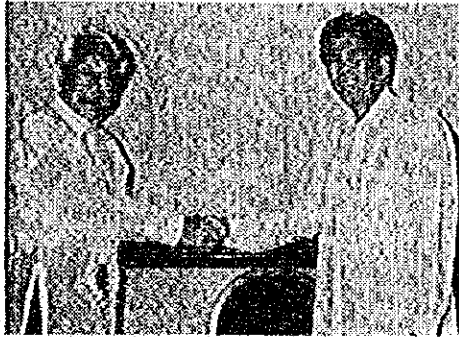

Japan to fund \$8-M AIDS prevention program

THE Japan International Cooperation Agency signed an agreement with the Department of Health to collaborate on the prevention of AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases in the Philippines.

In an interview with TODAY, Dr. Akira Oya, head of the agency's project implementation office, said that it will spend US\$8.5 million in manpower and equipment for the five-year project.

One of the components of the project is the establishment of a central reference laboratory for AIDS. In July a team of Japanese doctors and researchers will set up the laboratory.

which will track the incidence of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection and the screening of blood for transfusion.

Oya said HIV detection facilities in the Philippines are "very poor." Some equipment will be donated by the US government. For instance, a cell sorter from the US Navy will be used in the laboratory.

Although the Philippines has relatively few AIDS cases or even people tested HIV-positive, Oya said the number could grow because of the rise of commercial sex workers and Filipino migrant workers.

As such, the agreement will cover not just detection but also treatment. The number of hospitals that treat HIV-positive persons who have been struck by "opportunistic infections"

like tuberculosis and pneumonia will be increased.

And for the first time, the agency will support the educational and information activities of nongovernment organizations involved in AIDS prevention. "The relationship between the government and the nongovernment organizations is excellent here," Oya observed.

The project is part of an agreement between the United States and Japan in 1994 to cooperate in dealing with global issues like population control and AIDS prevention and control. The two superpowers have agreed to spend a total of US\$12 billion to help developing countries worldwide until the year 2000.
