

#### ATTACHED DOCUMENT

The Government of Japan and the Government of the Republic of Kenya will cooperate with each other in organizing a training course in the field of GPS surveying (hereinafter referred to as "the Course") under JICA's Third Country Training Programme.

The Government of the Republic of Kenya will conduct the Course with the support of the technical cooperation scheme of the Government of Japan .

The Course will be held once a year, from Japanese fiscal year (JFY) 1998 to JFY 2002, subject to annual consultations between both Governments regarding the subject of the Course.

The Course will be conducted in accordance with the followings;

#### 1.TITLE

The Course will be entitled "Seminar on GPS Surveying".

#### 2.PURPOSE

The purpose of the Course is to provide the participants from African countries with an opportunity to acquire new technologies appropriate to African countries in the field of GPS surveying.

#### 3.OBJECTIVES

At the end of the Course, the participants are expected to;

- 3-1 understand fundamental theory of GPS surveying,
- 3-2 carry out GPS static positioning,
- 3-3 carry out GPS kinematic positioning,
- 3-4 carry out data processing / calculations of GPS surveying,

in respective African countries and

3-5 appreciate various applications of GPS surveying.

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#### 4.DURATION

The duration of the course will be approximately one (1) month and the Course for JFY 1998 (hereinafter referred to as "first Course") will be held from November / December, 1998.

#### 5.CURRICULUM

Tentative curriculum of the first Course is attached as ANNEX I.

#### 6.INVITED COUNTRIES

The Governments of the following countries will be invited to apply by nominating applicant(s) for the course:

Botswana, Comoro, Ethiopia, Lesotho, Malawi, Mauritius, Namibia, Seychelles, Swaziland, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia.

#### 7.NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS

The number of participants from the invited countries shall not exceed twelve (12) in total.

And the number of participants from the Republic of Kenya shall not exceed three (3).

#### 8. QUALIFICATIONS OF APPLICANTS

Applicants for the Course are:

- 8-1 to be nominated by their respective governments in accordance with the procedure stipulated in 10-1 below,
- 8-2 to be University graduates, Higher Diploma Holder or to have the equivalent academic background,
- 8-3 to be engaged in surveying ,mapping or related work,
- 8-4 to have the practical experiences of preferably more than five(5) years in the field,
- 8-5 to be under forty (40) years of age in principle,
- 8-6 to have a good command of spoken and written English,
- 8-7 to be citizens of the applying countries, and
- 8-8 to be in good health, both physically and mentally, to complete the Course.

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#### 9. FACILITIES AND INSTITUTIONS

The Course will be given at the KISM .

#### 10. APPLICATION PROCEDURE

- 10-1 A Government applying for the Course on behalf of its nominee should forward five (5) copies of the prescribed application form for each nominee to the Government of the Republic of Kenya through diplomatic channels not later than sixty (60) days
  - before the commencement of the Course.
- 10-2 The Government of the Republic of Kenya will inform the applying Governments, through diplomatic channels, whether or not the applicant(s) is/are accepted to the Course not later than thirty (30) days before the commencement of the Course.

## 11. MEASURE TO BE TAKEN BY THE GOVERNMENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF KENYA AND THE GOVERNMENT OF JAPAN

In organizing and implementing the Course, both Governments will take the following measures in accordance with the relevant laws and regulations in force in each country. The schedule of the first Course implementation is attached as ANNEX II.

#### 11-1 the Government of the Republic of Kenya

- 11-1-1 Ministry of Lands and Settlement
  - (1) To forward the General Information brochures (G.I.) for the Course to the Governments of invited countries through diplomatic channels
  - (2) To receive application forms and forward them to the KISM
  - (3) To notify the results of the selection of participants to the respective Governments through diplomatic channels

#### 11-1-2 KISM

- (1) To formulate the curriculum based on ANNEX I
- (2) To draft and print the G.I.
- (3) To assign an adequate number of its staff as lecturers / instructors for the Course
- (4)To provide its training facilities and equipment for the Course
- (5) To arrange accommodations for participants
- (6) To arrange necessary transportation tickets for participants and to meet and



- (7) To arrange domestic study tour(s) to be included in the Course
- (8) To select participants and to inform the Ministry of Lands and Settlement and JICA Kenya Office of the result of the selection
- (9) To take budgetary measures to bear the expenses necessary for conducting the Course excluding the expenses to be financed by the Government of Japan as ANNEX III
- (10) To issue certificates in consultation with the JICA Kenya Office to the participants who have successfully completed the Course
- (11) To submit a course report to the JICA Kenya Office within thirty (30) days after the termination of the Course
- (12) To submit an official breakdown report of expenditure for the verification thereof within thirty (30) days after the termination of the Course
- (13) To coordinate any matters related to the Course

#### 11-2 The Government of Japan

- (1) To dispatch Japanese short-term expert(s), in accordance with the normal procedures of its technical cooperation scheme, who will give advice to the KISM and deliver some of the lectures. This, however, is subject to the JICA budget available for this purpose and to the number of suitable expert(s) in Japan. The KISM is expected to pre-inform the JICA Kenya Office of requests for JICA short-term expert(s) not later than the annual consultation.
- (2) To bear the following expenses through JICA (Tentative Estimated Expenses for JFY 1998 to be borne by the Governments of Japan and the Republic of Kenya is attached as ANNEX III )
- a) Expenses for international economy-class flight fare, accommodation, per-diem and medical insurance premiums for participants
- b) Expenses of the KISM for honoraria for external lecturers, arrangement of study tour, expendable supplies, copies and reprints.



#### 12.PROCEDURE FOR REMITTANCE AND EXPENDITURE

Remittance of funds for expenses to be borne by the Government of Japan and the expenditure thereof will be arranged in accordance with the following procedures;

- 12-1 The KISM will open a bank account for the Course in the Republic of Kenya to receive the funds remitted by JICA, and inform the JICA Kenya Office of the name of the bank, the account code number and the name of the account holder.
- 12-2 The KISM will submit to the JICA Kenya Office a bill of estimate for the expenses to be borne by the Government of Japan not later than sixty (60) days before the commencement of the Course.
- 12-3 JICA will assess the bill of estimate and remit the assessed amount to the account referred in 12-1 above within thirty(30) days after the receipt of the bill of estimate.
- 12-4 The KISM will submit to the JICA Kenya Office an official breakdown report of expenditure within thirty (30) days after the termination of the Course.
- 12-5 In case there is any unspent remainder of the amount remitted by JICA, the KISM will reimburse the unspent amount to JICA in accordance with the advice given by JICA Kenya Office. The funds allocated for the transportation, accommodation, per-diem and medical insurance premiums shall not be appropriated for any other purposes.
- 12-6 When requested by JICA, the KISM will make available for JICA's reference all the receipts and other documentary evidences necessary to verify the expenditures stated in 12-4 above.



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#### **PREFACE**

Kenya Institute of Surveying and Mapping (KISM) is a Government institute of higher learning commissioned to undertake training programmes in the field of Surveying and mapping. KISM was established in 1994 with the assistance of the Japanese Government and operates as a middle level Institute of learning offering both Diploma and higher Diploma training programmes in four disciplines namely Land Surveying, Photogrammetry and Remote Sensing, Cartography and Map reproduction. Among other activities to undertaken by KISM is to conduct short term training courses on specialized areas and in particular to focus on new technological developments in the field of Surveying and mapping.

Right from inception of KISM the vision of sharing knowledge acquired or otherwise developed at the Institute was considered a crucial activity and in this regard we equally recognize the need to co-operate with other Institutions, both national and International based. In an effort to fulfill the above mandate the Institute in conjunction with JICA is proposing to offer a Third Country Group Training Programme on GPS Surveying to be held at KISM in August 1998.

The Department to implement this Programme at the Institute is that of Land Surveying. The Department has the necessary capacity in human, laboratory and equipment resource to adequately conduct the course. Based on a survey conducted by the Department GPS Surveying among the other areas ranks highly in terms of demand and happens to be the most important and very current technology study areas for the promotion of infrastructure development and effective planning.

#### I. COURSE OUTLINE

#### 1. Duration:

From 03rd August 1998 to 28th August 1998

2. Number of participants: 13

#### 3. Purpose:

The purpose of the course is to provide the participants from the countries of East, Central and Southern Africa with an opportunity to upgrade themselves in modern positioning technology (as it applies to surveying) by GPS and its Analysis.

#### 4. Objectives

At the end of the course, the participants are expected to:

- (1) understand the fundamental theory of GPS Surveying,
- (2) carry out GPS static positioning
- (3) carry out GPS kinematic positioning
- (4) Carry out data processing / calculations of GPS observations,
- (5) Appreciate the effectiveness of GPS surveying in Africa

#### 5. Programme summary

- (1) Introduction to GPS survey activities with specific reference to Africa.
- (2) Theory behind the satellite based positioning with emphasis to GPS system.
- (3) Use of appropriate technology in data handling, processing and analysis.
- (4) Appraisal of GPS activities in Kenya with reference to selected sites along the Rift valley, including field trips whereby in situ observations shall be taken.

#### 6. Training Venue

The training venue will be at the Kenya Institute of Surveying and Mapping.

#### 7. Certificate

Participants who successfully complete the course will be awarded a certificate of participation by JICA/KISM.

#### II. CONDITION OF APPLICATION

#### 1. Qualification of Applicant

The Training Programmes Committee (TPC) in the Institute would like to invite suitable qualified personnel from technical colleges and universities, research institutes and other related public institutions. The requirements for participants are as follows;

- (1) to be nominated by their respective Governments,
- (2) to be presently engaged in all fields related to Surveying/Geoinformatics;
- (3) to have a *University degree or a Diploma*, with at least three years of technical working experience in Geodetic surveying and other related areas,
- (4) be in good health to undergo the course of training. Pregnancy is regarded as discualifying condition.

#### 2. Procedure for Application

- (1) Application forms, A-3 (Annex III), together with a country report (Annex II) should be filled in duplicate for each candidate and returned to KISM on behalf of the Government of the Republic of Kenya by the end of June, 1998.
- (2) KISM on behalf of the Government of the Republic of Kenya will inform the nominees, in July, 1998.

#### 3. Country Report

Participants are required to prepare a report on the present situation of their own field of study. This Country Report should be typewritten in accordance with the attached form (Annex II) and submitted to KISM together with the application. The Country Reports are used during the training courses, especially for comparative studies.

#### III. ALLOWANCES AND EXPENSES

- (1) JICA will provide economy-class air travel return tickets between participant's National Airport and Jomo Kenyatta International Air by Prepaid Ticket Advice (PTA) to the participants. However, the transportation fee between participant's home area and participant's National Airport, and Airport Tax in both participant's National Airport and Jomo Kenyatta International Airport will be met by the participant.
- (2) A living allowance of Kshs. 1,200 per day will be provided during the course to participants from outside Kenya. This allowance will cover local transportation and other daily personal expenses. Local participants should arrange with their respective organizations for their living allowances.
- (3) IICA will provide a medical insurance for the participants from outside Kenya during their stay in Kenya.
- (4) The dependant(s) of participants are not entitled to the above allowances. Therefore, participants are advised not to bring any dependent(s).

#### IV. ACCOMMODATION

- (1) Accommodation for participants from outside Kenya will be arranged and provided at an appropriate hotel within the neighbourhood of the institute.
- (2) Local participants should arrange with their respective organizations for their accommodation.

#### V. OTHER INFORMATION

- (1) The climate in Nairobi is a tropical type requiring simple clothing. But since Nairobi is at a relatively high altitude, the climate may become chilly occasionally and therefore, participants are advised to bring some warm clothing.
- (2) KISM is situated 14Km North East of Nairobi City on Nairobi-Thika Road at Ruaraka. KISM is located in a sub-district hosting several other training Institutions namely Kenya Utalli College, National Youth Service Engineering Institute, National Youth Service Secretarial college and the Monetary Institute. In this sub-district most facilities and services are available and within reach.
- (3) Participants are required to arrive in Kenya on the date designated by the Institute after confirmation of acceptance as mentioned in section 11.2.(3). However, the final date will be confirmed by the PTA sent to the participants.
- (4) On arrival at Jomo Kenyatta International Airport in Nairobi, the participants are requested to comply with the following arrival procedures.
  - (a) When quarantine, immigration and customs clearance procedures have been completed, the participants will be met by KISM official carrying a placard with the name(s) of the participants(s).
  - (b) Those arriving on flights other than originally booked, should inform KISM beforehand
- (5) Participants are required to strictly observe the laws of Kenya.
- (6) Participants are required to strictly observe the Course schedule.
- (7) Applications to extend the period of stay will not be accepted.
- (8) Participants are requested to follow the return trip schedule designated by JICA/KISM.
