CHAPTER 4 PROJECT EVALUATION AND RECOMMENDATION

4.1 Project Effect

(1) Direct Effect

The following direct effects will be anticipated by the implementation of the Project.

- Some facilities of the former Market were forced to move out since the Dar es Salaam Port Channel Expansion Project had been executed. Therefore, the Market has not been functioning well. By implementing the Project, the Market will recover its function fully, resulting in improving fishery circulation.
- Water and sewage facilities have not been established in the Market, yet. Thus, the sanitary conditions in the Market have been bad. Such bad sanitary conditions will improve by the implementation of the Project.
- A time-consuming fish landing with fish retail activities in the sun is one of the
 reasons why the quantity of some of the fish catch becomes bad. Establishing a
 fish landing wharf and sufficient fishery facilities will contribute to improving
 the quality of fish catch.

(2) Indirect Effect

Banda Beach Market has been functioning as a market, serving fish and grocery foods to the public. In addition to the direct effects, the following indirect effects will be anticipated by the implementation of the Project.

- With the implementation of the Project, fresh fish and vegetables will be served to the 1.36 million Dar es Salaam public people, contributing to the improvement of their health.
- More people will gather in the Market and more sales will be expected, creating job opportunities and increasing revenues.

4.2 Need for Technical Cooperation

In order to operate and manage the Market effectively, DCC, the executing agency after the completion of the Project, and a private company, which will be sub-contracted, will establish regulations in advance, specifying selection of shops, tariffs, and usage of the facilities.

DCC has experienced subcontracting management work to a private company so that DCC can utilize its know-how to this Project. Since such private company has mastered such work, no problems for the management are expected. In Tanzania,

auction taxes are collected as revenues to the Government. Thus, no financial problems will be expected. However, since neither the Government nor a private company has dealt with fresh fish so far, some assistance will be necessary before commencing the operation. No other projects cover the same scope of this Project.

4.3 Recommendations

This Project will bring a variety of direct and indirect effects, contributing to the improving fishery productions, increasing fishermen's income and upgrading environment as mentioned in the preceding section. Moreover, the Project will enhance the development of the fishery sector in Tanzania and contribute to activating the local economy. Hence, implementation of the Project is recommended as a Japan's grant aid project.

After the completion of the Project, to operate the Market smoothly and effectively, the following recommendations need to be fully considered.

- The facilities will be controlled by a steering committee, which consists of DCC, market users, and representative of an administrative company. DCC have experienced subcontracting their works to private companies in a variety of enterprises. No serious problems are expected on that. However, DCC have no experience administrating fresh fish. Therefore, technical assistance in dealing with fresh fish will be necessary.
- Not all tariffs have been collected from market users except for those on ship registrations and wholesales. In the beginning of the operation at the new Market, it is anticipated that a subsidy from DCC be necessary to supplement a deficit in revenues. In order to operate the Market efficiently, it is mandatory to set up a new system to collect new tariffs and levy from the market users surely as early as possible.
- The number of existing shops is about 500. Most of the owners of retail shops and restaurants wish to place their shops at the new Market. Therefore, in selecting lease shops, it is necessary to set up some selection process and criteria.
- With the construction of a stair-type fish landing wharf, medium size fishing ships will use it to unload their fish catch, while small ships are expected to use the original unloading method by mooring in the beach. Considering the existing custom, it is difficult for all the fishermen to use the new wharf. It is recommended that using the new fish landing wharf be gradually introduced to all the fishermen.

- Once water supply and sewage facilities are developed, sanitary conditions will
 improve accordingly. However, that will not be achieved without cooperation
 with the market users. Thus, it is necessary to set up some rules and market
 users should obey the rules.
- Since it is impossible to accommodate all the necessary facilities on the reclamation area, the area beyond Ocean Road should be used for constructing some facilities. Although the area had been a property of a hotel, the land right was revoked. In the future, such issue should be swiftly cleared among the related organizations.
