





I. COOPERATION BETWEEN BOTH GOVERNMENTS


1. The Government of Japan and the Government of the Republic of Indonesia will cooperate with each other in implementing the Joint Study Project on the Center for Japanese Studies at the University of Indonesia (hereinafter referred to as "the Project"), for the purpose of strengthening the capability of the Center as a strong research institute which can help to promote Japanese Studies in Indonesia.
2. The Project will be implemented in accordance with the Master Plan, which is given in ANNEX I.

II. DISPATCH OF JAPANESE EXPERTS

1. In accordance with the laws and regulations in force in Japan, the government of Japan will take necessary measures through JICA to provide at its own expense the services of Japanese experts as listed in ANNEX II through normal procedures under the Technical Cooperation Scheme of the Government of Japan.
2. The Japanese experts referred to in 1 above will be granted in the Republic of Indonesia exemptions and benefits no less favorable than those granted to the experts of third countries or of international organizations performing similar missions.

III. PROVISION OF MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT

1. In accordance with the laws and regulations in force in Japan, the Government of Japan will take necessary measures through JICA to provide, at its own expense, such machinery, equipment and other materials necessary for the implementation of the Project as listed in ANNEX IV through normal procedures under the Technical Cooperation Scheme of the Government of Japan
2. The articles referred to in 1 above will become the property of the Government of the



Republic of Indonesia upon being delivered to the Indonesian authorities concerned at the ports and/or airports of disembarkation, and will be utilized exclusively for implementation of the Project in consultation with the Japanese experts referred to in ANNEX II.

IV. TRAINING OF THE INDONESIAN PERSONNEL IN JAPAN

1. In accordance with the laws and regulations in force in Japan, the Government of Japan will take necessary measures through JICA to receive, at its own expense, Indonesian personnel connected with the Project for the purpose of technical training (such as gaining Master's degrees or advancement of research in Japan-related studies) in Japan through normal procedures under the Technical Cooperation Scheme of the Government of Japan.
2. The Government of the Republic of Indonesia will take necessary measures to ensure that the knowledge and experience acquired by Indonesian personnel from technical training in Japan will be utilized effectively for the implementation of the Project.

V. LOCAL EXPENSES

A budget to meet the local expenses necessary for the implementation of the Joint Study Project will be provided to the Japanese experts by JICA in accordance with the laws and regulations in force in Japan. The budget, which is to be used exclusively for the implementation of the Project, will be managed by a Japanese expert designated by JICA

VI. DATA OWNERSHIP AND PUBLICATIONS

The data accumulated through the Project will be jointly owned by the participating organizations (JICA and the University of Indonesia). When reports or documentation concerning the Project are compiled, it is to be mentioned that the Project has been implemented by JICA and the Center for Japanese Studies of the University of Indonesia as a Technical Cooperation Project between the Government of Japan and the Government of the Republic of Indonesia.

VII. MEASURES TO BE TAKEN BY THE GOVERNMENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF INDONESIA


1. In accordance with the laws and regulations in force in the Republic of Indonesia, the Government of the Republic of Indonesia will take necessary measures to provide at its own expense:
 - (1) Services of the Indonesian counterpart personnel and administrative personnel;
 - (2) Supply or replacement of machinery, equipment, instruments, vehicles, tools, spare parts and any other materials necessary for the implementation of the Project other than those provided through JICA under III above;
 - (3) Urban transportation facilities for Japanese experts;
 - (4) Facilities necessary for maintenance, protection and utilization of the articles listed in ANNEX IV.

2. In accordance with the laws and regulations in force in the Republic of Indonesia, the Government of the Republic of Indonesia will take necessary measures to meet:
 - (1) Expenses necessary for transportation within the Republic of Indonesia of the articles referred to in III above as well as for the installation, operation and maintenance thereof;
 - (2) Custom duties, internal taxes and any other charges imposed in the Republic of Indonesia on the articles referred to in III above.
 - (3) All local expenses necessary for the implementation of the Project other than those provided through JICA under V above.

VIII. ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROJECT

The leader of the Japanese Project Team and the leader of the Indonesian Project Team will collaboratively assume overall responsibility for the implementation of the Project.

(The Resident Representative of JICA in the Republic of Indonesia will undertake the role of



advisor and coordinator for the successful implementation of the Project.)

IX. CLAIMS AGAINST JAPANESE EXPERTS

The Government of the Republic of Indonesia will undertake to bear claims, if any arise, against the Japanese experts engaged in the Project resulting from, occurring in the course of, or otherwise connected with the discharge of their official functions in the Republic of Indonesia except for those arising from the willful misconduct or gross negligence of the Japanese experts.

X. MUTUAL CONSULTATION

There will be mutual consultation between the two Governments on any major issues arising from, or in connection with, this Attached Document.

XI. TERMS OF COOPERATION

The duration of technical cooperation for the Project under this Attachment Document will be from January 10, 2001 to January 9, 2004.

ANNEX I MASTER PLAN

1. BACKGROUND

To promote Japanese studies in Indonesia, the Center for Japanese Studies was built with grant aid from Japan on the campus of the University of Indonesia in 1995. The Center focused its activities on conducting research in the area of social science. In order to improve the Center's capability to conduct research and to improve management of the Center, the Government of Indonesia asked Japan to conduct technical cooperation for joint studies.

The Joint Study Project was implemented from 1997 to 2000. The Project determined that the Center is a core research institute and a key actor for promotion of Japanese studies. However, according to the evaluation team, which was sent in April 2000, further efforts should be made in establishing a sustainable center that is able to develop human resources as well as maintain financial stability.

On the other hand, Japanese studies have been gaining importance as efforts continue to help Indonesia recover from the economic crisis that struck in 1997. In this respect, the Center is expected to function as a think-tank to help in the reconstruction of the country. Under these circumstances, continued cooperation was considered to be necessary for building a strong research institution as well as for building a network of Japanese studies in Indonesia.

2. OBJECTIVES OF THE PROJECT

This Joint Study Project aims to promote Japanese studies in the Republic of Indonesia in order to contribute to Indonesia's national development, with the overall goal of providing wider and well articulated knowledge of Japan throughout Indonesian society. This is to be done by focusing on study of social science and contemporary developments in Japanese society. To fulfill this purpose, a major effort will be made to establish the Center for Japanese Studies at the University of Indonesia as a strong research institution by strengthening the Center's human resources development and organizational management capabilities as well as by establishing its self-development potential. This is to be achieved through the joint operations of Japanese experts and research institutions and through the utilization of long-

term training and other schemes implemented by JICA.

The main outputs of Phase II of this Joint Study Project will be:

- 2-1. To improve the quality of research conducted at the Center.
- 2-2. To promote research activities of individual researchers who are involved in Japanese studies at the Center.
- 2-3. To establish the Center as a strong academic institute in social sciences as to provide intellectual service to the outside.
- 2-4. To strengthen research administration of the Center.
- 2-5. To utilize the library resource of the Center.

3. STUDY FRAMEWORK

3-1. ACTIVITIES

The following activities will be undertaken in order to achieve the objectives mentioned in Section 2.

- 3-1-1. Organize study groups according to the study themes.(2-1)
- 3-1-2. Make plans for research activity including methodology of research and guidance.(2-1)
- 3-1-3. Make plans for training young researchers.(2-2)
- 3-1-4. Give guidance and instructions according to the plans above (2-2).
- 3-1-5. Conduct seminars open to the public.(2-3)
- 3-1-6. Provide training to the research administration staff.(2-4)
- 3-1-7. Improve conditions in the library.(2-5)

3-2. Proposed Research Topics

Group A: Industrial Development and Society

The importance of this topic is clear in terms of its significance to the economic development of Indonesia. Selection of this topic is thought to be particularly appropriate in consideration



of the degree to which the demand for development of medium- and small-sized enterprises and local industries in addition to large-scale manufacturers is emphasized under current economic development theory.

(A-1) Medium and Small-scale Enterprises and Economic Development

Research will focus primarily on the machinery and metals industries. It will involve joint study of the machinery and metals manufacturing region of Java and comparative study of the same industries in Japan.

(A-2) Metropolitan Manufacturing Industries

Comparison of the management styles used by Japan-affiliated enterprises operating in Indonesia and Indonesian enterprises. Research will focus mainly on enterprises in and around Jakarta.

(A-3) Handicrafts and Socio-cultural Change

Comparative study of the traditional textile industry in Java and the textile industry in Japan.

Group B: Political System and International Relations

Research will attempt to gain comprehensive understanding of the political and economic aspects of the relationship between Indonesia and Japan. This topic is thought to have high urgency when viewed against the current state of democratization in Indonesia.

(B-1) Authoritarian Regime and Political Change

Indonesia's political structure has seen dramatic changes. While reviewing the political and economic relationship between Japan and Indonesia, research will clarify the effect changes in this relationship will have on the shifting political situation within Indonesia.

(B-2) Japanese ODA to Indonesia

This topic is a continuation of the research conducted in Phase I. While previous research looked at the institutional and policy aspects of Japanese ODA to Indonesia, this phase will involve empirical research that examines individual examples of ODA, and will include on-site studies of ODA projects.


Group C: Urbanization and Social Life

(C-1) Social Change in Suburban Areas

Continuation of research conducted in Phase I. Research will continue to involve comparative studies of social changes occurring in the metropolitan areas surrounding Tokyo and Jakarta. Standardized data have already been collected, and research will involve further analysis of these data along with additional study where needed.

(C-2) Compilation of a Japanese-Indonesian Dictionary for Social Studies.

Compilation of a dictionary for social studies in Bahasa Indonesia, Japanese and English for use by Indonesian researchers of Japan as well as businesspersons in Indonesia who have an interest in Japan. The dictionary will be accessible on the Internet.
