

10 . Results of Socio-economic Survey

Socio Economic Field Survey and Study at Oyo State

1 .Background of Field Survey and the Method

For the construction of Boreholes at 16 LGAs in Oyo State, we have done Socio economic survey at the proposed communities. For selection of the appropriate communities in 220 communities, we made field survey on the basis of socio economic factors.

We have done the Field survey for getting some data on,

- 1) Present water resources and its condition
- 2) O&M of Water Users associations or water board at communities
- 3) Community ownership on water supply and sanitation
- 4) Participation on Borehole construction at community
- 5) Water users association (WATSAN Committee at Community level) and their participating and establishing board.
- 6) Taking part of activities at Water board (WATSAN Committee at Community level)
- 7) Population, Community structure, Income at household
- 8) Farmers (Male, Female) household activity and analyzing its working hours
- 9) Disease at community and its treatment

Before implementing survey, we made the original questionnaires and reviewed and modified the questionnaire sheet after pre-survey.

Two kinds of surveys are implemented as follows,

- 1) Japanese consultant and Staffs at Oyo State WATSAN made an Interviews in some Communities and some LGAs
- 2) Local consultant made Field survey in Community and LGAs

The duration of survey is,

- 1) Japanese consultant took 2 weeks for NGOs at Ibadan, Oyo state ministries and other institute. For UNICEF it took 3days. It took 3 weeks for Interview at the communities in some LGAs in Oyo State.
- 2) Local consultant took first 5 days for preparation for Interviews, For Interviews at the Communities and LGAs, they spent 3 weeks. For analyzing their data and final report, it took 5 days.

The report is written,

- 1) Community level and 2) LGA level

2. Summary of Field Study

Community level

The numbers of population at communities are found different between the data prepared by Oyo State WATSAN and the data collected by consultants. The Oyo State WATSAN got their population data from Global 2000. The last population census was made in 1991 and since then, no national population census has been made. Nowadays they estimate the population from the data in 1991 census. Simply, they progressively add 3 percent a year. The numbers of Guneaworm patients in communities are mostly less than the data given.

It seems that the filtration net and *alum* (chemical: kills germs), which were delivered by UNICEF and GLOBAL 2000 are very effective and reduced the Guneaworm patients in community. But most communities strongly requested to get "Clean water" for their own. They almost responded to our questionnaires with "Yes", it means that they are willing to pay out for "Clean water". They are willing to pay out not only for "Clean water" but also for some contribution on Borehole construction.

In annual income survey at community, there are very different between communities so that we have to give an attention to "Water fee". (contribution)

We often observed that at community, the more income they get, the more contribution they make for special occasion like as community festival.

Also we observed there are many cases of "Polygamy" in Yorba society. A man has two (2) to three (3) wives, sometimes four (4) and they live same compound or in houses nearby. There are many large households at community in Oyo State. Annual income of farmers in Oyo State vary between N4,000(US dollar \$ 30) and N40,000(US Dollar \$ 300). Major diseases at community in Oyo State are Malaria, simple injuries with no blood, diarrhea, measles and pneumonia. (Not many cases are shown on HIV/AIDS. We assume no checking system has been made.)

"Fetching water" is mainly done by ladies (under 35 years old) and children.

Many villagers complete at Primary school or drop out from the Primary school. There are a few villagers who went to Secondary school.

Most villagers at community are very aware that they are infected Guneaworm from contaminated water.

LGA level

Out of 16 LGAs, we found six (6) LGAs made some collaboration with Oyo State WATSAN at their work on Water and Sanitation services. Those LGAs are, 1) Ibarapa

Central,2) Ibarapa North, 3) Iseyin, 4) Oyo East , 5) Akinyele , 6) Orire. Other LGAs are not well collaborated with Oyo State WATSAN. Some cases, we found there is no LWC formed, in other cases LWC are formed but were not activated. We observed many LWC are not well functional. We found collaboration between Oyo State WATSAN and LWC depends on the endowments of LGA WATSAN Coordinator at LGAs. Those coordinators make big role of those collaboration.

At LGA there are several plumber and kinds of technicians at water work.

But in many cases, those staffs don't support on maintenance at community level.

The annual budget on Water and Sanitation work at LGAs in Oyo State are about N 5,000,000.in the year of 2000 and its shares 2.2 % among the expenditure of LGA total budget. But it is not sure yet that those amounts were spent as schedules because we sometimes met Civil Servant go-slow work at several LGAs by Government late payment. Between LGAs, there are different financial situation. Those four (4) LGAs as Atiba, Surulere, Ibarapa East, and Oorelope are considered the Poorer LGAs than neighboring LGAs by officers themselves.

Some results in survey are,

1) The present water resources

In rainy season they fetch water from pond and use rainwater.

In dry season they fetch water pond, running stream and borehole near-by.

2) The present O&M at VWC

There are few cases of collecting "Water fee" (Contribution) but fund are not well kept. Many VWC are not well functioned so that it takes 3 weeks to 2 months for repairs of borehole if breakdown.

3) The people's awareness on Water supply and Hygiene environment

Most villagers well understand that they are infected Guneaworm from contaminated water. Once they are infected Guneaworm, many of them directly go and request their treatment to Village Health worker.

4) Participation on Borehole construction at community

Most of Communities are eager to have boreholes within their communities' .For getting boreholes, they are willing to contribute some fund and to share some work of construction borehole.

5) Present VWC and Establishment of Committee

It is very difficult to find the well-operated VWC at LGAs in Oyo State though VWC

members are nominated and listed on paper. They understand its necessity of VWC in their communities but don't have a skill of planning and working in their committee.

6) Their will of participating to VWC

They recognize important role of VWC at community for O&M of borehole at their community. They are really willing to operate committee if they have a good supervision.

7) Population, Community structure and Annual income

In most community, the numbers of children are same as it of adults. So we have to consider the numbers of children in community for Hygiene education.

8) Farmers (Male, Female) household activity and analyzing its working hours

Average hours of domestic work of women are 3-4 hours a day. They do washing cloths in 2-3 hours at a time and 2-3 times a week.

Average working hours at their firms are less than 6-8 hours a day.

They spend a time at their home after firm in week day.

9) Major diseases at Oyo State

Malaria, simple injuries with no blood, diarrhea, measles and pneumonia. (Not many cases are shown on HIV/AIDS. We assume no checking system has been made.)
