Tax Related

21. Real Property Tax Administration

- **Description**

Real-property taxation involves three basic stages. First is the inventory of the tax base. Here, LGUs make actual field inspection and record specific characteristics and owners of parcels of real property located within a certain jurisdiction. Based on this information, LGUs prepare a schedule of current and fair market values of all types of real properties. The Provincial Sanggunian approves this schedule for application. Second, LGUs appraise each owner's real property on the basis of the schedule. Thereafter, LGUs assess the properties based on the assessment levels provided in the Local Government Code. Finally, LGUs compute owners' tax liabilities by applying the tax rate prescribed by the local Sanggunian. The LGUs then send notices of tax liabilities to property owners.

- **Procedures for filing Real Property Tax**

1. Secure a copy of any of the following:
 - Last year's payment receipt
 - Old assessment
 - Declaration of property
 - Property's TCT
2. Proceed to the local assessor for proper assessment.
Please take note of the following:
 - All arrears will be computed
 - Choose from the type of payments (Annual, Semi-annual, Quarterly)
 - Do not deal with fixers
3. Proceed to the local cashier for proper payment

22. Business Permits and Licensing

- **Description**

The business permit and licensing is one of the major tax collection functions of the Local Government Unit. The collection on business permits and licenses, being the primary source of the Municipality's income lay the benchmark from which the plans and programs is established. The tax computation is based on the gross annual income of a business entity on some other fees. A newly established business tax due computation is based on their capital outlay. They can choose from annual, semi-annual and quarterly payments of tax dues.

- **Procedures for securing Business Permit and License**

1. Secure a copy of the following:
 - Tax ID of the Business
 - Business Name Registration
 - Capital Outlay Statement
 - Floor Plan of the establishment
 - Number and size of signboards
 - Health Permit
2. Proceed to the business licensing section
Please take note of the following:
 - Choose from the type of payments (Annual, Semi-annual, Quarterly)
 - An inspector will go to your establishment for verification
 - Do not deal with fixers
3. Proceed to the local cashier for proper payment
4. Wait within three to four days present your O.R. to the business licensing section for the release of your permit

23. Community Tax

- **Description**

Community Tax or others calls this as residence certificate. This is usually used for documentation purposes. Any residence of the Municipality is required to secure this certificate yearly. The minimum fee is five pesos, if a person is working; an additional one peso for every 1,000 pesos of his gross annual income is added. This is secured during the first month of the year. Income generated from this are usually added to finance programs and projects of the Municipality.

- **Procedures for securing a Community Tax Certificate**
 1. Secure a copy of the following:
 - Individual Tax ID number
 - W2 from employer
 - Birth date
 2. Proceed to the business licensing section for assessment
 3. Proceed to the local cashier for proper payment and validation
 4. Your certificate will be released by the cashier

Civil Registry

24. Birth Certificates

- **Description**

Registration of live birth or birth certificate is a very important document needed by every citizen. This is usually a requirement for school, employment, marriage, passport and many other things. If authenticity can only be verified through the civil registrar. If you are born in this Municipality, you will have to secure this document from the Municipal civil registrar. They issue a certified true copy of this document, if your birth is indeed registered this application and payment of the fee.

- **Procedures for securing a Birth Certificate**

1. Secure an application from the Civil Registrar
Please be ready to supply the following information:
 - Your complete registered name
 - Birth date
 - Name of parents
 - Where you were born
2. Proceed to the local cashier for the payment of fees
3. Present your official receipt to the Civil Registrar along with your application
4. Come back within 2 days to get your certified true copy of your birth certificate

25. Marriage License

- **Description**

Every residence getting married needs to apply for a license to get married. This is a primary requirement of any church or civil court that will commence the marriage. Before you can secure a license, your name and that of your spouse to be will be posted on the Municipal Bulletin board. If there are no valid objections from local residence the license could be issued. Another requirement for you and your spouse to be is to attend a seminar on family planning from your local health center.

- **Procedures for securing a Marriage License**

1. Secure an application from the Civil Registrar
Please be ready to supply the following requirement:
 - Both of your Birth certificate
 - Parental consent if below 21 years old
2. Proceed to the local cashier for the payment of fees
3. Attend the family planning seminar at your local health center
4. Wait for three weeks to secure your license.

26. Death Certificate

- **Description**

Death is very sad thing that could happen to a member of a family. Securing a death certificate facilitates whatever benefits or inheritance you can get out of this sad occurrence. This legitimizes any transfer of properties or assets one could leave behind. This is also required should the spouse left behind wants to get married again.

- **Procedures for securing a Death Certificate**

1. Secure an application form from the Civil Registrar
2. Proceed to the local cashier for the payment of fees
3. Present your receipt and application form to the civil registrar
4. Wait for 2 days to secure the certificate.

27. PHILIPPINE GEOTHERMAL, INC. (PGI)

Calauan, Laguna has a special zone for geothermal development. Barangay Limao is one of the communities within the Makling – Banahaw (Mak – Ban) Geothermal area. More than 600 kms. of land owned by National Power Corporation is located in said barangay.

The Mak – Ban field also straddles portions of the municipalities of Bay, Laguna and of Sto. Tomas, Batangas and parts of the Makiling Forest Reserve and of Mt. Banahaw Forest Reserve in Quezon province.

Philippine Geothermal Inc. has been operating the Mak – Ban Geothermal field since 1973, supplying steam to National Power Corporation (NPC) Power Plants.

The generating capacity has risen to 426 MW houses in six separate power stations within the geothermal field.

The Mak – Ban facility is essential in supporting 850,000 households based on an average monthly household consumption of 30 kwh on providing power to the equivalent of 12 industrial estates, each the size of Cavite Export Processing Zone.

28. HOUSING

Calauan is the site of one of the biggest housing projects of the National Housing Authority. The total project area of 107,2234 hectares in Barangays Dayap and Sto. Tomas is expected to generate 7250 residential lots.

The NHA – Calauan Housing Project, Site 1 located at Brgy. Dayap is ready for disposition to qualified beneficiaries of the municipality of Calauan and nearby municipalities. Packages with housing unit (Row House 24, Row House 30) and lots only (Social A – 40 sq.m., Social Lot B – 60 sq.m. and Economic Lot – 80 sq.m.) shall be disposed thru mortgage take-out with the Home Development Mutual Fund (HDMF) in accordance with the Memorandum of Agreement exacted by and among the NHA, HDMF and the municipalities of Calauan, Nagcarlan, Los Baños, Bay, Victoria and Pila, all in Laguna.

F. Center for Rural Technology Development (CRTD)

In 1979, Philippine Business for Social Progress (PBSP) established the **Center for Rural Technology Development** (CRTD) in Calauan, Laguna to serve as a laboratory for testing, validating and disseminating technologies appropriate for lowland farming.

CRTD has, since, developed farming systems designed to optimize the use of land-providing ample yield so that farmers' economic well-being can be improved. CRTD has developed the BUKHAY ("Bukid ng Buhay" or Farm of Life) farming system, which involves farm diversification to increase incomes.

As the technology and development dissemination arm of PBSP, CRTD develops appropriate agri-based technologies that have been identified as critical to the implementation of PBSP's Area Resource Management (ARM) program in 13 provinces across the country. Specifically, CRTD identifies appropriate product mixes for a given area to optimize the use of farmlands. At present, the Center is testing and commercializing various modules in its Appropriate Technology Farm (ATF). It also conducts commodity testing of high value crops and off-season vegetables.

As technologies are proven to be economically viable, CRTD disseminates these to farmers at the Training Center in Laguna, and in the various areas where PBSP operates. Technology manuals and training courses are also developed.

Rationale

CRTD maintains a training center in Brgy. San Isidro, Calauan, Laguna that serves as a venue for in-house seminars and trainings of the Foundation staff and for other interested institutions or groups.

Description

The CRTD training center has a conference hall that can accommodate 75 persons, five function rooms, dormitories, and audio-visual equipment and training facilities.

The Center has the following facilities:

H. NATIONAL DAIRY AUTHORITY (NDA)

Calauan is the site of a Dairy Processing Plant, to accelerate the development of the local dairy industry in Laguna, a joint Memorandum of Agreement between the Provincial Government of Laguna and the National Dairy Authority (NDA) and the *Katipunan ng Kooperatiba ng Maggagatas, Inc. (KKMI)* was signed in 2002 for the construction of a dairy processing plant in the Provincial Nursery in Barangay Lamot II, Calauan, Laguna.

The NDA, a government owned and controlled corporation is extending financial assistance for the construction of the facility and would extend technical supervision and monitoring of the plant.

The KKMI, a duly registered cooperative shall be responsible of the day-to-day operations and maintenance of the plant.

The provincial government allowed the utilization of the 2000 sq.m. area of the provincial nursery as plant site.

At present, construction is on – going. The said facility would be a big help to the dairy farmers of Calauan and other farmers of the province.

3. Getting Around

The central business district (CBD) is situated in the heart of the Poblacion area specifically along the intersection of Barangay Kanluran and Barangay Silangan. Most of the commercial activities are concentrated in these areas alongside with the Public Market.

Construction of business establishments are on - going in the declared commercial areas in Barangay Masiit specifically on areas along the Calauan - Bay provincial road about two lots depth on both sides extending about 900 meters northwards from the urban core/CBD boundaries.

Based on the records of the Business and License Division of the Municipal Government, there is a total of 406 registered commercial establishments as of December 2002 of these, 77% are engaged in wholesale/retail trade, 18.2% render business and personal services, 1.5% are into manufacturing and 3% comprise financial institutions.

2. Products

There are two (2) furniture makers/shops: Cabinex of Mr. Jose "PepeP Martinez in Barangay San Isidro and Calauan Furniture Shop of Mr. Jose Mailgalig of Marfori Ave., Calauan, Laguna. Home made candies such as macapuno, ube, and merengue are produced in the municipality. Among the popular are Mayolyn's Candy in Barangay San Isidro, Len len's Candy in Barangay Sto. Tomas and Lamot I tel no. (049) 248-3235 and Nady's Candy Products at Barangay Prinza tel no. (049) 248-2135.

Calauan is predominantly agricultural. Rice and coconut are among the major crops grown. Fresh fruits such as pineapple, rambutan and lanzones (seasonal) are available in the public market and along the roads.

Ornamental plants are grown and are available for sale along the national highway in Barangay Hanggan and Barangay Bangyas.

On Agriculture

1. Fish Repository and Fishing or others

The municipality has no inland body of water and is not located along coastal area. However, around _____ residents grow tilapia fingerlings in fishponds, the fingerlings are marketed/transported to Talisay, Batangas and Bulacan.

2. Fruits & Vegetables Stations, etc.

The Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Laguna has approved construction of a Trading post/center in Barangay Lamot II. The site of the proposed project is the Provincial Nursery.

The trading post/center will serve as stations for vegetables and high value commercial crops grown in Calauan and nearby municipalities.

RICE FARMER-COOPERATORS PROFILE

For rice farms, initial application of Sasakami Organic Fertilizer (SOF) was done during the wet season (June/July-October/November 2002) planting/cropping and this was continued during the dry season ((December 2002/January-April/May 2003) planting/cropping. For the first 5 cooperators, rate of SOF application was done gradually for the two cropping seasons while for the 6th cooperator (the newest cooperator who planted just this January 30, 2003), the full/total requirement was applied based on its ratio to the 5 tons of compost required per hectare. Immediate changes observed are as follows: leaves are greener and wider, plants are higher and healthier and grows faster, there are more roots and tillers, and soil is loose than before as compared to those paddies without the SOF. Agronomic characteristics like plant height, number of tillers and number of leaves are being collected every ten days. In addition to these, number of panicles, length of panicles, no. of spikelets per panicle and other characteristics will be taken/collected to see the effect of SOF in increasing the yield.

The following are the rice farmer-cooperators for the trials on Sasakami Organic Fertilizer:

1. Fernando Malitic (r1)

The total area of the paddy applied with SOF is 422 sq. meters. Before the application of SOF average yield during the wet season for the area was 200 kg and 242.5 kg for the dry season. The rate of first application was 50 kg and 85 kg for the next cropping. The area requires a total of 211, thus still needs 76 kg of SOF for the next cropping.

2. Wilfredo Marasigan (r2)

The total area of the paddy applied with SOF is 672 sq. meters. Before the application of SOF average yield during the wet season for the area was 300 kg and 400 kg for the dry season. The rate of first application was 100 kg and 168 kg for the next cropping. The area requires a total of 336, thus still needs 68 kg of SOF for the next cropping.

3. Ruben David (r3)

The total area of the paddy applied with SOF is 798 sq. meters. Before the application of SOF average yield during the wet season for the area was 400 kg and 525 kg for the dry season. The rate of first application was 120 kg and 190 kg for the next cropping. The area requires a total of 399, thus still needs 89 kg of SOF for the next cropping.

4. Roberto Gonzales (r4)

The total area of the paddy applied with SOF is 801 sq. meters. Before the application of SOF average yield during the wet season for the area was 400 kg and 500 kg for the dry season. The rate of first application was 100 kg and 150 kg for the next cropping. The area requires a total of 401, thus still needs 151 kg of SOF for the next cropping.

5. Reynaldo Alcantara (r5)

The total area of the paddy applied with SOF is 1160 sq. meters. Before the application of SOF average yield during the wet season for the area was 600 kg and 700 kg for the dry season. The rate of first application was 110 kg and 200 kg for the next cropping. The area requires a total of 580, thus still needs 270 kg of SOF for the next cropping.

6. Juanito Soriano (r6)

The total area of the paddy applied with SOF is 619 sq. meters. Before the application of SOF average yield during the wet season for the area was 300 kg and 400 kg for the dry season. The total requirement of 310 kg was applied in this area.

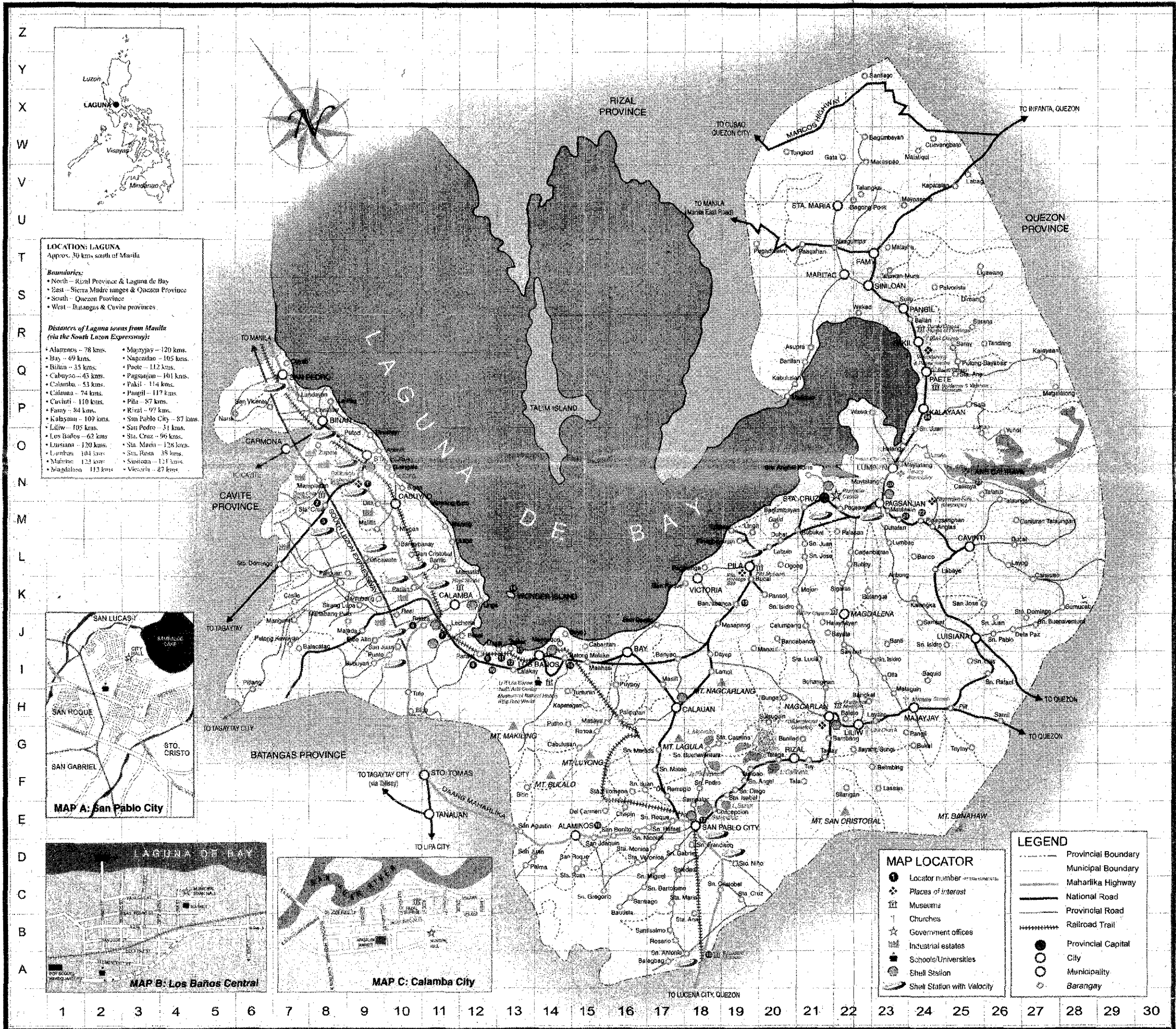

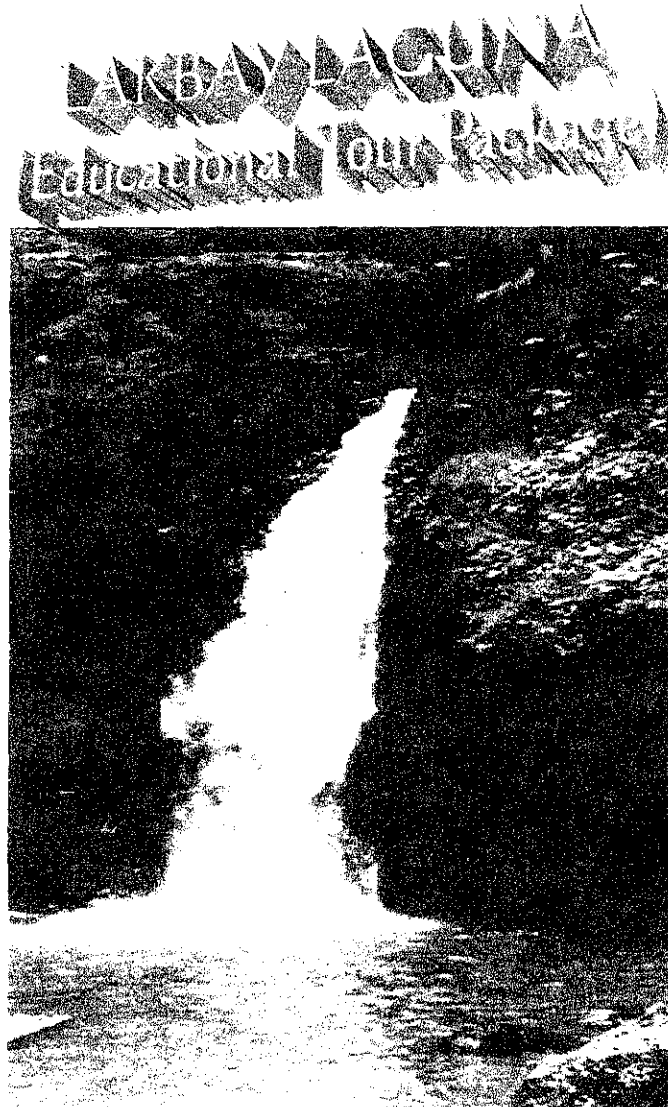

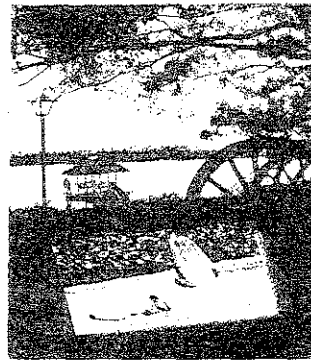

found here were carved and/or painted by the residents of Paete long ago.

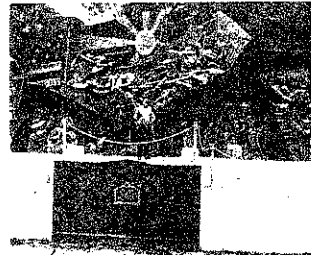
**OUR LADY OF CANDELARIA

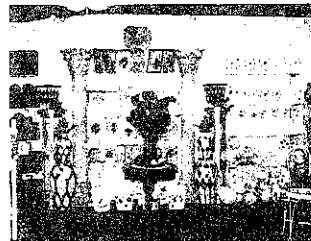
**HISTORICAL MURAL BATTLE

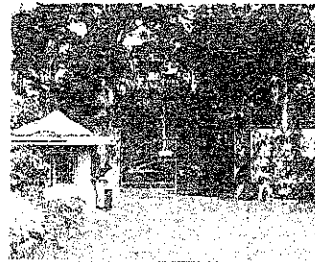
INTERNATIONAL RICE

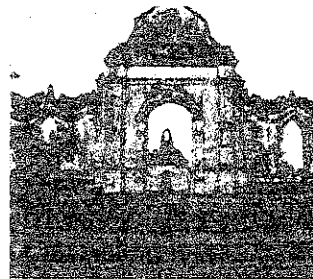
DIKO RESORT & BUTTERFLY

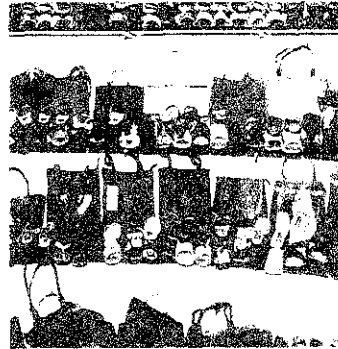
NAGCARLAN UNDERGROUND

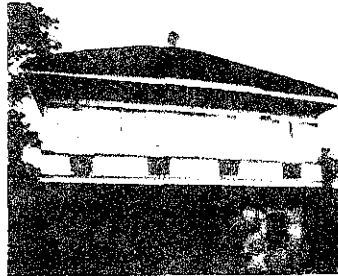
LILIW SHOES, SLIPPERS AND BAGS/ ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST CHURCH

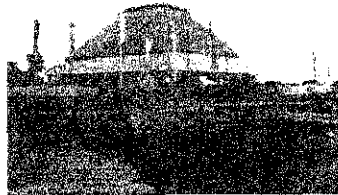
RIZAL SHRINE

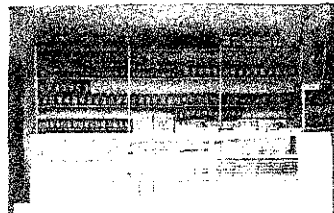
NATIONAL ARTS ENTER (NAC)

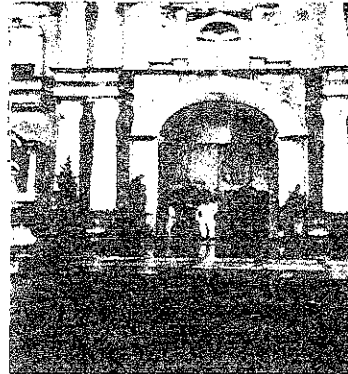
BUKO PIE SHOPS

furniture and many items of interest from around the world.

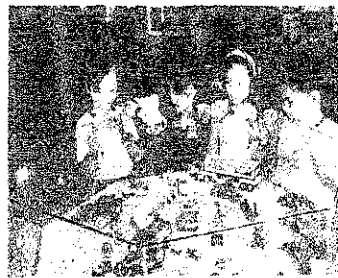
MUSEUM OF NATURAL

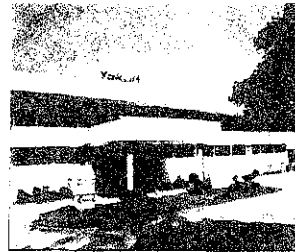

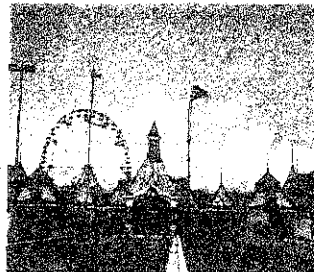

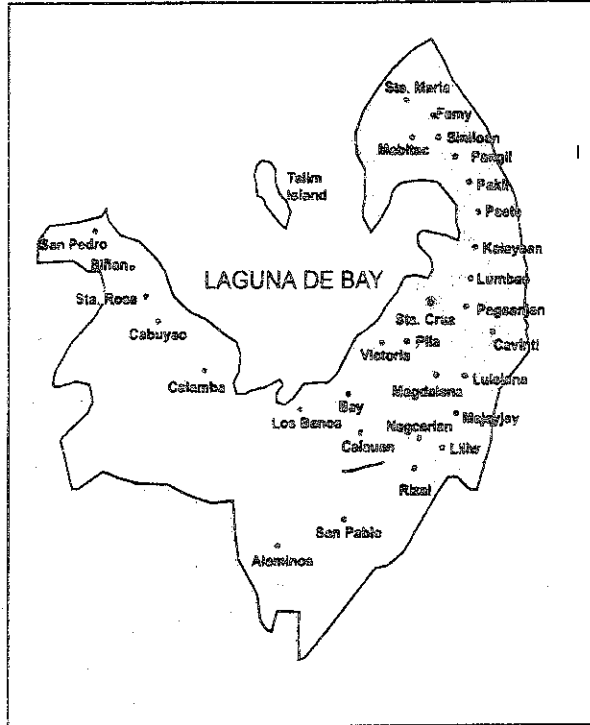
