THE AUTONOMOUS REGION IN MUSLIM MINDANAO: A HISTORICAL FLASHBACK

The history of Muslim Filipinos has evolved through three periods of cultural influences—the pre-Islamic era, the advent of Islam which began in 1310 and extended up to the middle of 19th century, and the contemporary civilization which started in 1848.

The historical accounts of the pre-Islamic ancestors of the Muslims attest to the existence of the culture and civilization of the Bangsamoro people prior to the colonization of the Philippines by Spain. The predecessors of the Muslim Filipinos had already perfected the art of self-governance, free from western influence, when the Spaniards arrived in 1521. Islamized Filipinos were part of the Islamized Malay world before the Spaniards settled in the Philippines late in 1621. They had achieved the most developed and cohesive political organization, the Sultanates of Sulu and Mindanao. It is no accident that when Christian Filipinos today want to exhibit the cultural achievement of their race before the advent of Western colonization, they are obliged to point to the indigenous cultural heritage of the Muslims in the Southern Islands.

If the history of the Philippines has been written without prejudice, it would tell how the Muslim Filipinos maintained their independence with their earliest and the longest armed national resistance against the encroachment of Western Imperialism in these islands. The so-called “Moro wards” chronicled the centuries of bloody confrontation between Spain and the Muslim Sultanates in Mindanao and Sulu. They began with Spanish attack on Jolo in 1578 and lasted until 1898, a total of 320 years.

The Muslims of Mindanao and Sulu have natural human rights regarding their religion, customs and traditions, living space and economic resources. These birth and historical rights on their cultural, economic and geographical patrimony must be recognized by all Filipinos and the Philippine Government. They have to understand that, for better or for worse, the forces of history have brought them and their ancestral homeland under the sovereignty of the Philippine Republic.

Some 4.5 million Muslim Filipinos are divided into ten ethno linguistic groups with different dialects, economic patterns, socio-political developments, and degree of Islamization, customs, rites and other aspects of culture. These groups include the Maranao, Maguindanao, Tausug, Sama', Iranon, Tiruray and Badjao.

The Maranaos, who generally possess the most colorful culture, live in the region around Lake Lanao. The Maguindanaons of Cotabato starting from the Simuay River up to Davao and the area from Zamboanga Del Sur to Margosatubig are numerically the largest group. The Tausugs are the most cosmopolitan that populate the Island of Sulu. The Sama' lives in Tawi-Tawi and some parts of the provinces of Palawan and Zamboanga Del Sur. The Iranons live in the region north of Simuay River in Cotabato. The Tirurays are in the Southern areas of Maguindanao and Sultan Kudarat provinces. The Badjaos, who are least sophisticated in their knowledge and practice of Islam, are the seafaring people.

The Muslims also differ in other aspects. Some are traditionalist, others are modernists who adopt new ways and accept their integration into the National body politic. They are further divided by political affiliations and economic interests.

The Christian communities in the region have their roots in Luzon and Visayas. Most have their origins from the broad tribal groups known as Ilocano, Tagalog, Cebuano and Ilongo. They constitute the minority group in the area.

The Autonomous Region evolved through a series of steps taken by the National leadership to resolve what was commonly known as the "Mindanao problem", a simmering unrest caused by decades of neglect and discrimination which resulted to tragic period of fratricidal conflict. In February of 1973, it erupted into an open rebellion led by the Moro National Liberation Front under Nur Misuari. The Front split into three factions: the MNLF under Misuari, the MNLF Reformists led by Dimasankay Pundato, and the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) headed by Hashim Salamat. The Muslim rebellion did not only draw popular support from the Bangsamoro people but also gained international attention through the initiatives of the late Datu Udtog Matalam, the late Sultan Al-Haron Rashid Lucman and the late Sen. Salipada Pendatum, among other Muslim leaders.

To address the problem, Regions IX and XII were created under Presidential Decree No. 742 and Letter of Instructions No. 290. The Office of the Regional Commission was organized in each of the Regions. Romulo Espaldon and Simeon A. Datumanong had been appointed Regional Commissioners of Regions IX and XII, respectively.

The signing of the Tripoli Agreement between the Philippine Government and the MNLF under the auspices of the Organization of Islamic Conference (OIC) on December 23, 1976, was the irreversible turning point in the resolution of the protracted Mindanao conflict. Cessation of hostilities has started on January 20, 1977 upon the signing of the Agreement on the Implementation of Ceasefire. Then relative peace surfaced in Mindanao, Sulu, and Palawan, know as the Minsupala Region.

On March 25, 1977, Proclamation No. 1628 declared the area of autonomy in Southern Philippines, covering the provinces of Basilan, Sulu, Tawi-Tawi, Zamboanga Del Norte and Zamboanga Del Sur in Region IX; Davao Del Sur and South Cotabato in Region XI; Lanao Del Norte, Lanao Del Sur, Maguindanao, North Cotabato and Sultan Kudarat in Region XII; and Palawan in Region IV. It also created a Provisional Regional Government prior to the establishment of the Regional Legislative Assembly and the Executive Council as envisioned in the Tripoli Agreement. The interim Government was organized with Lanao Del Sur Gov. Sultan Moh'd Ali Dimaporo and Commissioner Datumanong as Chairman and Co-Chairman, respectively, with all Provincial Governors and City Mayors in the 13 provinces as members. The proclamation was followed by a referendum plebiscite on April 17, 1977 which showed that only the provinces under Regions IX and XII voted for autonomy.

Then, Batas Pambansa Blg. 20 was enacted by the Interim Batasang Pambansa on March 23, 1979, providing for the organization of the Legislative Assembly and the Executive Council of each of the two Autonomous Regions, as well as the manner of elections. The elections took place on May 7, 1979. Then PD 1618 was issued on July 25, 1979 defining the functions, powers and responsibilities of the Lupong Tagapagpaganap ng Pook and the Batasang Pampook as the Executive and Legislative arms, respectively, of each of the Autonomous Governments.

For Region XII, Commissioner Datumanong was appointed Chairman of the LTP on December 9, 1979 by then President Ferdinand Marcos, with the following members: Assemblymen Linang Mandangan and Francisco Rabang, Jr. of the Batasang Pampook and former rebel leaders Jamil P. Lucman and Amelil U. Lalaguio, known as Commanders "Jungle Fox" and "Ronnie", respectively. In Region IX, Ulbert Ulama Tugung was named LTP Chairman with Ladjapili Otto-Ayrani, Antonio H. Cerilles, Sali Wali and Al-Hussein Caluang as members. Former MNLF Vice Chairman Abul-Khayr Alonto and Nur Hussein Ututalum had been elected first Speakers of the Legislative Assemblies of Region XII and IX, respectively.

In 1984, LTP-Region XII member Malaguio replaced Chairman Datumanong who ran for a seat in the defunct Batasang Pambansa.

After the February 1986 bloodless revolution which ousted President Marcos from power, former Maguindanao Gov. Zacaria A. Candao was appointed LTP Chairman by the new President Corazon C. Aquino. Later, Abdulrahman Alam succeeded Chairman Candao who ran for the gubernatorial election and won as Governor of Maguindanao in early 1988.

At that time, formal peace talks between the Government and the MNLF had started on the manner of implementation of the 1976 Tripoli Agreement for the thirteen provinces of the Minsupala region. The resumption of peace negotiation was a commitment of both parties under the Jeddah Accord of February 3, 1987.

Earlier, the grant of Muslim Autonomy, as sponsored by former Senator Ahmad Domocao Alonto and other Muslim members of the 1986 Constitutional Commission, has been enshrined in the new Constitution which was ratified by the Filipino people and known as the Philippine Constitution. A Regional Consultative Commission was organized chaired by a legal luminary, the late Tocod Macaraya, which drafted the Organic Act for Muslim Mindanao. In 1988, the proposed Organic Act was submitted to Congress for final legislation. Meanwhile, Dr. Ali Bahir Lucman was appointed LTP Chairman, vice Alam.

Republic Act No. 6754, other wise known as the Organic Act for the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao, was signed into law on August 1, 1989 by then President Aquino and was ratified in a plebiscite in November 1989. The Organic Act created the Autonomous Regional Government and provided its basic structures as a distinct geo-political entity in Southern Philippines.

The Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) is composed of the provinces of Lanao Del Sur, Maguindanao, Sulu and Tawi-Tawi with 83 municipalities and some 2,126 barangays. It was finally inaugurated last November 6, 1990 after the assumption of office of its first set of elected officials headed by then Maguindanao Governor Zacaria Candao and Benjamin Loong as first Regional Governor and Vice Governor, respectively with Tawi-Tawi Assemblyman Ismael Abubakar, Jr. as the first Speaker of the Regional Legislative Assembly. The inaugural ceremony at Cotabato City, seat of the Regional Government, was graced by the attendance of national and local officials led by then President Aquino, former Speaker of the House Representatives Ramon V. Mitra, Jr. and then Defense Secretary Fidel V. Ramos, as well as foreign dignitaries from Muslim and friendly countries.

In the first three-year existence of the ARMM, then Regional Governor Candao initiated for the devolution of several national agencies, formed the ARMM counterpart regional

departments and agencies, organized his cabinet and directed his administration towards its two-pronged goals: peace and development.

Last March 25, 1993, the second Regional Election was held in four provinces. Former Ambassador Lininding P. Pangandaman and his running mate, then Assemblyman Nabil A. Tan, won under the LAKA-NUCD-UMDP-Ompia Coalition over re-electionist Gov. Candao and Vice Gov. Loong of the LDP-ILL Coalition Party.

Lininding P. Pangandaman and Nabil A. Tan officially assumed Office as Regional Governor and Regional Vice-Governor, respectively, on April 2, 1993. From day one, Regional Governor Pangandaman confronted the twin issues of peace and development. With the support of the Regional Legislative Assembly under the leadership of Speaker Datu Guimid Matalam, he launched a massive program of reform, reconciliation and unification, simultaneously with the implementation of vital infrastructure projects, not only to pump-prime the economy, but also to attain unity, solidarity, stability and peace in the autonomous Region. His Administration adopted the policies of consultation, transparency and accountability in program implementation and the delivery of basic and adequate services. He initiated and adopted a Comprehensive Regional Development Plan. Known as the ARMM 2000, the plan is addressed to the problems and related issues in Muslim Mindanao and aimed at improving the quality of life of its constituents. ARMM 2000 is in support to, but autonomous and a distinct component of the Philippines 2000 under the leadership of President Fidel V. Ramos.

While forming his Cabinet, Regional Governor Pangandaman first designated then Assistant Executive Secretary Atty. Alim D. Pangandaman as Officer-In Charge of the Office of the Executive Secretary. Later, he appointed then Cabinet Secretary Atty. Cadar M. Omar as Executive Secretary. After Omar voluntarily resigned, he designated Pangaga P. Pangcoga as Acting Executive Secretary to help him improve further the delivery of basic services in the Autonomous Region.

Regional Governor Pangandaman, during his State of the Region Address last May 18, 1994, told the Regional Legislative Assembly:

“Our people has long suffered, they are in need of our guidance and dedicated service to liberate them from poverty; to improve their quality of life; to preserve their dignity; to assert their place in strengthening national identity; to return their equal standing in our pluralistic society and above all, to establish their recognition as a respectable component of the Filipino nation”.

“Mr. Speaker, this we can achieve, Insha-Allah, because all the opportunities to achieve them are now available under the Ramos Administration”.

However, the organization of the Autonomous Government had been rejected by the MNLF, considering it as a unilateral effort of the Government of the Republic of the Philippines (GRP). In October 1992 and April 1993, exploratory talks with the MNLF were initiated through a GRP delegation composed of Rep. Eduardo Ermita and Rep. Nur Jaafar, among others.

On October 25, 1993, new formal peace talks have begun between the MNLF and the GRP in Jakarta, Indonesia with the support of the Ministerial Committee of the Six of the

Organization of Islamic Countries (OIC). The MNLF Panel was headed by MNLF Chairman Misuari, while the GRP Panel was chaired by Ambassador Manual Yan. Then, an Interim ceasefire agreement was signed between the two panels. After almost three years of negotiation, the fourth round of peace talks resulted in the initiating of the GRP-MNLF Final Agreement on August 30 before President Soehartto of Indonesia.

The final Agreement was formally signed on September 2, 1996 at Malacanang Palace, Manila by MNLF Chairman Nur Misuari and GRP Panel Chairman Yan in the presence of President Ramos, foreign dignitaries, MNLF and GRP high officials and Mindanao leaders. The Accord finally ended almost 30 years of rebellion that cost more than 120,000 Filipino lives, provided for the organization of the Southern Philippines Council for Peace and Development (SPCPD) and the Zone of Peace and Development in the SPCPD region.

Last September 9, 1996, the third ARMM Elections was conducted in the Autonomous Region. MNLF Chairman Misuari and former RLA Speaker Matalam, running unopposed, were duly elected as Regional Governor and Regional Vice Governor respectively, under the LAKAS-NUCD-UMDP-MNLF Coalition. Together with the 21 assemblymen-elect and the new Vice Governor, Prof. Misuari took his oath of office before the President and assumed office as the third elected Governor of ARMM at noon of September 30, 1996.

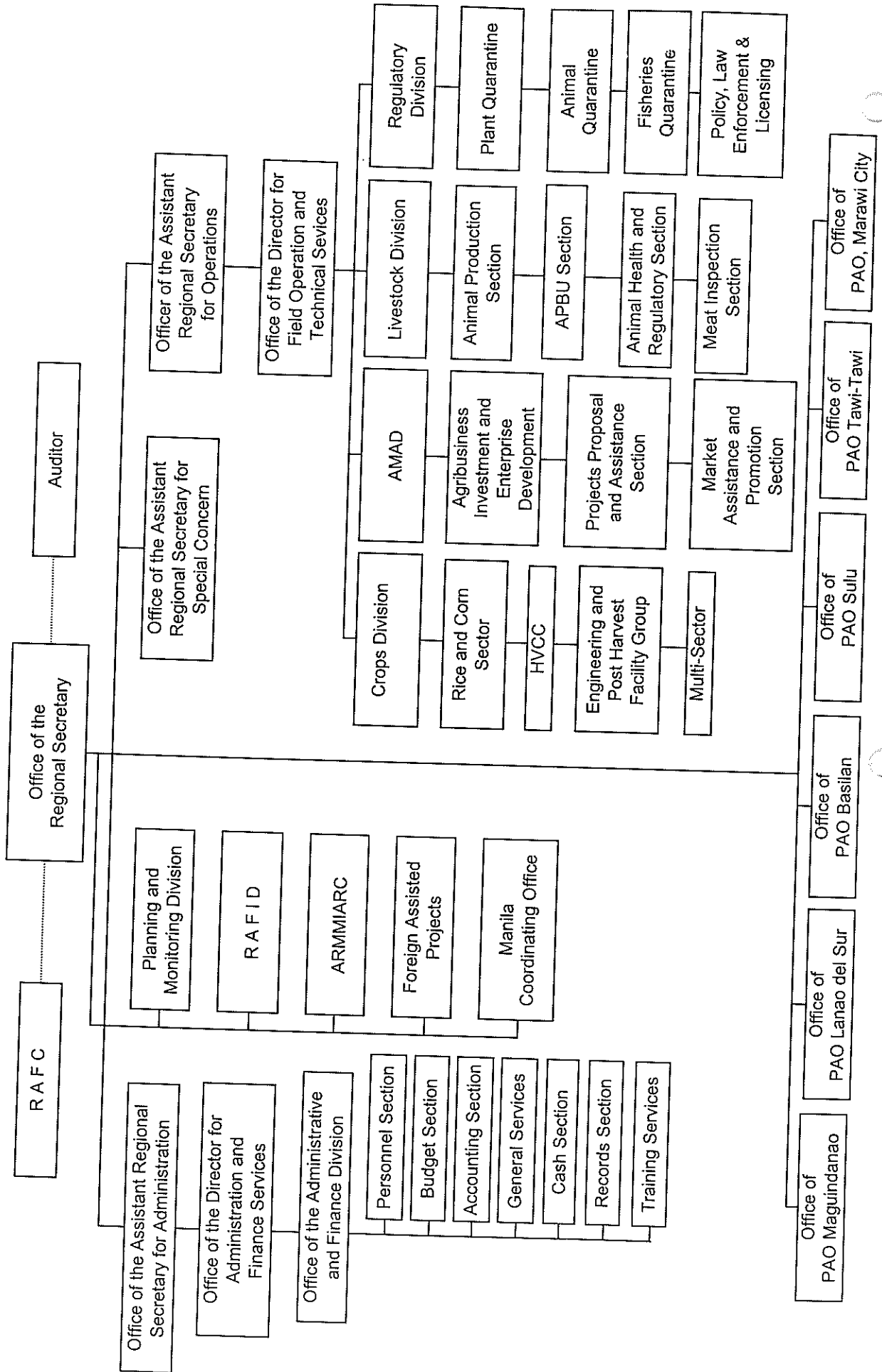

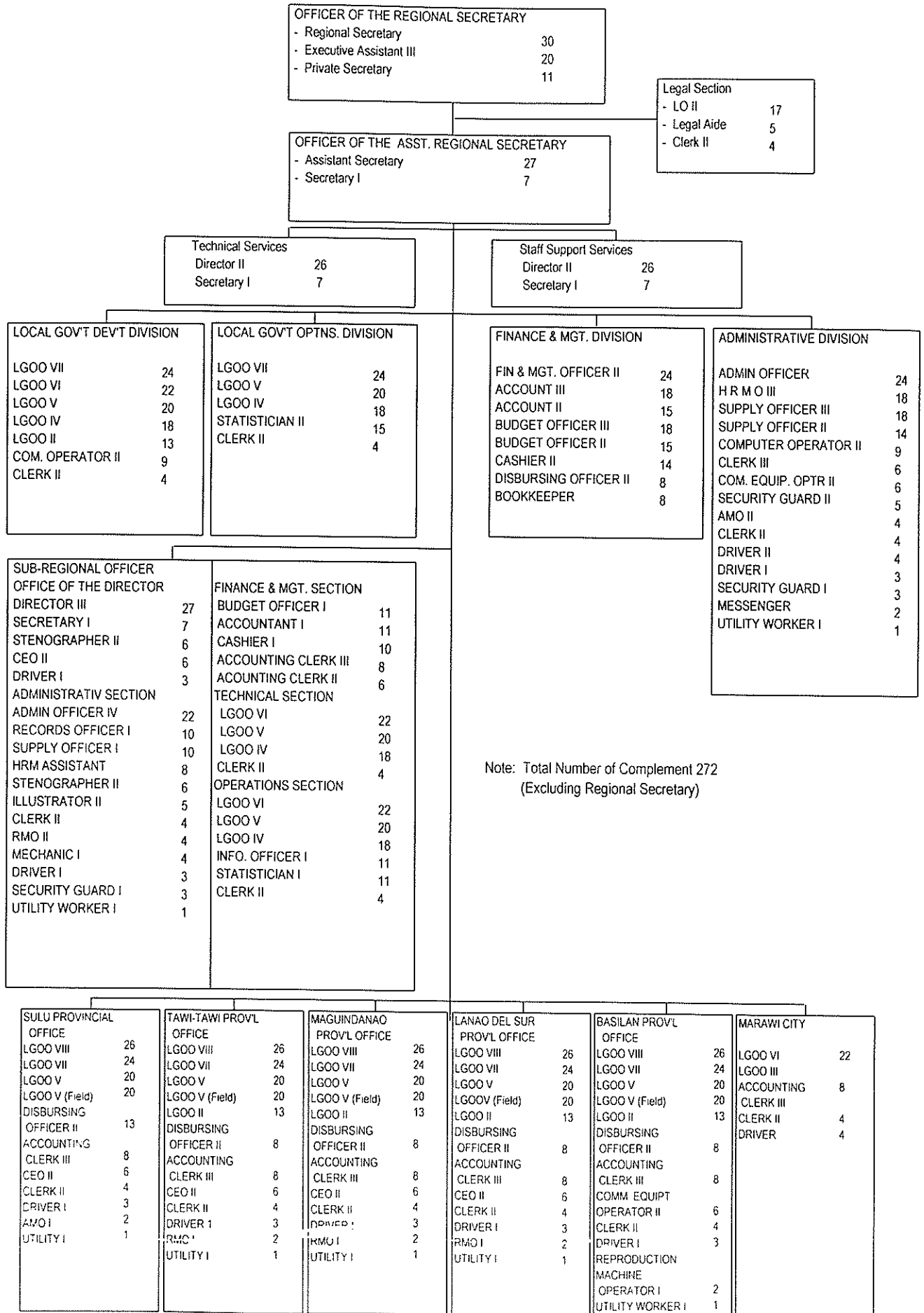

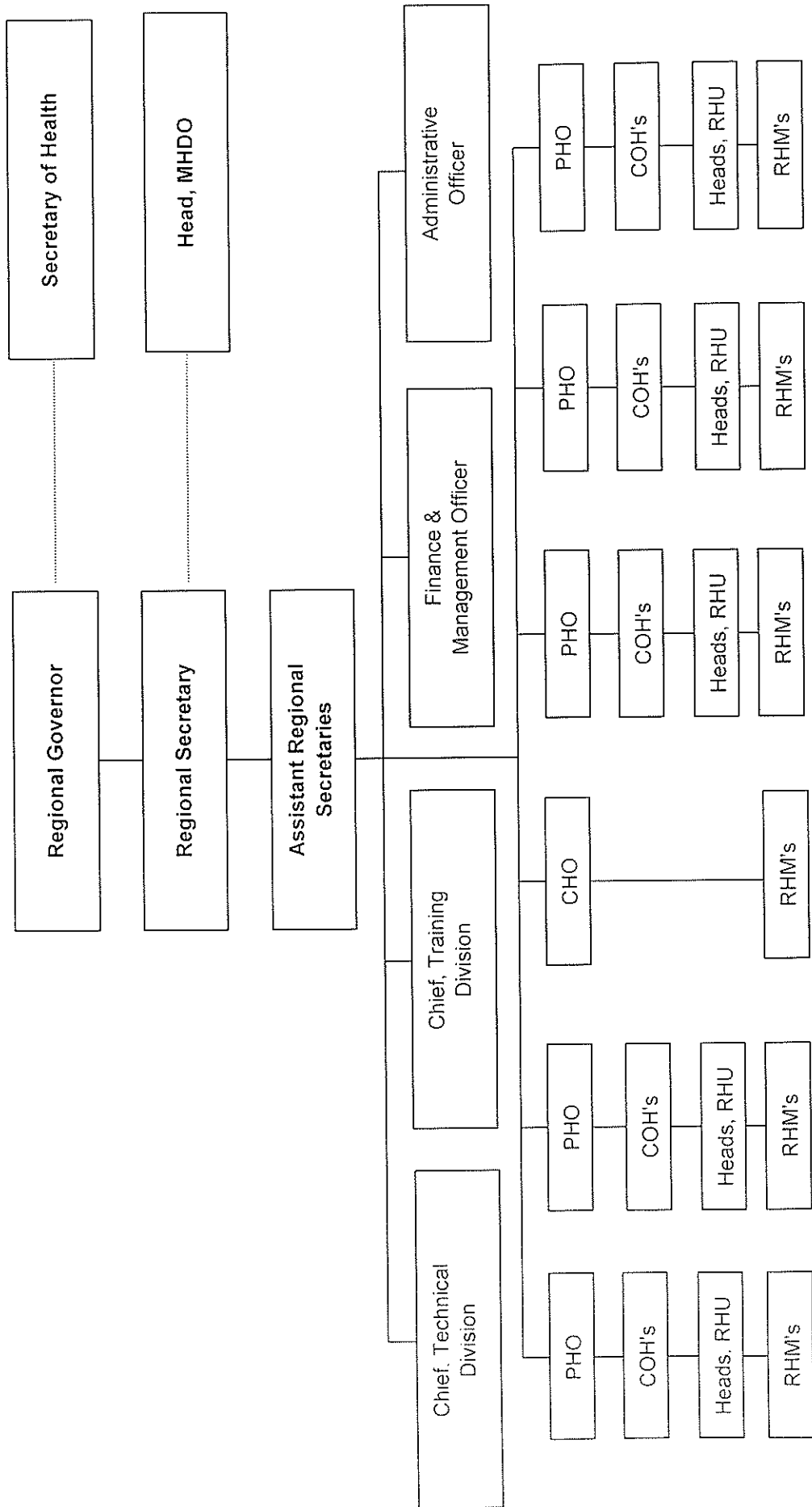
ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE OF DAF-ARMM



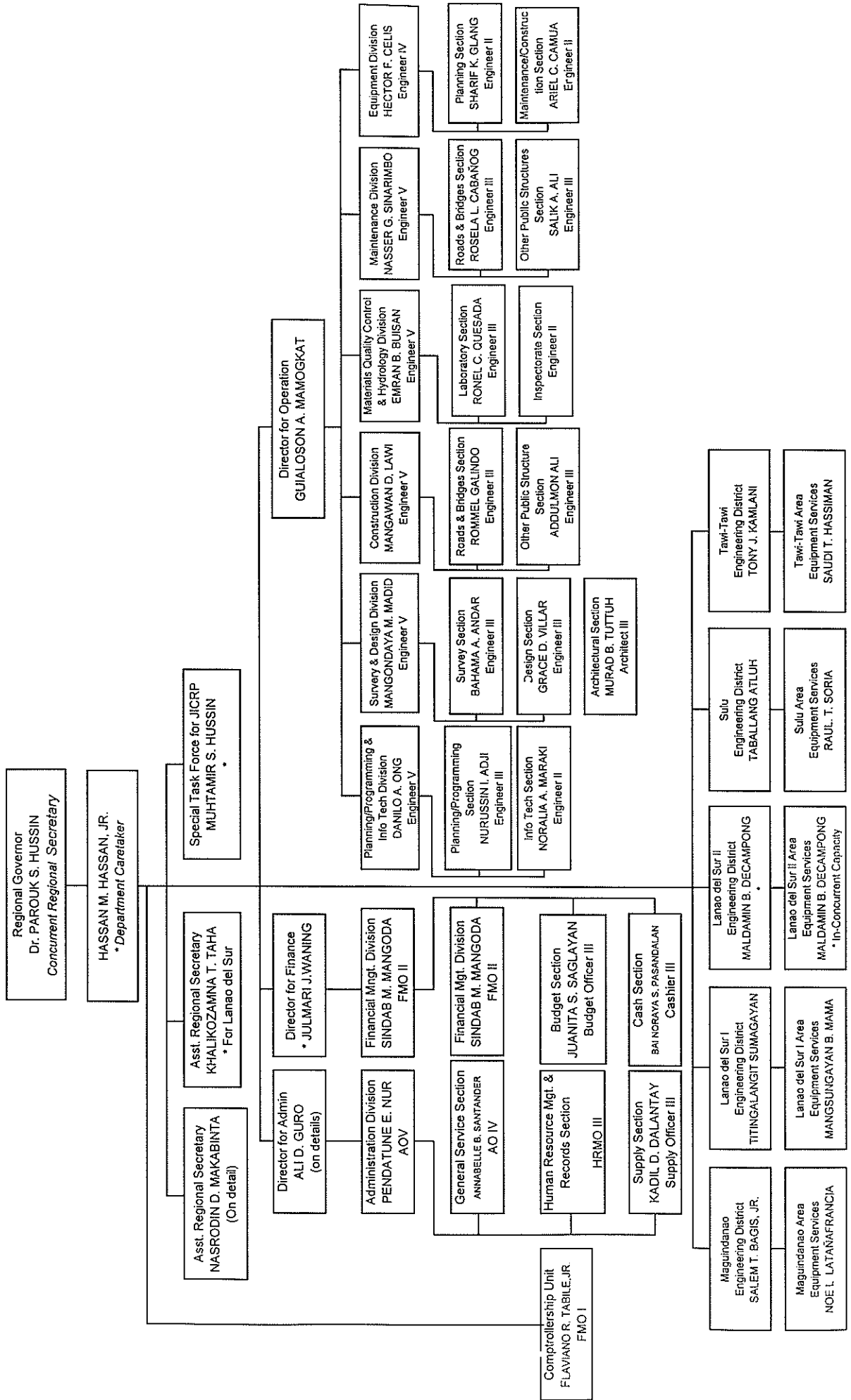
DILG ARMM ORGANIZATIONAL CHART



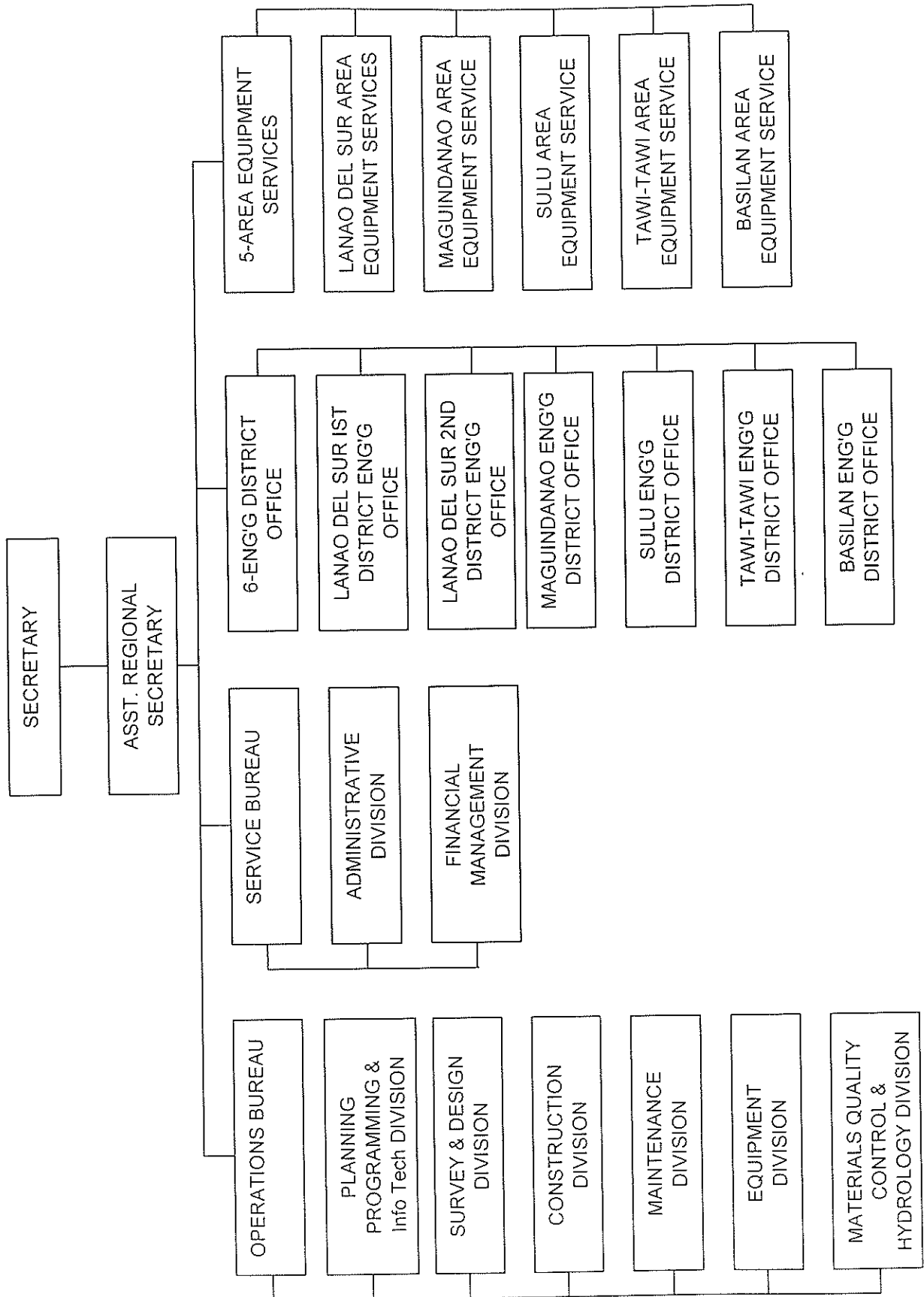
DOH-ARMM ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE



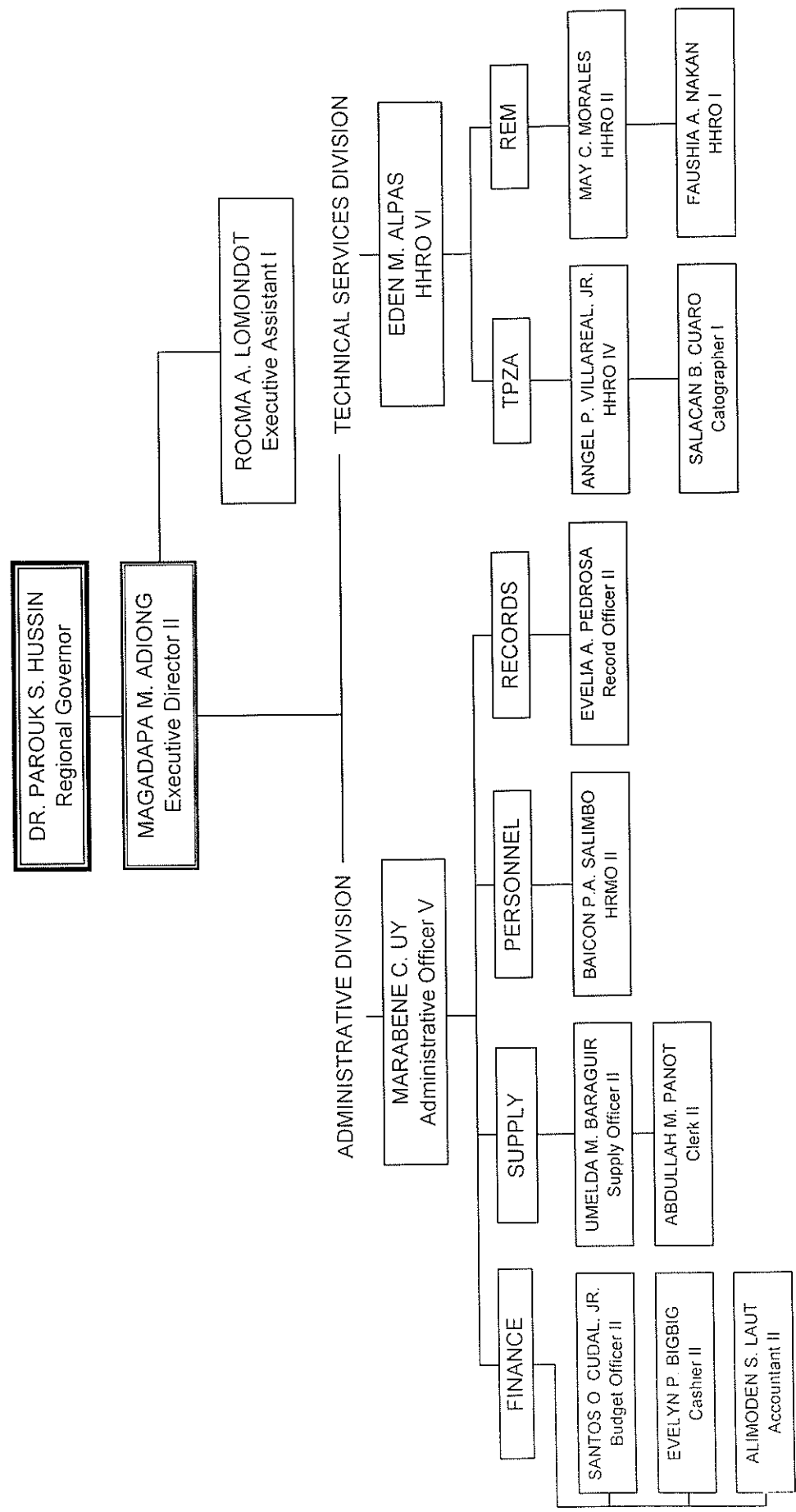
DPWH-ARMM ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE PHILIPPINES

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 178

FURTHER DEVOLVING THE AUTONOMOUS REGIONAL GOVERNMENT OF THE AUTONOMOUS REGION IN MUSLIM MINDANAO CERTAIN POWERS AND FUNCTIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY, AMENDING FOR THIS PURPOSE EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 425, SERIES OF 1991

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 425, Series of 1991, issued pursuant to Republic Act 6734, effected the devolution to the Autonomous Regional Government (ARG) of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) certain powers and functions of the Department of Science and Technology (DOST), including the control and supervision over its offices, programs and projects in the ARMM;

WHEREAS, Republic Act No. 9054 was enacted into law on March 31, 2001 in order to strengthen and expand the Organic Act for the ARMM, and the same was ratified on August 14, 2001 with the addition of the Province of Basilan (except Isabela City) and City of Marawi to the original four provinces comprising the ARMM;

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the National Government to devolve, as far as practicable and consistent with the Constitution and Republic Act No. 6734, as amended by Republic Act No. 9054, as many functions and powers of national government agencies to the ARG;

WHEREAS, the devolution of powers and functions of the National Government to the ARG is part of the government's peace process to find ways and means for a durable and lasting peace in Mindanao; and

WHEREAS, the Oversight Committee created pursuant to Republic Act No. 9054 deemed it imperative to further devolve certain powers and functions of DOST to the ARG.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GLORIA MACAPAGAL-ARROYO, President of the Republic of the Philippines, by virtue of the powers vested in me by law, do hereby order:

SECTION 1. Transfer of Powers and Functions. – In addition to the powers and functions of the DOST previously devolved to the ARG pursuant to Executive Order No. 425 (Series of 1991) , the following powers and functions are hereby devolved from DOST to the ARG:

- a) Administration of Scientific and Technological (S&T) Scholarships, Awards and Grants
- b) Development and Improvement of S&T Education and Training;
- c) Administration of S&T Incentive and Career System;
- d) Conduct of Research and Development (R&D) on Information Technology and Advanced Fields; and
- e) Venture Financing.

The identification and selection of scholars through nationwide competition shall be retained by the DOST National, while implementation and management thereof shall be undertaken by the ARG.

SEC. 2. S&T Programs and Projects. Consistent with the devolved powers and functions, the ARG shall formulate and develop S&T programs and projects, such as but not limited to the following:

- a. Technology Transfer, Promotion and Commercialization;
- b. Research and Development;
- c. Science and Technology Services;
- d. S&T Culture;
- e. S&T Manpower and Infrastructure;
- f. Information Systems and Data Bank;
- g. S&T Institutional Linkages; and
- h. S&T Advocacy.

SEC. 3. Planning and Programming. DOST shall involve DOST-ARMM in all its planning and programming activities to ensure that DOST-ARMM priorities are taken into account and the standards are in accordance with the national S&T Plan.

SEC. 4. Coordination of Programs and Projects. For purposes of developmental activities in the region and to ensure consistency with the National S&T plan, the DOST-ARMM shall:

- a. Coordinate with the DOST and DOST Councils and Institutes for technical assistance requirements and for S&T related activities;
- b. Be involved in the S&T programs and projects that are implemented in the region (planning, programming and implementation stages) of DOST and DOST Councils and Institutes; and
- c. Be a member of the Mindanao DOST Cluster Organization (MindaDOST) as a component region in Mindanao.

SEC. 5. Personnel. The following rules shall govern the personnel of the DOST assigned in the Province of Basilan, except Isabela City, and the City of Marawi.

- a. All plantilla positions, filled and unfilled effectively assigned to, or with the Province of Basilan, (except Isabela City) and Marawi City as their official station, shall be placed immediately under the control and supervision of the ARG.
- b. Personnel absorbed by the ARG shall retain their seniority rights, compensation, and other benefits in accordance with the Civil Service laws, rules and regulations.
- c. Personnel declining to be absorbed by the ARG shall have the following options:
 - c.1. Retirement – All affected personnel qualified for retirement may elect retirement, as may be provided by law. All benefits, including payment of accrued leave credits, that may be lawfully given to affected employees by virtue of their transfer, retirement or separation from service shall be paid within one (1) month from the filing of the necessary clearance and other pertinent documents.
 - c.2. Transfer – Affected personnel shall be given priority in hiring for existing vacant positions in other government agencies, subject to compliance with established qualification standards set by the receiving agencies.
 - c.3. Resignation – Separated personnel not eligible for retirement under existing laws shall be entitled to all benefits provided under existing Civil Service Laws.

SEC. 6. Assets, Equipment and Budget. All assets, equipment, budgetary allocation and properties being utilized or programmed for use for the Province of Basilan and the City of Marawi shall be turned-over to the ARG of the ARMM, with the exception of the budget allocation for teacher training which is fixed at the national level.

SEC. 7. Implementing Rules. DOST, in close coordination with the ARG, shall issue implementing rules and regulations to effect the devolution and turn-over within ninety (90) days from effectivity of this Executive Order.

SEC. 8. Date of Transfer. The DOST shall effect full transfer of its functions, personnel, assets, equipment and budget within 90 days following the effectivity of this Executive Order.

SEC. 9. Repealing Clause. All laws, decrees, orders, rules and regulations and other issuances or parts thereof, which are inconsistent with this Executive Order are hereby repealed, modified and amended accordingly.

SEC. 10. Effectivity. This Executive Order shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in a national newspaper of general circulation and one local newspaper of general circulation in the ARMM.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 180

FURTHER DEVOLVING THE AUTONOMOUS REGIONAL GOVERNMENT OF THE AUTONOMOUS REGION IN MUSLIM MINDANAO CERTAIN POWERS AND FUNCTIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF TRADE AND INDUSTRY, AMENDING FOR THIS PURPOSE EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 481, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 481, Series of 1991, issued pursuant to Republic Act 6734, effected the devolution to the Autonomous Regional Government (ARG) of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) of certain powers and functions of the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) including the control and supervision over its offices, programs and projects in the ARMM;

WHEREAS, Republic Act No. 9054 was enacted into law on March 31, 2001 in order to strengthen and expand the Organic Act for the ARMM, and the same was ratified on August 14, 2001 with the addition of the Province of Basilan (except Isabela City) and City of Marawi to the original four provinces comprising the ARMM;

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the National Government to devolve, as far as practicable and consistent with the Constitution and Republic Act No. 6734, as amended by Republic Act No. 9054, as many functions and powers of national government agencies to the ARG;

WHEREAS, the devolution of powers and functions of the National Government to the ARG is part of the government's peace process to find ways and means for a durable and lasting peace in Mindanao; and

WHEREAS, the Oversight Committee created pursuant to Republic Act No. 9054 deemed it imperative to further devolve certain powers and functions of DTI to the ARG.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GLORIA MACAPAGAL-ARROYO, President of the Republic of the Philippines, by virtue of the powers vested in me by law, do hereby order:

SECTION 1. Technical Assistance. The DTI shall continue to assist the ARG in facilitating the performance of the economic development mandate. The following bureaus of the DTI may be tapped to provide support and technical assistance to the ARG:

- a. Bureau of Export Trade Promotions (BETP);
- b. Bureau of International Trade Relations (BITR);
- c. Center for Industrial Competitiveness (CIC);
- d. Bureau of Import Services (BIS);
- e. Trade and Industry Information Center (TIIC);
- f. Bureau of Trade Regulations and Consumer Protection (BTRCP);
- g. Bureau of Small and Medium Enterprise Development (BSMED);
- h. Intellectual Property Office (IPO);
- i. Foreign Trade Service Corps (FTSC);
- j. Bureau of Domestic Trade (BDT);
- k. Bureau of Product Standards (BPS);
- l. Garments and Textile Export Board (GTEB);
- m. Philippine Trade Training Center (PTTC);
- n. Cottage Industry Technology Center (CITC); and
- o. Human Resource Development Service (HRDS)

SEC. 2. Personnel. The following rules shall govern the personnel of the DOST assigned in the Province of Basilan, except Isabela City, and the City of Marawi.

- a. All plantilla positions, filled and unfilled effectively assigned to, or with the Province of Basilan, (except Isabela City) and Marawi City as their official station, shall be placed immediately under the control and supervision of the ARG.
- b. Personnel absorbed by the ARG shall retain their seniority rights, compensation, and other benefits in accordance with the Civil Service laws, rules and regulations.
- c. Personnel declining to be absorbed by the ARG shall have the following options:

c.1. Retirement – All affected personnel qualified for retirement may elect retirement, as may be provided by law. All benefits, including payment of accrued leave credits, that may be lawfully given to affected employees by virtue of their transfer, retirement or separation from service shall be paid within one (1) month from the filing of the necessary clearance and other pertinent documents.

c.2. Transfer – Affected personnel shall be given priority in hiring for existing vacant positions in other government agencies, subject to compliance with established qualification standards set by the receiving agencies.

c.3. Resignation – Separated personnel not eligible for retirement under existing laws shall be entitled to all benefits provided under existing Civil Service Laws.

SEC. 3. Technical Assistance Defined. Technical assistance are those activities which “involve the introduction of methods, ideas and information aimed at improving the planning and implementation of a process, a project or a program as well as institution building, studies and training.”

**SUBJECT: IMPLEMENTING RULES AND REGULATIONS
OF EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 180**

Pursuant to Section 5 of Executive Order No. 180 dated 27 February 2003, devolving to the Autonomous Regional Government of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao Certain Powers and Functions of the Department of Trade and Industry, the following are hereby prescribed for the information, guidance and compliance of all concerned.

Section 1. The rules stipulated under Section 2 of E.O. 180 shall govern the personnel of the DTI assigned in the Province of Basilan (except Isabela City) and the City of Marawi. Since the DTI personnel from these areas are under the DTI Regional Office for Regions 9 & 12, respectively, the Administrative Division of DTI regions 9 and 12 shall coordinate with their counterparts from the Autonomous Regional Government. The Civil Service Regional Office concerned should be informed of the developments and final action taken on all personnel matters for documentation and transfer of records.

The DTI-Head Office, through the GAS Personnel Division, may assist in reviewing the documents to be submitted by the DTI Regional Offices concerned, including the computation of claims to be submitted in the event that the affected personnel opts to retire. Thereafter, the DTI Regional Offices concerned may process the documents.

Section 2. In relation to Sections 4 and 6 of E.O. 180, the transfer of assets, equipment, budgetary allocation and properties to the ARG should be in accordance with existing rules on property management, as well as accounting and auditing rules and regulations. The DTI Regional Offices, through its administrative and Finance Divisions, shall ensure compliance therewith. The respective offices of the Commission on Audit should also be furnished with copies of the reports on these matters.

Section 3. The DTI through its offices and bureaus shall continue to provide support and technical assistance to the ARG in facilitating the performance of the economic development mandate.

Section 4. The attached Annex "A" is hereby prescribed and ordered implemented by all concerned.

Section 5. A Memorandum of Agreement to operationalize the transfer of resources which will include the budget shall be formulated and entered into by and among DTI-9 and ARMM.

Section 6. This Department Administrative Order shall take effect after fifteen (15) days from publication in a newspaper of general circulation.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 181

DEVOLVING TO THE AUTONOMOUS REGIONAL GOVERNMENT OF THE AUTONOMOUS REGION IN MUSLIM MINDANAO CERTAIN POWERS AND FUNCTIONS OF THE TECHNICAL EDUCATION AND SKILLS DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY IN THE PROVINCE OF BASILAN AND IN MARAWI CITY, INCLUDING THE CONTROL AND SUPERVISION OVER ITS PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, Executive Order No. 317, Series of 1996, issued pursuant to Republic Act 6734, effected the devolution to the Autonomous Regional Government (ARG) of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) of certain powers and functions of the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA) including the control and supervision over its offices, programs and projects in the ARMM;

WHEREAS, Republic Act No. 9054 was enacted into law on March 31, 2001 in order to strengthen and expand the Organic Act for the ARMM, and the same was ratified on August 14, 2001 with the addition of the Province of Basilan (except Isabela City) and City of Marawi to the original four (4) provinces comprising the ARMM;

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the National Government to devolve, as far as practicable and consistent with the Constitution and Republic Act No. 6734, as amended by Republic Act No. 9054, as many functions and powers of national government agencies to the ARG;

WHEREAS, the devolution of powers and functions of the National Government to the ARG is part of the government's peace process to find ways and means for a durable and lasting peace in Mindanao; and

WHEREAS, the Oversight Committee created pursuant to Section 3, Article XVIII of RA 9054, deemed it imperative to devolve to the ARG the

control and supervision of TESDA offices, programs and projects in the Province of Basilan and City of Marawi.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GLORIA MACAPAGAL-ARROYO, President of the Republic of the Philippines, by virtue of the powers vested in me by law, do hereby order:

SECTION 1. Transfer of Powers, Functions, Personnel, Assets and Budget. The TESDA Basilan Provincial Office and the Provincial Training Center together with its personnel, assets and liabilities, and budget for the current year shall be devolved to the ARG.

The appropriate budgetary support for Technical Vocational Training Programs and Projects for Marawi City shall be carved out of the operations of TESDA Region XII and likewise be devolved to the ARG.

SEC. 2. Provincial Offices. In order to strengthen the implementing capability of TESDA ARMM and to be at par with the administrative regions, Provincial Offices are hereby established in the provinces of Maguindanao, Lanao del Sur, Basilan, Sulu and Tawi-Tawi to conform with the provisions of the TESDA Act of 1996.

SEC. 3. Technical Assistance. TESDA shall make available to the ARG such technical assistance as may be necessary to carry out effectively the objectives of this Executive Order.

SEC. 4. Implementing Rules. TESDA, in close coordination with the ARG, shall issue the implementing rules and regulations to effect the devolution and turn-over within ninety (90) days from effectivity of this Executive Order.

SEC. 5. Separability Clause. If any provision of this Executive Order is declared unconstitutional or contrary to law, the validity and effectivity of the other provisions hereof shall not be affected

SEC. 6. Effectivity. This Executive Order shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in a national newspaper of general circulation in the ARMM.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 125

**FURTHER ENHANCING THE DEVOLUTION OF POWERS AND
FUNCTIONS, PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS OF NATIONAL
GOVERNMENT AGENCIES TO THE AUTONOMOUS REGIONAL
GOVERNMENT OF THE AUTONOMOUS REGION IN MUSLIM
MINDANAO, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES**

WHEREAS, Republic Act No. 6734 provided for the establishment of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM), and the same was ratified by the provinces of Maguindanao, Lanao del Sur, Sulu, and Tawi-Tawi;

WHEREAS, Republic Act No. 9054 was enacted into law on March 31, 2001 in order to strengthen and expand the Organic Act for ARMM, and the same was ratified on August 14, 2001 with the addition of the province of Basilan, and the City of Marawi to the original four provinces comprising the ARMM;

WHEREAS, it is the policy of the National Government to devolve, as far as practicable and consistent with the Constitution and RA 6734, as amended by RA 9054, as many functions and powers of national government agencies to the Autonomous Regional Government (ARG); and

WHEREAS, the devolution of powers and functions of the National Government to the ARG is part of the government's peace process to find ways and means for a durable and lasting peace in Mindanao.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GLORIA MACAPAGAL ARROYO, President of the Philippines, by virtue of the powers vested in me by law, do hereby order:

SECTION 1. *Devolution of Locally Funded Programs and Projects to ARMM.* – Unless otherwise specifically requested by the Regional Governor of the ARMM, locally funded programs and projects presently being undertaken within the ARM, and those programmed to be implemented in the ARMM are hereby devolved to and heretofore to be implemented by the ARG of the ARMM.

SECTION 2. *Devolution of ODA Funded Programs and Projects to ARMM.* Unless otherwise specifically requested by the Regional Governor of the ARMM, programs and projects funded by Official Development Assistance (ODA) specifically intended only for ARMM shall be implemented by ARG. Programs and projects funded by ODA implemented on a nationwide basis, but with an ARMM component shall be

implemented by the concerned national agency, with the ARG implementing the component within the ARMM.

Ongoing programs and projects in the ARMM funded by ODA and covered by loan agreements shall be devolved to and implemented by ARG, subject to renegotiation and amendment of the loan agreements covering said programs and/or projects.

SECTION 3. *ARMM ODA Office.* – There is hereby created an ODA Office under the Office of the Regional Governor of ARMM that shall handle all matters relating to the accessing of ODA for ARMM programs and projects. The ARMM ODA Office shall closely coordinate with the National Economic & Development Authority. The Department of Budget and Management shall provide the budgetary requirements for the ARMM ODA Office.

SECTION 4. *Catch-up Budget for ARMM.* – Pursuant to Sections 4 and 11, Article XVIII of Republic Act No. 9054, national agencies must include in their programs and activities the corresponding equitable and proportionate budget for programs and activities intended for the ARMM in consultation with the ARG. However, in order to be consistent with and comply with the spirit of devolution under RA 9054, the national agencies and the ARG shall agree on the mechanisms on the effective implementation by the latter of said programs and activities within the ARMM.

SECTION 5. *Transfer of Devolved Agencies in Basilan.* All offices of national agencies devolved to the ARG, including their personnel, asset, equipment, and budget that are located in Isabela City, Basilan shall be transferred to an appropriate government center in Lamitan, Basilan starting January 2003. The national government shall provide the necessary funding requirements to effect the transfer. On the other hand, the concerned national agencies shall provide the necessary office including personnel and budget to service the requirements of Isabela City.

SECTION 6. *Freeze Hiring of ARMM Plantilla Positions.* – Pending the transfer of the devolved power, function, program and project, national agencies are proscribed from filling up plantilla positions corresponding to the ARMM. National agencies are likewise proscribed from abolishing, transferring plantilla positions in their agency that are intended for ARMM.

SECTION 7. *Repealing Clause.* – All Executive issuances, orders, rules and regulations, or any part thereof, which are inconsistent with any provision of this Executive Order are hereby revoked, amended, or modified accordingly.

SECTION 8. *Effectivity.* – This Executive Order shall take effect immediately.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 125-A

AMENDING EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 125

WHEREAS, it is the policy of this National or Central Government to devolve as far as practicable, and consistent with the Constitution and RA 6734 as amended by RA 9054, powers and functions of national government agencies to the Autonomous Regional Government (ARG) to the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM);

WHEREAS, the ARMM is one of the poorest regions, if not the poorest region, in the country;

WHEREAS, Official Development Assistance (ODA) is one of the sources of funding for programs and projects, and therefore the same may be tapped to hasten the socio-economic development of ARMM; and

WHEREAS, it is the policy of this Administration that programs and projects funded by ODA specifically intended for ARMM shall be implemented by the ARG, and in case of ODA programs and/or projects implemented on a nationwide basis but with an ARMM component, the latter shall also be implemented by the ARG.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GLORIA MACAPAGAL-ARROYO, President of the Philippines, by virtue of the powers vested in me by law, do hereby order:

Section 1. Section 1 of Executive Order No. 125 is hereby amended to read as follows:

“SECTION 1. *Devolution of Locally Funded Programs and Projects to ARMM.* – Locally funded programs and projects being undertaken and programmed to be implemented by the ARG of the ARMM, except:

- a) When Congress provides in the General Appropriations Act or special law which government agency shall implement a particular program or project, or
- b) When in the judgment of the ARMM Regional Governor, the ARG does not have the capacity to implement the program and/or project, in which case he may request a national agency to implement the same.”

Section 2. Section 8 of Executive Order No. 25 is hereby amended to read as follows:

“**SECTION 8.** *Effectivity* – This Executive Order shall take effect immediately, except for Section 1 hereof, which shall take effect starting January 1, 2003.”

Section 3. Section 2 of Executive Order No. 2 is hereby transferred as part of the Whereas Clause hereof.

Section 4. The Secretary of Budget and Management shall issue the necessary rules and regulations to implement this Executive Order.

Section 5. This Executive Order amends Executive Order No. 125

Section 6. Except as herein provided, this Executive Order shall take effect immediately.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 125, AS AMENDED BY
EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 125-A**

SECTION 1.0 BACKGROUND

This Implementing Rules and Regulations is being issued pursuant to Section 4 of Executive Order (EO) No. 125-A dated November 29, 2002, Issued to amend certain provisions of EO No. 125 dated September 16, 2002, mandating the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) to issue the necessary rules and regulations to effectively implement the provisions of said Eos. In brief, said EOs were issued for purposes as follows:

1. EO No. 125, entitled “**Further enhancing the devolution of powers and functions, programs and projects of the National Government Agencies (NGAs) to the Autonomous Regional Government (ARG) of the Autonomous Region of Muslim Mindanao (ARMM), and for other purposes**”, provides for the devolution/transfer from national government agencies to the ARG of the ARMM of all Official Development Assistance (ODA) and locally funded programs and projects presently being undertaken and are programmed to be implemented within the ARMM.
2. **EO No. 125-A** was promulgated to amend certain provisions of said EO No. 125, providing for *(I)* exemptions from the devolution and/or transfer of ODA and locally funded programs and projects from national government agencies to ARG of the ARMM, *(II)* the effectivity period of EO No. 125, *(III)* the transfer of Section 2 of EO No. 125 as part of the “Whereas Clause” and *(IV)* the DBM issue the necessary rules and regulations to implement the subject EOs.

SECTION 2.0 DEVOLUTION OF OFFICIAL DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE (DDA) AND LOCALLY FUNDED PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS TO THE ARMM, AND THE RELEASE OF CORRESPONDING FUNDS THEREOF

2.1. *Exemptions*- All locally funded programs and projects that are being undertaken and programmed to be implemented within the ARMM are hereby devolved to and here to be implemented by the ARG of the ARMM except:

2.1.1. When the implementing government agency for such programs and projects was specified and/or identified by Congress in the annual General Appropriations Acts (GAA) or special law, then such programs/projects are exempted from devolution/transfer referred to herein. For this purpose, the corresponding funds shall be released to the designated government agency.

2.1.2. All legislators initiated programs and projects wherein the implementing government agency was accordingly specified and/or identified as provided in the annual GAA are exempted from the devolution/transfer referred to herein. As such, the corresponding funds thereof shall be released to the government agency designated to implement such programs and projects.

2.1.3. When in the judgment of the ARMM Governor, the AGG does not have the capability to implement the program and projects, then upon requests of the ARMM Governor, such programs or projects could be, be exempted of their devolution/transfer deferred/delayed. For this purpose, the corresponding funds shall be released to the government agency designated to implement programs and projects.

Administration and Management of all ODA and locally funded programs and projects in the ARMM- The Regional Planning and Development Office (RPDO) of the ARMM shall manage and administer all matters that pertain to ODA and locally funded programs and projects of the ARMM. Accessing of ODA funded programs and projects for the ARMM must always be coordinated with the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) and the Department of Budget and Management (DBM).

SECTION 3.0 CATCH-UP BUDGET FOR THE ARMM, PLANTILLA ITEMS FOR DEVOLUTION/TRANSFER TO THE ARMM, AND TRANSFER OF DEVOLVED AGENCIES

3.1 *Budget for programs and projects for transfer to the ARMM*, there must include in their program and activities, the corresponding budget for programs and activities that are for transfer and/or devolution to the ARMM until such time the budget therefore shall have been included in the ARMM.

- 3.2. ***Plantilla Positions-*** Pending the transfer of the devolved power, function, program and project, concerned national government agencies are prescribed from filling up, transferring, abolishing the corresponding Plantilla positions thereof, and from effecting any form of organizations/staffing, modifications/changes that would adversely affect subject positions.
- 3.3 ***Devolved Agencies in the Province of Basilan-*** Premised on consideration that Isabela City in Basilan is not part of ARMM, effective January 2003, all offices of national government agencies devolved to the ARG, including their personnel, asset, equipment and budget, that are located in Isabela City shall be transferred to Lamitan, Basilan. The necessary funding requirements to effect said transfer shall be sourced from any available allotment of the ARMM in FY 2003. Likewise, concerned national government agencies shall service the necessary requirements of Isabela City as consequence thereof.

SECTION 4.0 REPEALING PROVISIONS AND EFFECTIVITY

- 4.1 ***Amending Provisions-*** Section 7 of EO No. 125 has revoked, amended or modified accordingly all executive issuances, orders, rules and regulations, or any part thereof, which are inconsistent with any of the provisions of EO No. 125, as amended by EO No. 125-A. Accordingly, all execution guidelines and policies, as well as all other similar administrative issuances issued pursuant thereto and those that are inconsistent with any of the provisions of this IRR are likewise revoked, amended and modified accordingly. As, provided under Section 3 of EO No. 125-A, Section 2 of EO No. 125 is transferred as part of its "Whereas Clause."
- 4.2 ***Effectivity-*** Except for Section 1 of EO No. 124 as amended by EO No. 125-A which shall take effect starting January 1, 2003 as specifically provided in Section 2 of EO 125-A, all other provisions of the said EOs shall take effect fifteen (15) days upon its publication in the Official Gazette or in a newspaper of general circulation, whichever comes first.

**PROVIDING FOR THE REPRESENTATION OF THE AUTONOMOUS REGION
IN MUSLIM MINDANAO IN THE FORMULATION OF SOCIAL AND
ECONOMIC POLICIES, PLANS AND PROGRAMS AND FOR OTHER
PURPOSES**

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 2 and 3, Chapter 1, Subtitle C, Title II, Book V of the Administrative Code of 1987, the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) serves as the independent planning agency of the Government and is primarily responsible for formulating, continuing, coordinated and fully integrated social economic policies, plans and programs;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 5, Article IV Republic Act (R.A.) No. 9054, the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) shall, as practicable, be represented in the departments, offices, commissions, agencies and bureaus of the central government or national government that implement and enforce policies, programs and projects of the central government of national government in the region;

WHEREAS, by virtue of Memorandum Circular No. 7 dated August 11, 1998, the NEDA was directed to coordinate the preparation of the Medium Term Philippine Development Plan (MTPDP), 1999-2004, which shall be formulated in close collaboration and consultation with other agencies of the Executive Branch, the Legislative Branch, the local government units and the private/non-government sectors.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 10, Article XII of R.A. No. 9054, a Regional Economic and Development Planning Board (REDPB) was created to serve as the planning, monitoring, and coordinating agency for all development plans, projects, and programs intended for the ARMM, and which shall formulate a master plan for a systematic, progressive, and total development of the region, taking into account the development plans of the province, city, municipality, and barangay concerned as mandated by the Local Government Code of 1991 (R.A. No. 7160).

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GLORIA MACAPAGAL-ARROYO, President of the Republic of the Philippines, by virtue of the powers vested in me by law, do hereby order:

SECTION 1. *Representation in the NEDA.* - The ARMM Regional shall be invited to attend the meetings of the NEDA Board. The ARMM Regional Governor shall likewise be invited to attend the meetings of the Committee on Social Development and the Committee on Infrastructure of the NEDA.

Sec. 2. *Consultation with the REDPB.* - The Autonomous Regional Government, through the REDPB, shall actively participate in the formulation of the MTPDP to ensure that the development thrusts and priorities of the ARMM are reflected therein.

Sec. 3. *National Development.* - In accordance with the Executive Order No. 463 dated May 17, 1991, the REDPB shall serve as the Regional Development Council for the ARMM and the Regional Governor shall participate in all meetings of the Regional Development Council Chairman with the President.

Sec. 4. *Funding.* - Funds necessary for the REDBP operations, project monitoring and evaluation, and the implementation of the special projects shall be concluded in the annual general appropriations bill submitted to Congress.

Sec. 5. *Assistance.* - The NEDA Secretariat, upon request of the Autonomous Regional Government, shall provide development planning assistance in the formulation of the master development plan of ARMM.

Sec. 6. *Effectivity.* - This Executive Order shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in a national newspaper of general circulation and one (1) local newspaper of general circulation in the ARMM.

**PROVIDING FOR THE ORGANIZATION OF THE ARMM UNIFIED
COMMAND, SOUTHERN COMMAND, ARMED FORCES OF THE
PHILIPPINES (AFP) FOR THE AUTONOMOUS REGION IN MUSLIM
MINDANAO.**

WHEREAS, Section 21, Article X of the 1987 Constitution provides that the defense and security of the ARMM shall be the responsibility of the National Government. Towards this end, a regional command of the AFP shall be organized in accordance with national laws.

WHEREAS, to ensure the well-being and security of the inhabitants in Muslim Mindanao, it is necessary to station and deploy therein such elements of the Armed Forces as may be necessary in the are of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GLORIA MACAPAGAL-ARROYO, President of the Philippines, by virtue of the powers vested in me by law, do hereby order:

Section 1. Declaration of Policy - It is hereby declared policy of the State that the defense and security of the Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) shall be the responsibility of the national government.

Section 2. ARMM Unified Command - It is hereby created and organized an ARMM Unified Command under the Southern Command, Armed Forces of the Philippines, which shall be organized, maintained, and utilized in accordance with the national laws. Qualified inhabitants from the ARMM shall be given preference for assignment in the said unified command.

Section 3. Command Relationship - The ARMM Unified Command shall be under the direct supervision and control of the Commander, Southcom AFP.

The Department of National Defense (DND) and the Armed Forces of the Philippines shall determine the command relationship between Southern Command, AFP, the ARMM Unified Command and AFP-wide support units of the Major Services operating in the Southern Philippines.

Section 4. Calling Upon the Armed Forces – Notwithstanding, the provisions of the preceding sections, the Regional Governor of the ARMM may request the President to call upon the Armed Forces of the Philippines.

- (a) To prevent or suppress lawless violence, invasion, or rebellion, where the public safety so requires, in the autonomous region in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution;
- (b) To suppress the danger to or breach of peace in the autonomous region, where the Regional Police Force is not able to do so; or
- (c) To avert any imminent danger to public order and security in the autonomous region.

The President may on his/her own accord send the Armed Forces of the Philippines to the autonomous region to attain the above stated objectives if the Regional Governor does not act within fifteen (15) days after the occurrence of the afore mentioned above.

Section 5. Regional Emergency – In times of regional emergency, all elements of the Regional Police Force, the Regional Bureau of Fire Protection, and the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology shall, upon direction of the President or the Regional Governor, assist the Armed Forces of the Philippines in meeting the emergency.

Section 6. Implementing Rules - The DND, in coordination with the Autonomous Regional Government particularly the ARMM DILG, shall formulate the rules and regulations implementing this Executive Order.

Section 7. Separability Clause- If, for any reason, any part or provisions of this Executive Order shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, other parts or provisions thereof, which are not affected thereby, shall continue to be in full force and effect.

Section 8. Repealing Clause- All decrees, orders, rules, and regulations and other issuances, or parts thereof, which are inconsistent with this Executive Order are hereby repealed, modified or otherwise amended accordingly.

Section 9. Effectivity- This Executive Order shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in a national newspaper of general circulation and in a newspaper of local general circulation in the ARMM.

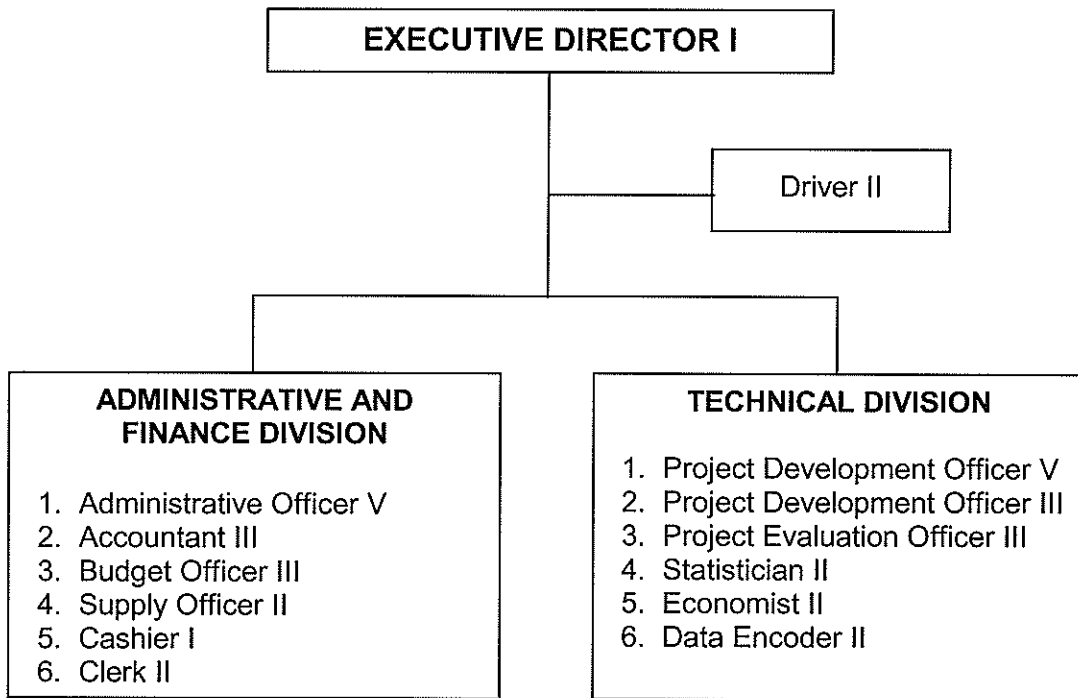

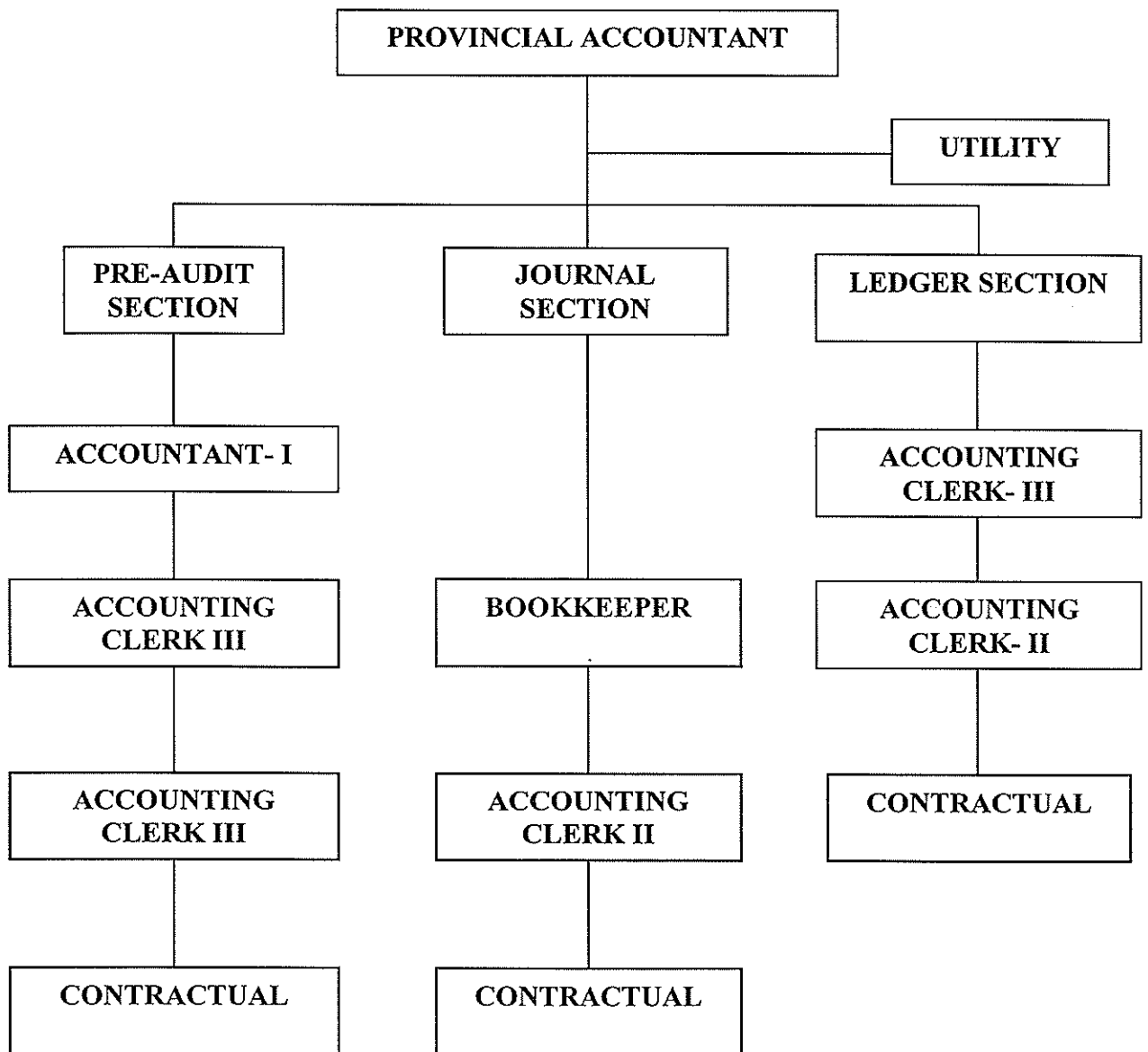
