#### Minutes:

- 1. The activities actually started 9:30 a.m. and ended 12:00 noon with snacks served inbetween by Woodfields Consultants, Inc. team.
- 2. The Session opened with an Invocation Prayer followed by the singing of the National Anthem led by Ms. Ann Bicomong and Ms. Josie Hermoso respectively, both from Woodfields Consultants, Inc. support staff team.
- 3. Mr. Jerry Francisco, Barangay Chairman of Barangay 132 of Manila was chosen by the group of participants to offer the Welcome Remarks for the occasion.

After which, all present each introduced himself to the Body.

It is interesting to note that the representative from Quezon City, Chairwoman Patria L. Chan of San Isidro Labrador, Q.C., happily acknowledge before the Body of her being invited to the meeting and noted that her Barangay is among the areas in Quezon City that is flood prone and that the Project is long overdue.

Dr. Delfin C. San Pedro, Consultant's EIA Study Team Leader and who acted as the Master of Ceremony, also introduced the Support Team members from Woodfields Consultants, Inc.

- 4. The Scoping Session Main Agenda –
- 4.1 Dr. San Pedro discussed the rationale for the meeting, the ECC as a government (DENR/EMB) requirement; the scoping session as part of the EIS system; the objectives/purposes, particularly the need for public/community consultations.

In this regard, Dr. San Pedro explained to the participants that to facilitate the process of public participations, each was advised to write on paper (distributed by the support staff), their issues and concerns (regarding the proposed project) together with their recommendations or suggestions. These written notes were later collected and read before the Body.

4.2 A representative from a Barangay in Manila (Ret. Col. Rito E. Ilao of Brgy. 847, Zone 92 in Malate) suggested that to save time, only those representatives who were not present during the previous meeting held at the Traders Hotel, like Quezon City, should present their issues and concerns since they (the Traders Hotel participants) have already done so Dr. San Pedro nonetheless read each of the written notes submitted.

- 5. The DPWH representatives' Participations
- 5.1 Engr. Napoleon Famadico took the floor from Dr. San Pedro and presented the Project (DICAMM) by discussing the proposed activities, e.g. de-clogging of drainage canals; de-silting of esteros; construction of new drainage canals; rehabilitation of pumping stations.
- 5.2 A Barangay representative (Barangay 195) talked on the Project's "non-structural activities" i.e., His Barangay experience on the conduct of I.E.C. campaign regarding proper garbage disposal by households.
- 5.3 Engr. Famadico also mentioned the printing and distributions of the newsletter "Estero" as part of the Project's I.E.C. activities.
- 6. Project Affected Barangays Issues

Dr. San Pedro, referring to the map, pointed to the affected Barangays and described the activities to be undertaken by the Project. He mentioned possible negative impacts as well as the mitigating action in addressing them.

- 7. Dr. Felixberto Roquia Jr. Presentation
- 7.1 Dr. Felixberto Roquia Jr., a Public Participation Consultant in the JICA team took his turn with his further explanation on the rationale of the public participation process. And that, not only was this exercise a need of JICA but to comply with the government requirements as discussed also earlier by Dr. San Pedro.
- 7.2 Dr. Roquia's discussions focused on the prepared diagram lay-out of the inter-actions processes among the various actors/participants in the public deliberations.
- 7.3 Future cluster/group meetings (District Level), Dr. Roquia announced this activity in January. Jess Averilla of DPWH also made similar announcement.
- 8. Issues/Concerns and Recommendations
- 8.1 Barangay Chairman Jerry Francisco's recommendation is for the immediate implementation of the project.

Dr. San Pedro in response, suggested the preparation of a Barangay resolutions to which his (Francisco) immediate response was, one has already been prepared and submitted earlier (at the Traders Hotel gathering).

8.2 Barangay 177 – To start the Project immediately and further saying that those not cooperating and supporting government project like his (DICAMM) be identified.

- 8.3 Other Issues/Concerns/Recommendations
- 8.3.1 Improper Garbage Disposal Practices

Chairman Payag – Complain about the practice of throwing/dumping garbage into the esteros by other barangays.

Dr. San Pedro suggested that a good venue to discuss this issue will be during their cluster or District Level gathering in January.

- 8.3.2 Deputize Kagawad to make arrest of those dumping garbage into the esteros.
- 8.3.3 To stop production of plastic materials.
- 8.3.4 De-clogging of drainage canal in their areas was the common issue and concerns among the participants.
- 8.3.5 Construction of perimeter fence to make boundary of Barangays in the esteros.
- 8.3.6 Rampant stealing of steel cover of drainage canals.

This was the particular concern of the representative from Pandacan, Manila. Another Barangay shared his concern and that they too have this kind of experience.

Recommendation: for DPWH the study of new design for drainage canal cover like ' the use of cement cover.

8.3.7 Informal settlers along esteros; sidewalks.

Chairman Payag suggested to DPWH not to allow their return once relocated.

8.3.8 Relocation Issue

Kagawad Mario Martin raised his concern on possible relocations.

Dr. San Pedro clarified that in Project activities North Manila, there will be no relocations involved. Only in South Manila particularly at Tripa de Gallina.

8.3.9 A member of participants instead pointed to the previous meeting at the Traders Hotel for their own experience of concerns and recommendations.

They had expressed their concern favorable endorsement of the Project in that gathering at Traders Hotel.

9. Closing Remarks

Engr. Napoleon Famadico of DPWH gave the closing remarks by way of summing up the DPWH plan on responses on the issues and concerns earlier referred to him during the floor deliberation. Thus:

- Blumentrit interceptor To improve and make it better.
- No relocations from the Project activities North Manila

- Lack of community participation in cleaning (de-clogging of canals).
- He acknowledged the constraints from the heavy concrete slab covers of the drainage canals.
- Estero boundary fencing DPWH will study this suggestions for possible implementation.
- 3-meter easement along esteros will study and will give these due considerations.
- Squatters' removal this is more the concern of the local government DPWH can only help to provide needed assistance.
- 10. Signing of the Minutes

Representatives from each group – Participants, JICA, DPWH and Woodfields Consultants, Inc., respectively affixed their signatures.

#### Minutes:

- 1. The activities actually started 2:30 p.m. and ended 5:00 p.m with snacks served inbetween by Woodfields Consultants, Inc. team.
- 2. The Session opened with an Invocation Prayer followed by the singing of the National Anthem led by Ms. Ann Bicomong and Ms. Josie Hermoso respectively, both from Woodfields Consultants, Inc. support staff team.
- 3. Honorable Irish Pineda, City Councilor, Pasay City, gave the welcome remarks, followed by the introduction by each of the participants of themselves. The members of the Woodfields Consultants, Inc., field interviewers joined to introduce themselves too.
- 4. Dr. Delfin San Pedro, Project Consultants EIA Study Team Leader presented the main agenda of the Session: the scoping activity as part of EIS; further explaining why the need for public participation as a government requirement for the ECC.
- 5. Dr. San Pedro discussed the need and reasons for the accomplishment of the "issues and concerns".
- 6. The attendance of Mayor Wenceslao "Peewee" Trinidad and his Vice-Mayor Antonio Calixto, high-lighted the meeting's activities.

Both officials indicated their cooperation and support to the Project implementation in their area.

- 6.1 Mayor Trinidad revealed before the Body that the City Government spends some P800,000.00 monthly in the upkeep Tripa de Gallina pumping station particularly with the garbage collection at the pumping station site.
- 6.2 Savings The City Government could thus save the same amount with the implementation of the Project.
- 7. Dr. Felixberto Roquia Jr. again did his discussions and presentations of the need for public participation as part of the process of the EIA.
- 8. Engr. Napoleon "Nap" Famadico talked on the Project; its background; rationale; area coverage.

- 8.1 He cited garbage as a cause of the floodings. Pointed to the desirability of community participations as in the case of de-clogging or cleaning of drainage canals but acknowledge the constraints because of the heavy concrete cover.
- 8.2 He mentioned the Project activities at Tripa de Gallina as another solution in the flooding of the Pasay area.
- 8.3 Dr. San Pedro amplified the possible solutions with his further explanation on the Project activities, e.g. Tripa; Faraday; Zobel, etc.
- 9. Model Barangay (Palanan) experience

The Barangay Chairman of Palanan cited their experience in solving flooding due to clogging of esteros. Estero cleaning; proper garbage disposal, i.e. not throwing garbage to the esteros.

- 10. Mayor Peewee Trinidad exhorted the Barangay officials present to extend their cooperation to the Project.
- 10.1 Vice-Mayor Antonio Calixto, for his part, gave the assurance of the City Government to the Project. He expressed his wish for the DPWH to give attention to Tripa de Gallina; Leviriza Street.
- 11. Further manifestation of the Local Government support to the Project, Mayor Trinidad mentioned his plan to allocate 50 sq. m. residential lot to each of the informal settlers to be affected in Tanay, Rizal. The cost will only be P5,000.00/lot.
- 12. Issues and Concerns

Issues and concerns that will voice out included the following:

12.1 By the San Isidro Barangay Chairman – He cited the bad odor from Tripa caused by the waste water from the slaughter house being drained directly to the estero.

The EMB representatives suggested the preparation of complaint letter and forwarded to the DENR/EMB.

12.2 Pasay/Maricaban Dredging

Suggested immediate dredging. Problem referred to DPWH. However, the peace and other problem in the area is the problem.

Engr. Famadico mentioned that their priority projects are those that are easy to implement. Projects requiring resettlement are difficult and take time to implement.

He assured the participants of attending to all their comments and suggestions to proper actions.

12.3 Relocation at Tripa

Dr. San Pedro clarified that only those whose houses with portions protruding or extending over the Tripa de Gallina boundary will be relocated.

13. The signing of the minutes/proceedings by participants; DPWH, JICA Representatives and Consultants ended the Scoping Session at 4:35 p.m.

- 1. Participants' registration for the workshop started at 8:30 a.m..
- 2. Invited participants for the workshop include:

Barangay Officials Community Leaders Multi-sectoral Representatives LGUs' Department Heads Identified Relocatees' Representatives from Brgys. Palanan and San Isidro, Makati City, and Barangays 43, 46, 51 and 54, Pasay City National Inter-Agency Representatives (TLRC and NHA)

(Please see Attachment 1: Attendance List).

- 3. The activities actually started 9:30 a.m. and ended 1:30 in the afternoon with snacks served in-between by Woodfields Consultants, Inc. team.
- 4. The Session opened with an Invocation Prayer followed by the singing of the National Anthem led by Ms. Ann Bicomong and Ms. Josie Hermoso respectively, both from Woodfields Consultants, Inc. support staff team.
- 5. Dr. Delfin C. San Pedro, the EIA Study Team Leader acted as the Master of Ceremonies for the first part of the program, and offers the Welcome Remarks for the occasion. He also introduced the different inter-agency representatives present in the said workshop as well as the guest from JICA, DPWH and DENR-EMB. After which, all present each introduced himself to the Body.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> This workshop is another of the public participations and consultation activities under the auspices of the JICA Study Team.

As with the previous activities, the objective is to provide the barangays, those directly affected in particular, the proper forum to voice out or express their issue and concern with regard to the possible impact, either way, of the Proposed Project DICAMM in their localities.

By this process, the Project implementation activities are guided accordingly and thereby better assured of success.

In this workshop for instance, the Barangay officials and other community leaders from Makati and Pasay were invited to participate in the planning of the possible activities in the proper management of the relocation plan to be carried out during the project implementation.

The participants were divided into two groups and each were advised to list their (major) issues and concerns and at the same time identify the needed actions and match with estimated budget to be required in carrying such activities.

The respective outputs of each group were later presented before the entire participants of the workshop.

- 6. Dr. Roquia, the Public Participation Specialist of the JICA Study Team, handled the Workshop proper. He requested the representatives of NHA and TLRC and asked them to give the participants an overview of how their individual agencies can help the families that will be affected by the DICAMM project.
- 7. Ms. Tess Valderama of NHA discussed the relocation procedure and the requirements for the families to be included in the relocation. She also identified the relocation site located at Kasiglahan Village in Montalban, Rizal as the probable relocation site and presented pictures of the actual relocation site.
  - 7.1 Mr. Loreto Antig of Barangay 51, inquired about the payment scheme of the housing project offered by NHA.

The NHA representative discussed the NHA procedures in the awarding of housing units for relocates. For instance, the term is for 30 years and with the following amortization schemes: PhP250.00 per month for the first year. Under this graduated scheme, there will be a PhP100.00/month increase, thus, under the 5<sup>th</sup> year period, Php500/month will be the schedule.

The monthly payment is considered zone or "rental" payment. It will only be during the  $6^{th}$  year period that payment will be considered part of the amortization payment.

7.2 Other issue raised by the participants is concerned with the other relocation site options since the identified relocation site (in Montalban, Rizal) is viewed far from their work.

Ms. Valderama continued with her discussion and also presented another option for the relocates. She discussed a brief overview of the Community Mortgage Plan (CMP) program of the government. In this program, an organized group recognized by the HLURB (duly registered) can apply a loan amounting to about PhP80,000.00/member for land purchase which can be paid for six years. This group has an option to identify their own relocation site provided that the said site is available and the owner is willing to sell to them the said piece of land. The group can afterwards apply to the agency for housing loan.

7.3 Mr. Loreto Antig of Brgy. 51, asked the NHA representative whether a certain amount of land near the river can be used for relocation of 116 families. The owner of the said land is willing to sell the property to interested parties.

The identified relocation site can be used as long as the owner is willing to sell the property to them. But proper procedures need to be followed.

8. Mr. Tito Fortes of the TLRC discussed the type of assistance their agency can give to the affected communities. He classified this assistance into three, namely (1) business and livelihood programs, (2) information materials and (3) livelihood training and environmental concerns. They conduct trainings and surveys of the affected communities. They also provide information materials in different formats (e.g. CD., DVD etc. formats). These materials may be accessed by the concerned communities in coordination with the concerned LGU's. In addition, their agency also conducts

seminars about effective solid waste management as well as information regarding available credit facilities and their good potential market.

- 9. The Workshop's Main Agenda
  - 9.1 Dr. Felixberto H. Roquia, Jr., the JICA Public Participation expert, started by presenting to the participants the results of the Social Impact and Mitigations for those affected by the relocation for validation (see Attachment 2) after which he discussed the methodology of the workshop. He highlighted the need for conducting the workshop as part of the EIA process. One of the objectives of the workshop is to promote public participation as part of project planning and in creating an effective and most feasible Social Development Plan for the affected communities. He likewise presented the Social Development Plan Format that will be used by the participants to design the SDP applicable to them.
  - 9.2 The participants were grouped according to their residential location, namely the Makati and Pasay group. Each group was assisted by representatives from different inter-agency departments like the NHA and TLRC. The participants were given 1-2 hours to form their own SDP according to the format presented by Dr. Roquia. He also stressed that based on the format, a budget for the identified SDP should be indicated. For the meantime however, the workshop will be limited to planning and projection of the budget, the details will be discussed later.

The total number of affected structures and families from the results of the actual survey by the EIA Consultant served as the basis for SDP budget projection.

9.3 At about 1:00 pm each group was asked to present their individual SDP. Each group chose one representative to present the SDP they have formulated including the estimated budget for the said plans.

The SDP formulated by each group is presented in Attachemnet 3.

10. Photo-documentation is presented in Attachemnet 4. The Session ended at 1:30 p.m.





#### Workshop Proper





## SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN (SDP) DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENT IN THE CORE AREA OF METROPOLITAN MANILA (DICAMM) PROJECT

## 1.0 GENERAL

The Framework for this SDP is receptive of the requirements and policies of international funding agencies such as the Japan Bank for International Cooperation (JBIC), Asian Development Bank (ADB) and the World Bank (WB)<sup>1</sup> especially that the proposed DICAMM project will involve relocation (temporary and permanent) of project affected people (PAP). Most of these donor institutions as much as possible advocate a noresettlement policy for economic infrastructure projects but where inevitable, resettlement is made manageable via a planning process that takes into account of the prevailing policy environment on housing and *social development*, and follows guidelines on entitlement and compensation setting, participatory involvement of PAPs, livelihood and income restoration, institutional participation, and monitoring and evaluation, among others.

The Framework though generally recommendatory has been organized to embody basic guidelines on relocation/resettlement planning as follows:

- Statement of Objectives
- Statement of Policies
- > Entitlements, Relocation Assistance and other Demand-Based Support
- ➢ Social Preparation
- Relocation Sites and Host Communities
- Participation of Key Institutions
- Monitoring and Evaluation

## 2.0 STATEMENT OF OBJECTIVES

The principal objectives of this Resettlement and Relocation Framework are as follows:

- To address the plight of the PAP in relation to the problem of displacement upon Project implementation by setting directions on setting eligibility and entitlements, income restoration, and social preparation, and the evaluation of relocation sites and host communities;
- (ii) To determine strategies and options to accommodate the needs of PAPs through a demand-based approach of identifying alternative support and assistance; and
- (iii) To guide concerned institutions on their responsibilities and level of participation in the planning and implementation stages of relocation and resettlement.

## 3.0 STATEMENT OF POLICIES

The Statement of Policies embody the development principles adhered to in the Medium Term Philippine Development Plan (1999-2004); namely, equity, effectiveness, efficiency, environmental sustainability, empowerment and gender equity, and accountability and transparency. These principles are translated into their policy equivalents as applied in crafting and SDP.

- Develop a resettlement program for PAP at a cost that could be assumed by the Project Proponent and that which would allow those entitled to be compensated in cash or in kind through replacement housing, and receive relocation assistance that would be determined based on actual needs (demand-based interventions).
- Refrain from conducting forced evictions and in the case of involuntary resettlement, conduct evictions based on procedures embodied in the 1994 UDHA Law and with due respect to the need of relocatees for prior information, adequate social preparation and humane treatment during actual demolition and transfer from areas to be cleared of informal settlements.
- Encourage voluntary resettlement where possible through priority listing of eligible households and facilitating their receipt of assistance and support from government agencies or NGOs with programs related to voluntary resettlement (e.g., *Balik Probinsya* ('return to province') program of DSWD).
- Implement social preparation activities dealing with education and information campaigns, consultations and participatory planning among the affected population and in host communities with the aid of concerned LGUs and NGOs. The purpose is to derive the 'voice' of affected peoples and with their participation in the discussion of issues and concerns, determine their priority needs and develop measures to adequately address these needs. Another is to impose the most minimum disturbance to PAPs or enhance the manageability of negative impacts resulting from eviction and displacement. For host communities, the goal is to compensate for the entry of new settlers in the area with adequate provisions for enforcing peace and order, facilities to cover increased demand for services, and foster community cooperation in helping new settlers adjust to new surroundings and living conditions.
- Priority placed towards on-site relocation or in lands located within the study areas to minimize negative effects on mobility, maintenance of social ties, and proximity to income sources and essential services, among others.
- Study how compensation could be used and applied in covering the losses incurred by legal owners and informal settlers in evacuating from their present domiciles. Compensation for legal owners would abide by laws on expropriation and the exercise of eminent domain by the Government of the Philippines (GOP). Compensation for informal settlements, on the other hand, would be limited to covering the loss of housing structures and not the cost of land where ownership is not well established.
- > Apply an entitlements criteria that would accurately define those eligible for relocation/resettlement assistance and disqualify those whose occupancy in an area targeted for the clearing and removal of settlements is found spurious or

questionable and/or where occupants do not qualify under the eligibility criteria set by the 1994 UDHA Law

- Consider other demand-based forms of support and assistance to PAPs determined based on their immediate needs in the event of eviction and transfer and sensitivity towards the plight of vulnerable groups and the priority concern of helping PAPs recover their before-Project economic status through income generation and restoration schemes and other related types of assistance (e.g., transport subsidies)
- Delineate roles and lines of responsibility and accountability of the Project Proponent, concerned LGUs (i.e., source LGUs or those where settlers originate and host LGUs holding jurisdiction on identified and developed resettlement sites), other concerned government agencies and NGOs to allow for multi-sector planning and commitment of services during pre-relocation, relocation and postrelocation phases. In the process, formulate an organizational structure to oversee the conduct and enforcement of relocation plans and monitor the results thereof.
- Enforce internal and external monitoring by appropriate parties to ensure the conduct of relocation process within the bounds of law, evaluate the timeliness, adequacy and sustainability of relocation assistance provided to those entitled, and assess conditions of PAPs in resettlement sites.
- Encourage private sector participation in the development and management of resettlement sites in line with the1994 UDHA Law (Sec. 20, Incentives for Private Sector Participation in Socialized Housing), taking into account several options for financing and investment recovery based on repayment schemes for land and property that may be afforded by new settlers.

## 4.0 ENTITLEMENTS, RELOCATION ASSISTANCE AND OTHER DEMAND-BASED SUPPORT

#### 4.1 SDP Planning Workshops

DPWH with assistance from JICA Study Team, EIA Consultant and other government agencies has undertaken a preliminary SDP Planning Workshop on 15 January 2005. The proceedings of this SDP Planning Workshop is attached elsewhere in this Annex.

In general, the following are the issues and concerns that will be included in SDP Planning Workshop:

- Livelihood Needs and Skills Assessment Workshop, to be conducted among community leaders and representatives and would involve self and group assessment of present sources of income and employment and other incomegenerating activities as against perceived opportunities and risks in the resettlement site. This would also involve them in identifying related needs and requirements for assistance as well as coping mechanisms. The expected outputs of this workshop would be a matrix of present livelihood and future needs as well as identified sources of support.
- **Transect planning** within the resettlement site and the host community for systematic appraisal of resources in the area and possible opportunities. The PAPs

may assess conditions at the site and evaluate the potentials for employment and livelihood, evaluate possible constraints and identify the necessary interventions and support from the host community, concerned LGUs and other agencies.

- In the preparation of **income restoration and livelihood plans**, the following points would be considered:
  - a) Support to current businesses or income-generating activities: possibilities for continued employment in the resettlement site/host community, the type of occupations and the number of people that may be absorbed, requirements for training and re-training and supporting institutions like government agencies and NGOs
  - b) Support to new businesses or livelihoods that may be established in the resettlement site/host community: need for training, micro-financing, technological support, supporting institutions like government agencies and NGOs, potential for economic organization (i.e., cooperative formation), impact on local business climate and absorption capacity as to competition, wages and markets; and,
  - c) Support to current businesses or livelihoods eliminated or weakened (e.g., loss of markets, suppliers, land): occupations affected and people displaced, possibility of ready absorption in new businesses and livelihoods, provision of economic safety nets such as ready credit and business loans
  - d) From the level of providers, TESDA and TLRC may be tapped to provide livelihood to PAPs.

#### 4.2 Other Types of Assistance

Other forms of assistance and support to PAPs may be assessed for consideration by the Project Proponent. These have been identified from expressed needs of PAPs during the perception survey as well as from findings on the vulnerabilities of some households covered in the survey.

- *Transport subsidies*, considering the level of accessibility presently enjoyed by respondents thus moving them away from present domiciles would exact more transport cost especially if resettlement site is located far from workplaces and essential services. Subsidies may come in the form of free transport for the first three (3) months of entry in the resettlement sites and facilitation in the licensing of transport operators in the area.
- *Establishment allowance*, for consideration of households who may lose income upon transfer, in particular, those engaged in self-employment and resource-based occupations in areas vacated. The establishment allowance may be equivalent to 1-3 months, determined based on the minimum wage or alternatively on the average incomes reported by affected households. The allowance may be provided in two (2) installments; the first a day before the transfer and the second upon transfer to the resettlement site.
- *Free labor and trucking*, such assistance may be commissioned to a private contractor who would provide the necessary number of personnel, trucking

equipment and hauling materials. Personnel would be provided proper identification and uniforms. Hauling and transfer schedules would be required to be prepared in advance for dissemination to the LGU, the Task Force on Resettlement and affected households for advanced notice and early preparation.

- *Food donation*, provided once upon transfer to the resettlement site to immediately assuage food needs of affected households and as PAPs are not readily adjusted to their surroundings to buy food on their own.
- Medical assistance, to enable affected households to be attended by expert medical help in the event of mishaps during the actual transfer as well as the physical trauma of displacement as manifested in sickness and diseases. It may be possible to assign a volunteer medical unit at resettlement sites for a maximum of two (2) weeks from the date of entry by PAPs.
- Special assistance to the disabled, in households with disabled members especially those with physical and mental infirmities who may suffer considerable trauma from moving. Assistance could be in the form of wheelchairs, crutches, and psychological help subsumed under medical assistance. Special needs could be determined through house-to-house visits by the Task Force on Resettlement in the process of drafting the checklist of requirements by vulnerable groups upon transfer and eviction.

# 5.0 SOCIAL PREPARATION, COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION AND GENDER PLANNING

The main goal of social preparation is to foster social acceptability among affected peoples through informed decision-making and willing participation in the planning process and actual relocation.

To accomplish such goal, the following measures may have to be considered in the conduct of information and education campaigns, and immersion activities in affected communities:

- Adequate information and education about the Project and their rights and entitlements as PAPs;
- Open and in-depth consultations, and adequate documentation about the reservations and concerns of PAPs about the Project especially on vulnerabilities that would be magnified upon transfer and re-establishment;
- Clear and prompt delivery of instructions and communications to PAPs on eviction and transfer, and thorough review of their documents prior to actual relocation;
- Adequate consultation during the planning stage on the choice of resettlement sites and available facilities, the composition of the entitlements package and livelihood programs to be pursued upon re-establishment; and,
- Available and reliable forums for addressing grievances and concerns at prerelocation and post-relocation
- 5.1 Social Preparation

As implied, social preparation sets in motion the process of community participation because it would only be through adequate knowledge and an understanding of the importance of the Project vis-à-vis the commitment of Project Proponent that their welfare and well-being would not be compromised that affected peoples would be expected to give their support to the Project and contribute to the peaceful and orderly conduct of relocation and resettlement.

Social preparation entails the participation of barangay councils, LGUs and associated offices, other government agencies, non-government organizations (NGOs) and existing community groups, other than the Project Proponent, in initial consultations and the conduct of mass information campaigns in the community.

Social preparation is considered to have four (4) phases,<sup>2</sup> the manner of adoption of which in the Project may be as follows:

(i) *Identification of Vulnerable Groups*, in the perception survey these have been found to be composed of female-headed and/or low-income households, the self-employed, farmers and fishers, the disabled, the youth and the elderly. These groups are considered to heavily bear physical and economic displacement and thus would have to be accorded special attention in the design of entitlements and other assistance that could be provided by the Project Proponent.

In the early stages, the Proponent could request assistance from barangay leaders in preparing a social map that would indicate the distribution, in their respective constituencies, of extremely poor and vulnerable groups as a way of knowing their geographic location and determining logistical needs (e.g., research assistants, vehicles) in conducting visits to the area.

(ii) *Mobilization*, a two-fold exercise in being undertaken at the Proponent level and at the community level.

At the Proponent level, mobilization activities would involve preparing a program on social preparation that would include a timetable, budget and responsibility matrix in conducting the necessary mass information activities, and focused group discussions with targeted vulnerable groups. Another is the design of information materials that would have to be easily understood and conveying essential features about the Project and the justifications for relocation. The other is deciding on the entities that would be involved in community organizing activities; the recommendation of which is to solicit the help of barangay councils, active community groups, indigenous and accredited NGOs in the Project areas, offices of LGUs (e.g., planning and development, DSWD and/or UPAO) and representatives from MMDA and DPWH.

At the community level, this would mean informing barangay leaders of social preparation activities, if possible, the schedule of visits, the type of consultations to be made, and the form and level of cooperation expected from them. Community leaders and representatives would also be met to discuss the process of social preparation.

(iii) Organization covers community organizing activities aiming to involve PAPs in making decisions critical to the design of relocation activities, their conduct and eventual completion. Initially, vulnerable groups and interested members of the

community may be organized into specific community groups that would be oriented of the Project and the planned relocation. In later stages, focused group discussions would be undertaken to investigate in-depth the concerns and problems of PAPs, in particular, the sources of their apprehension and hesitation to participate in the process. The group would also be encouraged to provide their opinions in the identification and selection of resettlement sites especially their views of an acceptable resettlement site, desired level of minimum entitlements, as well as livelihood and income restoration options.

- (iv) Institutionalization, or the formation of barangay-level relocation committees (BRC) on relocation that would serve as contact units doing planning and coordination activities directly with the barangay council, LGU or the Project Proponent, depending on which arrangement would be found better and applicable in actual implementation. The BRCs may be formed as an umbrella group consisting of representatives from active community organizations in respective Project areas who would be the working arm of the barangay in activities that include mobilizing the cooperation of affected peoples in relocation activities through the following:
  - Dissemination of information such as information bulletins, special notices, requests for meetings and dialogues, and providing clarification on matters where necessary and appropriate
  - Serving as the immediate contact point for redressing grievances and concerns
  - Counterchecking the inventory of eligible households under their jurisdiction and noting their special needs
  - Identifying other logistical needs of the community at the time of dismantling, eviction and transfer
  - Aiding in documentation processes by keeping their own files and maintaining a record system for documents and other notes related to relocation

#### 5.2 Community Participation

A framework for community participation is proposed building on the targeted outcomes of social preparation. The framework particularly categorizes the activities to be undertaken at pre-relocation, relocation and post-relocation stages and alongside these, identifies several key players and their roles, pertinent issues to be addressed at each stage, and the expected outcomes of community participation.

#### 5.3 Gender Planning

Women are considered to assume paradoxical although reconcilable roles in resettlement planning in being considered a vulnerable group especially those supporting large and low-income households, and on the other hand, as a pivotal group in being sources of strength in their communities in their role as homemakers, income earners and community workers.

In resettlement planning, the participation of women would be governed by the 1987 Philippine Constitution and the Philippine Plan for Gender-Responsive Development 1995-2005. The approaches by which to foster their participation in vital areas such as decision-making and assumption of responsibilities would be facilitated with the help of government agencies with similar mandates (e.g. DSWD, DOH) and concerned NGOs doing reputable work in their respective communities. These approaches include:

- Gender-specific census and other data collection activities
- Representation of women in all resettlement activities by a proportion of at least 50 percent, and their encouraged assumption of leadership roles in action groups formed in line with relocation planning
- Involvement of women in needs assessment and livelihood planning activities and the establishment or support of viable income-earning opportunities and livelihoods
- Targeted skills development and training for women micro-entrepreneurs
- Special care for children and the disabled during the resettlement process and provision of other forms of assistance at the domestic level (e.g., food and water donations, health care, day care centers) to reduce the domestic burden of women
- Support for existing women's organizations and networks and the formation of women-based self-help groups within resettlement sites

## 6.0 PARTICIPATION OF KEY INSTITUTIONS

Relocation and resettlement planning is deemed to be undertaken by a Resettlement Task Force who shall assume all core and related functions in accordance with the Implementing Rules and Regulations to Ensure the Observance of Proper and Humane Relocation and Resettlement Procedures Mandated by the Urban Development and Housing Act of 1992.

The DPWH as the designated Lead Agency of the Project would chair the Resettlement Task Force (RTF) that by law is required to consist of the following:<sup>3</sup>

- Legal Services Group
- Security Group
- Dismantling and Relocation Group
- Community Relations Group
- Census and Tagging Group
- Surveillance Group

The proposed roles and responsibilities to be assumed by the RTF as well as other agencies and entities whose present mandates tie in with core and related activities in relocation and resettlement are presented as follows (**Table 1**). These responsibilities are for discussion and to merit further improvement in the actual preparation and deliberation of the Resettlement Action Plan (RAP) for the Project.
