Awareness to improve health practices of under five has considerably been undertaken that there are more breastfeeding up to four months, more immunization coverage, better growth/weight monitoring and prevention/ reduction of cases of malnutrition. • Under five program is being sustained by RHUs and BHSs, especially those accredited as Sentrong Sigla. An RHU is certified as a Sentrong Sigla based on the quality of facilities and services it offers. It is one way to sustain a RHU JICA-donated facility.
