Preface

Five years has been passed since the promulgation of Local Government Ordinance 2001 and the

movement to transform the Local Government structure in Pakistan has already started by the provincial

governments. However this movement could not attain its effective management in line with newly

established local government due to the lack of staff, capacity, and budgets of District, Tehsil and Union.

CCB system is not an exception, which was newly introduced through the transformation of the local

government structure, also not performing well.

Considering the said situation and the request from the provincial government of Punjab, a "Project on

Improvement of Public Administration for Local Government in Punjab" has been started from

August, 2004 planed for two years term with the purpose of improving management for CCB system,

capacity building of administrators for transparent and effective public services.

Under this project, coordinators were appointed and CCB support center was set up to be a model for the

improvement of CCB system and an interface between local government and community/local people.

Since then, the number of registration, approval of CCB projects in model district has increased and the

percentage of the number of completed CCB projects and registered CCB has surpassed the average of

whole Pakistan.

Terminal Evaluation based on the field work was conducted on this project from January 14 to 27, 2007

under the leadership of Mr. Takao Kaibara, Resident Representative, JICA Pakistan Office for a colligation

and reviewing the project activities, evaluating the achievement of output set in PDM, summarizing the

lesson learned and making a recommendation for the project activities.

Terminal Evaluation Report on "Project on Improvement of Public Administration for Local

Government in Punjab" is compiled based on the result of field work and discussion with the

stakeholders, I hope this report may utilize broadly. I thank to all the stakeholders in a cordial manner and





I. OUTLINE OF THE PROJECT

1-1, Background of the Project

The Government of Islamic Republic of Pakistan (hereinafter referred to as "GOP") had managed to introduce the devolution/decentralization system realizing the importance of overall development of Pakistan inclusive of the services sector. The objectives of new local government system (bring into being as Punjab Local Government Ordinance 2001) are:

- (a) To establish a political structure with system in which local needs could be taken care, create a proper monitoring system consisted of elected representatives, ensures the involvement of civil society in the development and provide a mechanism of effective checks and balances with the governments: inclusive of all stakeholders.
- (b) To ensure that the genuine needs of people are provided, the basic human rights are protected. devolution of political power, decentralization of administrative authority plus management functions, diffusion of the power-authority nexus, and distribution of resources to the district level are put into practice.
- (c) To rationalize the administrative set up by defining lines of responsibility and provide protection against political interference and transfers on non-professional grounds.

In order to facilitate and ensure these policies, Government of Punjab, Local governments in model district and Government of Japan/JICA decide to work together closely and officially with collaboration and cooperation. The idea behind the project was to empower civil servants serving at local governments, impart knowledge with administrative skills through On the Job Trainings (OJT) and disseminate the same to communities through local government set-up on public services. In addition, facilitation of Citizens Community Boards (CCB) is one of crucial plan to create ideal scheme of community development with the involvement of all stakeholders. Therefore, the project would be a model of its kind owing to mutual understanding among the other organizations, community and donors.

1-2. Summary of the Project

The Project design is stipulated as follows:

(1) Overall Goal


The model of basic project cycle management on Citizen Community Board (CCB) Program is developed by improvements to components of CCB Improvement Activities in the model district.

(2) Project Purpose

Citizen Community Board (CCB) Program becomes more effective and efficient by improvement of performance in local governments in the model district,

(3) Outputs.

- 1) Obstactes and needs in communities and people for the implementation of CCB activities in the model district are identified by the local governments through socio-economic survey
- 2) Room for improvement in public administration of CCB program in the model district is identified by the local governments through organization analysis.



- CCB Improvement Plan (CIP) is created and implemented with the concept of project cycle management in the model district.
- 4) The local government executives, officials, and public representatives in the model districts acquire necessary skills and knowledge of the project activities.

2. EVALUATION OF THE PROJECT

2-1. Purpose of the Evaluation

Evaluation was performed with the following purpose:

- To evaluate the level of achievement, overall effects and strategies of the Project based on the R/D, the PDM, and the PO;
- (2) To evaluate the Project in terms of the five criteria mentioned below;
- (3) To make recommendations on necessary arrangements to be conducted for i) the successful completion of the Project and ii) the sustainable development after the Project completion.

2-2. Methods of the Evaluation

The evaluation study was conducted through the report analysis, field survey, and discussions with officials/staff members concerned based on the five Evaluation Criteria listed below:

(1) Relevance

Relevance measures the extent to which the Project is consistent with the priorities and policies of the target group, recipients and donor.

(2) Effectiveness

Effectiveness measures the extent to which the activities achieve its purpose, or whether this can be expected to happen on the basis of the outputs.

(3) Efficiency

Efficiency measures the output - qualitative and quantitative - in relation to the inputs. This generally requires comparing alternative approaches to achieving the same outputs in order to see whether the most efficient process has been used.

(4) Impact:

Impact indicates whether the Project has had effects on its surroundings in terms of technical, economic, socio-cultural, institutional, and environmental factors.

(5) Sustainability:

Sustainability measures the extent to which the objectives of the Project will continue to be accomplished after the completion of the Project, in other words, the extent to which the groups affected by the Project intend to and/or are able to take charge by themselves to continue accomplishing its objectives.

(2) Provision of Office Spaces and Facilities

Office spaces including CCB Support Centre (CSC) in Hafizabad have been provided to the Project, 151,200 rupees will have been expensed by the end of the Project for the cost of the space for the CSC.

3-2. Achievement of Activities

The Project has undertaken several activities for generating the following outputs:

- Output!: Obstacles and needs in communities and people for the implementation of CCB activities in the model district are identified by the local governments through socio-economic survey
- Output2: Room for improvement in public administration of CCB program in the model district is identified by the local governments through organization analysis
- Quiput3: CCB Improvement Plan (CIP) is created and implemented with the concept of project cycle management in the model district.
- 4) <u>Output</u>: The local government executives, officials, and public representatives in the model districts acquire necessary skills and knowledge of the project activities.

The activities which have been undertaken for promoting the attainments of the above outputs are summarized as follows:

3-2-1. Activities for Output 1

(1) General Condition Survey (2004/12-2005/03)

General Condition Survey was conducted for 42 Unions. With analyzing the collected data and information, Union Profiles for these 42 Unions were prepared. The results of this Survey including Union Profiles were presented at the PCC held in March 2005.

(2) Community Survey (2005/04-2005/08)

Based on the results of General Condition Survey, pilot 10 Unions (20 villages) were finalized by District Nazim, DCO, and the Project. Community Survey was conducted for these 10 Unions with participatory survey methods. Information collected through this Survey such as needs and issues of

these villages were utilized by the CCB coordinators for implementing the CIP,

(3) Preparation of Union Face Sheet (2006/05-2006/06).

Union Face Sheets were prepared for all 42 Unions, with developing the Union Profiles prepared by the General Condition Survey. Those Sheets were sent to all the Unions. In 11 pilot Unions, the workshops were held to share those Sheets.

3-2-2. Activities for Output 2

Organization Analysis Survey on local governments in Hafizabad District was conducted from Nov. 2004 to Mar. 2005. It included institutional analysis (policy, laws/rules/regulations) as well as organizational analysis (organizational structure, decision-making process, management control system, human resource management, local government culture). The results of the Survey was presented at the PCC held in March 2005. In addition, the workshop on sharing the fruits of this Survey was held in May 2005, attended by District officers and Tehsil officers.

3-2-3. Activities for Output 3

(1) Preparation of the draft CCB Improvement Plan (CIP) (2005/05-2005/08)

Draft CIP was prepared by the contracted consultant, with referring to the results of General Condition Survey, Community Survey, and Organization Analysis.

(2) Finalization of CIP (2005/05-2005/12)

After the series of discussion with District officers on the draft CIP, the CIP was finalized and approved by the PMU in December 2005.

(3) Establishment of system for implementing CIP

Following activities were undertaken:

- Recruitment of senior trainers and CCB coordinators (2005/09-10).
- Training for these CCB coordinators (2005/10&12)
- Opening of the CCB Support Centre (CSC) (2005/12).
- Sening of the CCB Information Board (2005/10-)
- Preparation of CCB Information Kit (2005/12, 2006/08-09)
- (4) Implementation/monitoring of CIP (I) (covering 15 pilot Unions)
- Field facilitation by CCB coordinators (2005/11-)
- Operation of CCB registration data base (2006/01) (for all 42 Unions)
- Monitoring of the record of the activities by senior trainers and CCB coordinators.
- Series of meetings/workshops with executives and officers of Government of Punjab as well as those
 of Hafizabad District Government
- Establishment of CCB Monitoring Committee and selection of its members (2006/02-03) (for all 42 Unions)
- I" Project Examination Committee (PEC) was held in June 2006 to approve 14 proposals
- (5) Revision for CIP (II) (covering all 42 Unions) and its implementation
- CIP was revised in August 2006 in terms of its target (from 15 pilot Unions to all 42 Unions), way of facilitation (from visit-type to consultation at CFS), schedule of registration and approval procedure, position of the PEC, with reflecting the activities of CIP (I).
- Setting of CCB Facilitation Station (CFS) at 8 sites (2006/10)

3-2-4. Activities for Output 4

Several workshops and seminars were held for official of Government of Punjab, the local government executives, officials, and public representatives to be shared with Project-related information as well as to acquire skills/knowledge necessary for the Project activities (Annex 1).

3-3. Implementation Procedure

(1) Project Implementation and Monitoring System

PCC meetings and PMU meetings have been held six times and five times respectively (Annex 2). Through these meetings, the Project-related information has been shared and progress in the Project activities has been reviewed among the parties concerned. In addition, other meetings/discussions have been made among the parties concerned upon necessity. Thus, it could be said that implementation and monitoring system for the Project has been basically established and functioned sufficiently.

(2) Communication and Information Sharing

Although no full-time staff has been assigned from Pakistani C/P to the Project, it seems that sufficient level of communication and information sharing between the Pakistani C/P and the Project (Japanese Expens) has been ensured through above-mentioned frequent meetings and discussions held between them. It could be said that understanding and commitment of the Pakistani C/P for the Project have also been ensured through those sufficient interaction between them.

4. RESULTS OF THE EVALUATION

4-1. Relevance

(1) Relevance to Pakistani Development Policy

In "Ten Year Perspective Development Plan 2001-2011" of Government of Pakistan, devolution policy strategy is raised. In addition, "Local Government Plan 2000" stipulates CCB as the village-level organization to facilitate people's participation in community development. As for Provincial level, Government of Punjab enacted "Punjab Local Government Ordinance (PLGO) 2001" and "Punjab Local Government Rules 2003", where composition and functions of the CCB is stipulated, Consequently, the Project, which aims to make CCB Program more effective and efficient by improvement of performance in local government, is relevant to Pakistani policies and strategies.

(2) Relevance to Japanese ODA Policy

"Japan's Country Assistance Program for Pakistan (February 2005)" and "JICA Country Program for Pakistan (July 2006)" regard "governance" as one of the cross-curting issues, and emphasize smooth progress of devolution, the upgrading of administrative capabilities, and the maintenance of law and order. Thus, the Project is also relevant to these Japanese ODA policy.

(3) Relevance of Selection of the Project Target

It was reasonable to select Hafizabad District as the model for the Project, considering i) its average feature in terms of socio-economic and human development index, ii) relying on agricultural sector, iii)its accessibility both from Lahore and Islamabad, iv) its administration's positive attitude to have the Project.

4-2. Effectiveness

4-2-1. Achievement of Outputs

(1) <u>Output1</u>: Obstacles and needs in communities and people for the implementation of CCB activities in the model district are identified by the local governments through socio-economic survey

The results of socio-economic survey (General Condition Survey, Community Survey) and Union Face Sheets were shared with the local government executives and officials through the PCC and workshops. Since those sharing could be thought to promote their understanding on the obstacles and needs in communities and people, it could be evaluated that this output has been achieved.

(2) Output2: Room for improvement in public administration of CCB program in the model district is identified by the local governments through organization analysis

The results of the Organization Analysis Survey was presented at the PCC held in March 2005. In addition, the workshop on sharing the fruits of this Survey was held in May 2005, attended by District officers and Tehsil officers. Since these have promoted their understanding the room for improvement in public administration, it could be said that this output has been sufficiently achieved.

(3) <u>Output3</u>: CCB Improvement Plan (CIP) is created and implemented with the concept of project cycle management in the model district.

CIP was formulated and implemented, then, it was further revised for improvement, based on the feedback from monitoring on its implementation. In this manner, the concept of project cycle management has been incorporated into this procedure for revision, thus, it could be said that this output has been sufficiently achieved.

(4) <u>Output4</u>: The local government executives, officials, and public representatives in the model districts acquire necessary skills and knowledge of the project activities.

Through several workshops and seminars such as on PCM, PLGO, CCB rules, CCB awareness, and computer skills undertaken by the Project, it could be thought that they have acquired necessary skills and knowledge, thus, this output has been achieved. However, further inputs are required for them to keep those skills and knowledge.

4-2-2. Achievement of Project Purpose

Judging from the fact that 100 CCBs have been registered (profiles of those CCBs, please refer to Annex 3), 53 CCBs have completed their proposals, 13 proposals have been approved by the District Council, and 12 projects have been completed by the end of December 2006 due to the implementation of the CIP, the pace of which is faster than those in Hafizabad District before the Project started and the average of those in Punjab Province as the following table shows, it could be said that "CCB Program have become more effective and efficient by improvement of performance of local government in Hafizabad District", thus the project purpose has been achieved.

This is also supported by the opinions from some of the CCBs that they have acquired knowledge/skills regarding CCB Program, their communication with the local government has become smoother, then, CCB activities (including registration, preparation of proposal, and implementation) have been progressed, thanks to the Project activities.

It should be kept in mind, however, that improved performance of local government has been sustained by such functions/services as CSC and CCB coordinators, which have been introduced or/and strengthened by the Project. Therefore, it is questionable whether the level of local government's performance could be sustained if function/services provided by CSC and CCB coordinators would not be continued.

4-3, Efficiency

4-3-1. Efficiency of Inputs

(1) Inputs of Japanese Side

1) Japanese Expens

For two and half years of the Project, three long-term experts (local governance and public administration (1), regional development/project coordinator (2)) were dispatched appropriately in considerations of expertise, timing and period.

In addition, three short-term experts in total (comparative study on regional development, poverty alleviation, regional development and gender) as well as four project consultation missions have been dispatched appropriately, in consideration of expends of their members.

2) C/P Training in Japan

Five trainees were dispatched to short-term (about 10 days) training courses on "comparative study for local governance and regional development". It seems that those trainings have promoted their further understanding and support for the Project. There were certain evidences what they learned from those trainings was presented at the workshops as well as reflected into the CIP, thus, efficiency is high.

3) Equipments

Equipments provided are fully utilized for Project activities leading to full sufficiency.

4) Local Cost Expenditure

Although there are 2-month delay in money transfer at the beginning stage of the Project, those expenditures were fully utilized for the Project activities.

5) Local Staff

The Project has employed the senior trainers and the CCB coordinators by the local cost expenditures, with expectation of their functioning as the neutral intermediaries between the local government and CCBs. They have been appropriately utilized for implementing the CIP, such as facilitating people, supporting implementation of CCB projects, and their monitoring.

(2) Inputs of Pakistani Side

1) Assignment of C/P

All the Pakistani C/P personnel have been involved with the Project as a part of their regular work. Therefore, personnel transfer of the C/P personnel has been done without consideration of the Project. For instances, EDO-CD was unfortunately changed three times during two and half years, which impaired efficiency of the Project.

4-3-2. Efficiency of Activities

(1) Activities for Output 1

Despite 3-month delay in their starts, General Condition Survey and Community Survey were undertaken as planned. The results of those survey were properly shared among the parties concerned.

(2) Activities for Output 2

Organization Analysis Survey was undertaken as planned. The results of this survey were properly shared among the parties concerned.

(3) Activities for Output 3

CIP (I) was formulated (December 2005) and implemented as planned. Through the monitoring on the implementation of CIP (I), it was revised as CIP (II) (August 2006). The CIP (II) has been implemented since then. In general, the quantity and quality of the activities for generating Output 3 seems to be sufficient. However, the Project and/or the District Government have not always dealt with the issues for improvement identified in the process of implementing the CIP, in timely manner.

(4) Activities for Output 4

Many workshops and seminars have been undertaken for the parties concerned such as official of Government of Punjab, the local government executives and officials. CCB members, other donors, NGOs, etc. It could be said that the quantity of those workshops/seminars is sufficient, in consideration of limited Project duration. Regarding the quality of those workshops/seminars, it could be also though sufficient, according to the high evaluation by the participants and the lectures for some of those workshops/seminars (see Annex 1).

4-4. Impact

It could be said that the Project has demonstrated the model of basic project cycle management on CCB Program through formulation and implementation of the CIP. However, whether this model could be established and developed highly depends on the future directions of policy supports, institutional arrangements, and financial supports (see next section of 4-5. Sustainability). Thus, it is still difficult even at this completion stage of the Project to judge whether the overall goal of the Project could be achieved within few years.

4-5. Sustainability

4-5-1. Policy Support

Since "Legal Framework Order" assures "Punjah Local Governance Ordinance 2001", policy support from the Government of Punjab for devolution and CCB Program is highly expected to continue.

4-5-2, Capacities of Pakistani Side

It was observed that the capacities of some CCBs have been enhanced by the Project with acquisition of knowledge/skills on CCB Program, however, the coverage of the Project is so far still limited. Thus, continuous supports for CCBs as well as community groups are required to promote CCB Program, as some CCBs expressed their desire that services provided by CCB coordinators should be continued. On the other hand, though the capacities of the local government executives and officials on implementing the CCB Program have been also enhanced by the Project, those capacities are mainly related to procedural administration of CCB Program and their capacities on facilitating and communicating CCB/community groups are still insufficient since those functions have been carried out by such CCB coordinators under the Project. If these functions would be ensured by either way, it is highly expected the local government could continue to implement CCB Program with efficient and effective manner.

4-5-3. Organizational/Institutional Arrangement

This Project has presented a new model of basic project cycle management on CCB Program, with setting-up the CSC for strengthening administrative functions regarding CCB Program as well as introducing CCB coordinators for undertaking such functions as field-level mobilization and facilitation. Discussion on how a system would be evolved to institutionalize this model and how the budget would be allocated for them is underway. If these arrangements could be done, the effects of the Project are expected to be sustained.

5. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Since its commencement in August 2004, the Project has demonstrated the model of basic project cycle management on CCB Program through formulation and implementation of the CIP with series of Project activities. This has resulted in sufficient amount of accomplishment in the Outputs and the Project Purpose initially planned, despite its limited duration.

Although the Project has achieved to its Outputs and Purpose within the Project period, which the Pakistani side has also appreciated, further time is required to accumulate more experiences on implementing and monitoring of CCB Program which could be feed backed for establishing and developing the model demonstrated by the Project. The duration of the Project is a bit short for both parties (Pakistani and Japanese) to examine post-Project arrangements to sustain the effects generated by the Project.

In this regard, it is recommended for both parties to take actions to continue the following functions and activities for certain period of time after the completion of the Project;

- Functions and services of CCB Support Center (CSC)
- Functions and services carried out by the CCB coordinators for CCBs and community groups
- Implementation and monitoring on CIP (II)

At the same time, while post-Project institutional/organizational arrangements should be examined without any delay, possible options for financial arrangements (such as utilizing part of CCB fund, budget of District government, follow-up scheme of JICA, assistances from other donors, etc.) should be continuously searched by the both parties.
