Disaster Reduction – An Agenda in Progress

1989: IDNDR 1990-1999 – promotion of disaster reduction, technical and scientific buy-in

1994: Yokohama Strategy and Plan of Action – Mid-review IDNDR, first blueprint for disaster reduction policy guidance (social & community orientation)

2000: International Strategy for Disaster Reduction (ISDR) - increased public commitment and linkage to sustainable development, enlarged networking and partnerships. Mechanisms: IATF/DR, ISDR secretariat, UN Trust Fund

2002: Johannesburg Plan of Implementation- WSSD Includes a new section on "An integrated, multi-hazard, inclusive approach to address vulnerability, risk assessment and disaster management..."

2005: WCDR - Hyogo Framework for Action 2005-2015 Building the Resilience of Nations and Communities to Disasters

2007: 1st session of the Global Platform for Disaster Risk Reduction Monitor the progress of the HFA implementation, facilitate further actions and partnerships, take stocks and share lessons and good practices

2009: 2nd session of the Global Platform for Disaster Risk Reduction (Geneva, 16-19 June 2009)





International Strategy for Disaster Reduction



Launched in 2000 by UN General Assembly Resolution A/54/219 as successor of the International Decade on Natural Disaster Reduction – IDNDR, 1990-1999:

The ISDR aims at building disaster resilient communities by promoting increased awareness of the importance of disaster reduction as an <u>integral component of sustainable</u> <u>development</u>, with the goal of reducing human, social, economic and environmental losses due to natural hazards and related technological and environmental disasters.










ISDR secretariat's main functions:



- (a) Policy and coordination (guide & monitor implementation of HFA)
- **(b) Advocacy** (high-level advocacy, annual awareness campaign, publications)
- (c) Information management and networks (website, clearinghouse)
- (d) Regional outreach- support to regional partners & countries (national platforms and action plans- policy, advocacy, information)
- (e) ISDR system and resource mobilization

Hyogo Framework for Action 2005-2015 (HFA)

- Building the resilience of nations and communities to disasters
 - √ 3 Strategic goals
 - √ 5 Priorities for action
 - ✓ Implementation and follow-up


Five priorities for action:

- 1. Governance: ensure that disaster risk reduction is a national and local priority with strong institutional basis for implementation
- 2. Risk identification: identify, assess and monitor disaster risks and enhance early warning
- 3. Knowledge: use knowledge, innovation and education to build a culture of safety and resilience at all levels
- 4. Reducing the underlying risk factors in various sectors (environment, health, construction, private sector etc.)
- 5. Strengthen disaster preparedness for effective response 5

Main elements of the ISDR System in support of the Hyogo Framework for Action








HFA implementation and **ASEAN**





- Embodies ASEAN's commitment to the HFA
- ASEAN Agreement on Disaster Management and Emergency Response (AADMER)
- Signed by Foreign Ministers of ASEAN on 26 July 2005 in Vientiane, Lao PDR
- Ratification underway (2 more to go) – expected to enter into force soon









New Partnership Scheme

ASEAN Secretariat-UNISDR-World Bank MoU for Collaboration on DRR

Five-year tripartite MoU Goal:

The overall goal is to contribute to the achievement of the ASEAN vision of resilient nations and a safer region by the year 2015 through an effective strategic implementation of disaster risk reduction (DRR) initiatives within the context of ARPDM, AADMER and HFA by facilitating effective cooperation on regional disaster risk reduction strategies and by promoting investments in disaster risk reduction by ASEAN Member States.











Agree to collaborate to:

- (a) Mobilize technical support and financial and human resources for disaster risk reduction in ASEAN, including through GFDRR;
- (b) Identify shared disaster risk reduction priorities and formulate strategies and action plans for the ASEAN region;
- (c) Support the implementation of disaster risk reduction measures identified by the ARPDM, AADMER, and the HFA in coordination with the relevant ASEAN bodies and the Member States;
- (d) Systematically identify and exchange information and experiences in support of increased disaster risk reduction in the ASEAN region;
- (e) Review and monitor progress in implementing the HFA in the **ASEAN** region









Proposed Area of Activities:

- <u>Programme Area 1 Strengthening Regional DRR Implementation</u>
- Programme Area 2 Capacity Development and Knowledge Management
- <u>Programme Area 3 AHA Centre</u> (ASEAN Coordinating Centre for Humanitarian Assistance on disaster management)
- Programme Area 4 People-centered ASEAN
- Programme Area 5 Partnership and Cooperation
- Programme Area 6 Support for the Implementation of National Platforms and Action Plans on DRR









Expected results from five year collaboration:

- All ASEAN Member States have
 - national action plans and corresponding implementation plans in place for integrating disaster risk reduction into development planning;
 - policies and/or legislative framework in place that support disaster risk reduction efforts:
- Financing to support the national level DRR implementation plans has been earmarked by the national governments and/or mobilised from IFIs and other development partners;
- 10 ASEAN Secretariat staff and 100 Member State representatives trained on disaster risk reduction and post-disaster recovery;
- ASEAN Secretariat's Disaster Management and Humanitarian Assistance Division is fully staffed and operational;
- ASEAN Member States have improved access to knowledge and information on DRM issues, including through the fully functional experts database for emergency response;
- The ASEAN Coordinating Centre for Humanitarian Assistance on disaster management is staffed and fully operational; and,
- Increased awareness of DRM issues among citizens of ASEAN Member States.







- ✓ To promote common understanding of risks among local residents, government officials and experts



Building Community Capabilities (1)-2 Community Based Hazard Mapping

Step 1

Field Survey

Residents, Officers in Local Govt. and Experts survey the positive and negative features relating to the disaster risk by walking around in the town.



Develop a Map

Visualize the observations and findings on the map. Enhance the awareness and cooperation through the task.

Step 3

Discussion and Presentation

What are the problems? Who is responsible? What are the countermeasures? Share the information.




